APPROVAL OF MINUTES

James Hairston motioned to approve April's meeting minutes. All ayes; minutes were approved.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There were no public comments.

CITY COUNCIL LIAISON COMMENTS

Councilmember Marie Barth discussed some of the upcoming construction projects around the city.



*3 of these incidents are confirmed to be fireworks related. Likely others are but only 3 confirmed.

In addition to the statistical information, we deployed a UAS on the night of the 4th to survey the amount of fireworks in our general area. The UAS pilot sent the UAS up and made a 360 degree turn while video recording. Areas covered were Tacoma, Parkland/Spanaway, Lakewood, and University Place. There were significant numbers of fireworks in all directions. This includes, notably, Tacoma where they have had a ban in place for several years.

The City of Lakewood Public Safety Advisory Committee (PSAC) requested a legal update on the current City firework ordinances. As the City ordinances are related to state law, information regarding state law is also included. Finally, information regarding other local jurisdictions is provided for reference.

Overview¹

State law governs the regulation of fireworks, including what fireworks are legal, licensing for public fireworks displays and for fireworks sellers, as well as when fireworks may be discharged. However, state law leaves some room for local regulation, such as when fireworks may be sold or discharged and for cities and counties to completely prohibit the sale and discharge of fireworks.

Important Reminder: Any local fireworks ordinances that are more restrictive than state law may not take effect until at least one year after adoption.

State of Washington Fireworks Laws:

The <u>Washington State Patrol</u> enforces the state fireworks laws:

- <u>Ch. 70.77 RCW</u> State Fireworks Law
- <u>Ch. 212-17 WAC</u> Administrative regulations adopted by the State Patrol

Permitting and Licensing:

State License:

A **license** issued by the State Patrol is required for:

- Wholesale and/or retail fireworks sales, manufacturing, or importing (<u>RCW</u> 70.77.315).
- Possession or use of fireworks, other than consumer fireworks lawfully purchased at retail (<u>RCW 70.77.255(4)</u> and <u>RCW 70.77.315</u>).
- Public display of fireworks (including those put on by local governments). A "public display of fireworks" is defined by <u>RCW 70.77.160</u> as "an entertainment feature where the public is or could be admitted or allowed to view the display or discharge of display fireworks."

There are licensing exceptions for the purchase and use of certain agricultural and wildlife fireworks by government agencies and for the purchase of consumer fireworks by religious or private organizations for "religious or specific purposes," provided a permit is obtained from the local fire official (<u>RCW 70.77.311</u>).

Local Permit:

In addition to obtaining a the state license, RCW 70.77.260(1) instructs anyone wishing to manufacture, import, sell, or transport fireworks must also obtain a local **permit** issued by a city or county (as the case may be) prior to carrying out these activities.

Application is to be made to the "local fire official" (RCW 70.77.260), who submits a report of findings and a recommendation for or against the issuance of the permit, together with reasons, to the governing body (RCW 70.77.265). The governing body, or a person designated by the governing body, must grant the permit if it meets state standards and any standards that may be adopted by local ordinance (RCW 70.77.270). The governing body must complete this process:

- by June 10, or no less than 30 days after receipt of an application, whichever date occurs first, for sales commencing on June 28 and on December 27; or
- by December 10, or no less than 30 days after receipt of an application, whichever date occurs first, for sales commencing only on December 27 (RCW 70.77.270).

If the application is for a **public display permit**, only the city or county governing body (not a designee) may grant the permit, based on an investigation by the fire official (RCW 70.77.280).

Cities and counties may impose fees for fireworks retail sales and displays sufficient to cover all legitimate costs, up to the maximum amounts prescribed by RCW 70.77.555.

Prohibited Fireworks in Washington State:

RCW 70.77.401 prohibits the sale of, or offer to sell, the following types of fireworks:

[C]onsumer fireworks which are classified as sky rockets, or missile-type rockets, firecrackers, salutes, or chasers as defined by the United States department of transportation and the federal consumer products safety commission except as provided in RCW 70.77.311.

The Washington State Fire Marshal's Office has two handouts that can assist in the identification of legal and illegal fireworks:

- Legal Consumer Fireworks for Sale in Tents and Stands per RCW 70.77.136 (Enclosure 1)
- Illegal Fireworks and Illegal Explosive Devices (Enclosure 2).²

Dates and Times Fireworks May Be Sold or Discharged:

RCW 70.77.395 sets the allowable times for sale or discharge of fireworks.

Fireworks may be *sold and purchased* on the following dates and times:

- June 28: 12:00—11:00 p.m.
- June 29—July 4: 9:00 a.m.—11:00 p.m.
- July 5: 9:00 a.m.—9:00 p.m.
- December 27—31: 12:00—11:00 p.m.

Fireworks may be used and discharged on the following dates and times:

- June 28: 12:00—11:00 p.m.
- June 29—July 3: 9:00 a.m.—11:00 p.m.
- July 4: 9:00 a.m.—12:00 a.m. on July 5.
- July 5: 9:00 a.m.—11:00 p.m.
- **December 31**: 6:00 p.m.—1:00 a.m. on **January 1**

Cities and counties may, by ordinance, further restrict the days and times when fireworks may be sold and discharged. Cities and counties may also prohibit entirely the sale and discharge of fireworks. **However, any such ordinance further restricting when fireworks may be sold or discharged, or which prohibits their sale and discharge, may not take effect until at least one year after adoption, per RCW 70.77.250(4)**³.

<u>CITY OF LAKEWOOD LOCAL ORDINANCES</u>:

The following is illegal in the City of Lakewood⁴:

- A. Selling fireworks without first obtaining a permit⁵;
- B. Possession, using or exploding any "dangerous firework or any fireworks other than those listed as being able to be sold to the public in WAC 212-17-198" (except for public displays);
- C. Selling, possessing, using or exploding any fireworks except as provided by this chapter;
- D. <u>Selling</u> any fireworks (retail or wholesale) within the City except from 12:00 noon on June 28th until 11:00 PM on July 4th. Fireworks cannot be sold between 11:00 PM and 9:00 AM June 28th-July 3rd.
- E. Using, discharging or exploding fireworks in a negligent or reckless manner⁶;
- F. <u>Using, discharging or exploding</u> fireworks any time other than 11:00 AM 11:00 PM July 3rd July 5th and 1100 PM December 31st to 1:00 AM January 1st.
- G. Selling (including offers to sell) fireworks to any person under 16 years-old.
- H. Possession or discharge of firework by any person under 16 years-old within the City without direct supervision of a parent or guardian.
- I. Using, discharging or exploding any fireworks on school grounds or park within City limits.






NIBRS Person Crime By Quarter 2016-2019




Western State Hospital NIBRS Person Crime 2016-2019 (By Quarter)




NIBRS Property Crime By Quarter 2016-2019



2nd Quarter 2019 Analysis

- 1909102255 -8 month old infant was taken to St Claire with multiple injuries from head to toe. The damage done to the child's brain (shaken) is likely permanent although there has been some improvement. The suspect was the father and is currently in trial under Assault 1st.
- 1916202068 A victim of a gunshot wound showed up at St. Clare Hospital following a shooting at Harry Todd Park in the Tillicum neighborhood of Lakewood. The victim was shot in the leg. The incident may have been gang related and the investigation is ongoing.
- 1916700578 Homicide on the 6900 block of 146th St SW. Officers responded and discovered two victims and took the suspect into custody. One victim was pronounced dead at the scene from gunshot wounds and another was transported by medical units and expected to recover. Suspect and victims knew each other and lived in the residence.
- Suspect robbed a family at rifle-point. The suspect was arrested in Federal Way. The suspect is a 3 strike candidate and has a long history of robbery in and around Lakewood.
- Crimes Against Person has been steadily rising since 3Q2018 with both Aggravated Assaults and Simple Assaults driving the rise. Approximately 60% of all assaults were domestic violence related (up from approximately 50% the previous quarter).
- Second quarter 2019 Lakewood Adult Family Homes seems to be developing a loose trend within the 99
 businesses with Woodville B sitting at the top of both 2Q19 and YTD19 lists at 14 and 19 respectively. Having
 said that, 13 of the 19 CFS for Woodville B were FIRE (medical calls). There were some missing persons
 reported (all returned) but low incidents of violence or persons crimes.
- We saw a notable rise in incidents of graffiti (vandalism) this quarter. On June 25th our bike team was out and contacted two adult males (ages 18 and 27) writing on the table at the skate park. They identified their drawings as being related to several incidents around the city and were arrested. We will evaluate next quarter to see if there is a subsequent decline.
