SUBJECT: Gimhae Thank you videos

**BACKGROUND**: In August, the City received a donation of 10,000 KF94 masks and 1,000 sets of personal protection equipment (PPE), from the city of Gimhae, South Korea. Gimhae and Lakewood have shared Friendship Cities status since 2006. The masks and PPE were donated by Gimhae as an act of support, collaboration and friendship between the two cities.

The City distributed a majority of the 5,000 KF94 masks to community partners, including:

The City also provided WPFR with 300 PPE sets.



### **CALL TO ORDER**

Mayor Anderson called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

### **ROLL CALL**

<u>Councilmembers Present</u>: 7 – Mayor Anderson, Deputy Mayor Jason Whalen; Councilmembers Mary Moss, Mike Brandstetter, John Simpson, Linda Farmer and Paul Bocchi.

Councilmember Bocchi arrived at 7:01 p.m.

#### PROCLAMATIONS AND PRESENTATIONS

Proclamation declaring September 11, 2020 as Patriot Day and Day of Remembrance. – *Police Chief Zaro, Lakewood Police Department and Chief Jim Sharp, West Pierce Fire and Rescue* 

MAYOR ANDERSON PRESENTED A PROCLAMATION DECLARING SEPTEMBER 11, 2020 AS PATRIOT DAY AND DAY OF REMEMBRANCE TO POLICE CHIEF MIKE ZARO, LAKEWOOD POLICE DEPARTMENT AND FIRE CHIEF JIM SHARP, WEST PIERCE FIRE AND RESCUE.

### **Clover Park School District Report.**

Clover Park School District (CPSD) Boardmember Anthony Veliz reported that school started virtually this year; each student received a computer and is primarily using the Microsoft Teams platform. He shared that virtual learning resources are available on the districts website and meals continue to be provided weekdays at schools and various sites throughout the community. He shared that CPSD is working towards moving elementary students to a hybrid model, which may take place towards the end of September. He then highlighted administrative staff changes and noted that late start Wednesdays will begin on September 23<sup>rd</sup> and CPSD Board meetings will be held on September 14<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> starting at 6:00 p.m. Discussion ensued.

### **PUBLIC COMMENTS**

Speaking before Council were:

Dennis Haugen, Sioux Falls, South Dakota resident, spoke about rioting, looting and protesting that has taken place in Washington cities and voting out those in public office who support these actions.

Charles Ames, Lakewood resident, commented that it should be standard for Councilmembers to call in and attend meetings rather than be absent.

Craig Chambers, Lakewood resident, spoke in opposition to proposed code amendments that would limit or ban fireworks.

Laura Burt, Lakewood resident, spoke about increasing police response and regulation related to fireworks that are discharged outside of the allowed days due to the disruption they cause within neighborhoods.

Amelia Escobedo, Lakewood resident, spoke in opposition to proposed code amendments related to fireworks and in support of the current law. She also spoke about police use of force arrests, addressing systemic racism and accountability of the Lakewood Police Department.

COUNCILMEMBER MOSS MOVED TO ADOPT THE CONSENT AGENDA AS PRESENTED. SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER FARMER. VOICE VOTE WAS TAKEN AND CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

### REGULAR AGENDA

#### **PUBLIC HEARINGS AND APPEALS**

This is the date set for a public hearing regarding proposed code amendments related to fireworks.

Public Comments were included on page 181 through page 376 of the City Council agenda packet of September 8, 2020. In addition, the following individuals provided comments which were provided to the City Council electronically in advance of the meeting: Sean Clonch, F. Leroy Reed, Malcolm Russell and Ruth Ann Russell.

There being no further public testimony, the public hearing was declared closed at 8:15 p.m.

Discussion ensued and the City Council requested two Ordinance's come forward for consideration at the regular meeting of September 21<sup>st</sup>, one option to restrict the discharge of fireworks to July 4<sup>th</sup> and December 31<sup>st</sup> only and a second option which will result in a complete ban on the discharge of fireworks in the city.

Resolution No. 2020-13 Declaring the intent of the Lakewood City Council to affirm the Downtown Subarea Plan, Development Code and Planned Action as adopted in Ordinance 695 and Ordinance 696

DEPUTY MAYOR WHALEN MOVED ADOPT RESOLUTION NO. 2020-13. SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER BOCCHI. VOICE VOTE WAS TAKEN AND CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

#### **UNFINISHED BUSINESS**

### **NEW BUSINESS**

### Discussion regarding Coronavirus Relief Funding (CRF) allocations.

Mayor Anderson shared that the City has been allocated an additional \$895,000 in Coronavirus Relief Funds from Washington State Department of Commerce.

Planning Manager Speir then provided an update allocations to date and provided options for allocating the additional funding. She shared that options to consider for the additional allocations include direct costs incurred by the city such as payroll, facility improvements and personal protective equipment and distribution of additional funds to entities for rental assistance or small business relief.

Discussion ensued and it is recommended that funding be allocated for commercial rental assistance, non-profits that may provide locations for students to access WiFi or technology, childcare providers, city personnel costs, and to small businesses who did not get selected in the initial lottery. A summary of this direction will come forward for City Council review on September 14<sup>th</sup>.

### REPORTS BY THE CITY MANAGER

### Information Technology Strategic Plan Update.

Chief Information Officer White provided an overview of current information technology projects.

\*\*\*\*\*

City Manager Caulfield recognized Assistant Police Chief John Unfred and several Police Officer's including the Unmanned Ariel Unit for their work as they were dispatched to help with the fire response and evacuating several neighborhoods due to the fires in Sumner and Bonney Lake.

He shared that the state legislature has extended the Open Public Meeting Act (OPMA) waiver through October 1<sup>st</sup> therefore the Council meetings will continue virtually and a Proclamation recognizing the City of Gimhae, South Korea for their donation of masks and Personal Protective Equipment will be presented at the City Council meeting on September 21<sup>st</sup>.

He then shared that the Spring Community Clean-Up event has been rescheduled for Saturday, September 26<sup>th</sup> from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

He noted that the city's website now includes a landing page dedicated to lake front street ends and a link to Parks and Recreation Advisory Board report. It is anticipated that a request to update the report will come forward in the 2021-22 budget.

He then shared that Assistant City Manager for Administrative Services Kraus will provide a financial report at the September 14<sup>th</sup> study session. He noted that overall the General Fund revenues are under budget projections by \$540,000 which were impacted due to a decrease in gambling tax, admissions tax, parks & recreation fees although action strategies to address the shortfalls, such as eliminating discretionary spending, that have been put in place are working.

He then provided an update on the I-5 JBLM Corridor Improvement Project noting that WSDOT is proposing no longer adding a fourth general purpose lane but an HOV island instead and Representative Jake Fey is proposing to add HOV lanes on I-5 from 38<sup>th</sup> Street through Thorne Lane.

He shared that Sound Transit is considering schedule changes to projects based on COVID-19 impacts and more information will be provided to the City Council as it becomes available.

The Mayor and City Councilmembers expressed their thanks to the City of Gimhae, South Korea for their generous donation of masks and personal protective equipment.

#### **CALL TO ORDER**

Mayor Anderson called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

### **ROLL CALL**

<u>Councilmembers Present</u>: 7 – Mayor Don Anderson; Deputy Mayor Jason Whalen; Councilmembers Mary Moss, Mike Brandstetter, John Simpson, Linda Farmer and Paul Bocchi.

Deputy Mayor Whalen arrived at 7:14 p.m.

<u>Landmarks and Heritage Advisory Board Members Present</u>: 3 – Chair Speith, Joan Cooley and Beth Campbell.

### **ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION:**

### Joint Landmarks and Heritage Advisory Board meeting.

Chair Speith and Ms. Campbell highlighted the boards 2020 workplan items which include a historic streets recognition program, historic walking tours, and coordination with the Clover Park School District to incorporate a local history academic program and pop up museum at schools. The board is also working to engage the Youth Council and is actively recruiting new members.

### Review of 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter (2020) Financial Report.

Assistant City Manager for Administrative Services Kraus provided an overview of activity in all funds through June 30, 2020. Discussion ensued related to Real Estate Excise Tax (REET), revenues, and Police Department performance measures.

### **Prosecution Services Update.**

Assistant City Attorney Johnson provided an overview of prosecution services to date. Discussion ensued related to the decline in revenues for fines, restitution, options for work crew or public service in lieu of jail time and grant funding from the Office of Crime Victims STOP violence grant program.

### Review of Coronavirus Relief Funding (CRF) allocations.

Planning Manager Speir reported that an additional \$895,050 from the Washington State Department of Commerce in Coronavirus Relief Funds (CRF) has been allocated to the City. She provided a summary of proposed distributions, which would provide additional funding for small business assistance, rental assistance for commercial landlords, childcare services, city payroll, facilities and personal protective equipment. Discussion ensued related to allocations and the ability for the City to distribute funds prior to the deadline of November 30<sup>th</sup>.

City Manager Caulfield also reported that the City received an additional \$450,000 in CARES Act funding for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program.

#### REPORTS BY THE CITY MANAGER

City Manager Caulfield shared that Veterans Drive and Onyx Drive projects are progressing and it is anticipated that both projects will be completed by the end of 2020. He then shared that the Harry Todd Waterfront Restoration work kicked off this week, as did the Angle Lane South improvements and construction of restroom and kitchen at the Fort Steilacoom Park Pavilion will begin within the next few weeks.

He shared that after a successful season with increased participation and sales due to the location and time change, the Farmers Market will be extended into October, weather permitting, as several of the vendors have expressed interest in continuing.

He then shared that in 2020 the State Legislature enacted Engrossed Substitute House Bill (ESHB) 1754 related to limiting the ability of cities and counties to regulate homeless encampments operated by religious organizations. It is proposed that the ESSB 1754 text be hyperlinked into Lakewood Municipal Code Title 18A, under its own chapter rather than attempting to modify the legislation into the current code. The Planning Commission will begin review of the proposed amendments this fall followed by a recommendation to the City Council.

He shared that the Sound Transit Executive Committee met today and announced that given the economic impacts of COVID-19, Sound Transit is looking to pause a number of projects throughout their service area until 2021. This recommendation includes the South Tacoma and Lakewood Station parking improvements and the Sounder Maintenance facility project, the City is preparing a letter expressing concerns and requesting these projects not be paused.

He then shared that WSDOT has scheduled a meeting this week to continue discussions related to the I-5 JBLM Shared Use Path, which is part of the I-5 JBLM Corridor Improvement Project.

#### CITY COUNCIL COMMENTS

Councilmember Bocchi shared that the Youth Council had their first meeting of the school year this evening noting that Black Lives Matter, social justice and youth mental health were the top issues that the students expressed an interest in addressing this year.

Councilmember Farmer shared that she provided remarks at the Clover Park School District board meeting this evening, this week she will attend the Association of Washington Cities (AWC) Large City Advisory Committee and a Diversity Training hosted the National League of Cities.

Councilmember Moss shared that she attended the Lakewood's Promise Advisory Board virtual meeting where they reviewed the boards 2020 work plan in advance of the joint meeting with the City Council scheduled for October 28<sup>th</sup>. She commented on a Community Garden ribbon-cutting event that she attended.

Deputy Mayor Whalen shared that last week he attended a ribbon-cutting event for a Community Garden that was created by residents in the community.

Mayor Anderson shared that he attended Puget Sound Regional Council Transportation Policy Board meeting and noted that the draft Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP) has been released and will be considered by the Board for adoption in October.

<u><b>DISCUSSION</b></u> : The identified property is the third and final property necessary to complete this side of Springbrook Park between the existing parking lots, surrounding streets and Clover Creek. The other two properties have been cleared leaving this single developed lot in the middle of the block surrounded by park. The City will be enhancing the recently purchased property to accommodate anticipated population growth in this area as well as restoring areas in and around Clover Creek.					
Since 2001 the City has purchased parcels in the Springbrook neighborhood and leveraged resources to create a neighborhood park, Springbrook Park. This area of the City is located in a geographically isolated area with no public gathering spaces. According to the city's parks and recreation master plan, the area is underserved by park land and local residents are ecomonically challenged. The current 6.5 acre park has become the central gathering place for the neighborhood and because of the many partnerships, has helped create a new and vibrant sense of community in this area.					
On June 15, 2020 the City Council authorized the condemnation of the referenced property. Execution of the necessary documents allows the City to acquire this property without further litigation.					
<u>ALTERNATIVE(S)</u> : The City could choose to continue with eminent domain, adding to the acquisition cost the cost of further litigation.					
<b>FISCAL IMPACT:</b> Approximately \$184,000 from the City's Parks CIP, exclusive of acquisition services.

In order to fully understand how this compromise was reached we need to first understand what was valued and why, as well as what additional benefits the property owner would be entitled to, as well as the overall benefit this has for the City by completing the land acquisitions for this park.

First it should be noted that the 2020 tax valuation for the property totals \$146,300. This consists of \$91,300 for the land and \$55,000 for the structures. Therefore the amount offered for the land and buildings totaling \$149,000 is very consistent with the valuation of the assessor, being less than a 5% differential. While assessed valuations are not a perfect measure of market value, the values are often relied upon in making initial offers.

Second, the original estimate of value of the City's appraiser completed in February 2020 determined the total value of land and buildings to be \$152,000. This was slightly higher than the assessed value but consistent with the value determined by the assessor and deemed credible. Although the appraisal of February of 2020 was clearly justifiable, it was revised to be consistent with the stated position of the property owner that the storage building was personal property that he intended to move, in spite of the fact that it would ordinarily be characterized as part of the realty. Characterizing the storage building as personal property reduced the overall value of the property to \$99,000 which served as the basis for the initial offer. However, shortly after making the initial offer the property owner upon the advice of a friend realized that characterizing the storage unit as personal property was not financially sound, nor was it consistent with appropriate legal standards. Accordingly, the property owners initial counter offer was \$260,900, just under \$110,000 higher than the initial appraisal. However, the counter offer did not address relocation assistance which must be paid separately from just compensation unless waived.

Although the appraisal clearly justified payment for the entire purchase of the land and realty, it did not address the City's liability for payment of relocation assistance, including but not limited to actual move costs, advisory services and purchase price differential. Although a formal relocation plan was not developed early estimates suggested relocation costs could run up to approximately \$20,000 due to the number of vehicles, unknown contents in the storage unit, etc. However, due to escalating real estate prices in Pierce County and lack of inventory following the initial COVID19 shutdown, we were advised following the initial offer being made, that the purchase price differential could be significant and would likely exceed the original relocation cost estimate. In this instance however, the property owner did not wish to engage in the relocation process which is a reimbursement program, instead choosing to negotiate for greater purchase price and waiving any claim for relocation assistance.

Considering that the matter has been settled essentially outside of litigation, saving what could be significant legal fees in dealing with a pro se Respondent, that all claims for relocation assistance has been waived, and the final settlement is approximately within Twenty percent of both the assessed and appraised values for the property, this is a justifiable settlement. The acquisition also completes the land acquisitions for the park fulfilling a promise to the citizens of Lakewood and removes what has been an eyesore in the neighborhood and the subject of numerous code enforcement actions.



AN ORDINANCE of the City Council of the City of Lakewood, Washington, amending Chapter 8.68 of the Lakewood Municipal Code relating to fireworks.

WHEREAS, the City Council recognizes the potential safety hazards inherent in the use of fireworks; and

WHEREAS, the City recognizes that it is in the best interest of the citizens of Lakewood to limit the hours in which fireworks may be discharged; and

WHEREAS, it is desirable to bring the Lakewood Municipal Code in closer alignment with provisions of the RCW 70.77 State Fireworks Law;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LAKEWOOD, WASHINGTON, DO ORDAIN as Follows:

Section 1. That Chapter 8.68 of the Lakewood Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

#### **8.68.010 Definitions.**

The words and phrases herein used for the purposes of this chapter shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section, except in those instances where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

"Common Consumer fireworks" includes only such fireworks that have been defined in RCW 70.77.136 or WAC 212-17-035.

"Dangerous fireworks" includes all fireworks which do not meet the common fireworks definition under RCW 70.77.136. or WAC 212 17 035.

"Fireworks stands" includes all displays and locations where fireworks are displayed in connection with sale of fireworks, offered for sale or are stored. Fireworks stands includes temporary fireworks stands as well as permanent structures where fireworks are offered for sale or are stored.

"Person" includes any individual, firm, partnership, joint venture, association, corporation, estate, trust, receiver, syndicate or any other group or combination acting as a unit.

"Public display of fireworks" means an entertainment feature where the public is admitted or

permitted to view the display or discharge of dangerous fireworks.

"Sale at retail" includes any sale or transfer, including contracts or orders for sales or transfers, wherein any person at a fixed location or a place of business sells, transfers or gives fireworks to a consumer or user.

"Sale at wholesale" includes a sale or transfer to a retailer or any other person for resale, and which also includes any sale or transfer of fireworks to a permittee of a public display of fireworks. [Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

## 8.68.020 General provisions.

Each of the following are hereby declared to be unlawful within the City:

- A. For any person to offer for sale, at retail or wholesale, or to sell, at retail or wholesale, any fireworks without having first obtained a permit or license to do so;
- B. For any person to possess, use or explode any dangerous fireworks or any fireworks other than those listed as being able to be sold to the public in WAC <u>212-17-198</u>, except as specifically provided for public displays in this chapter;
- <u>CB</u>. For any person to sell<del>, possess, use or explode any</del> fireworks except as provided in this chapter;
- **DC**. For any person to sell, at retail or wholesale, or offer for sale, at retail or wholesale, any fireworks to be sold within the City except from 12:00 noon on June 28th through 11:00 p.m. on July 4th. Fireworks may not be sold between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 9:00 a.m. from June 28th through July 3rd.
- <u>ED</u>. For any person to use, discharge or explode any fireworks. in a negligent or reckless manner or during a period other than from 11:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. from July 3rd through July 5th of any year and from 11:00 p.m. December 31st to 1:00 a.m. January 1st.
- 1. For purposes of this section, "negligent manner" means in a manner which endangers or is likely to endanger persons, animals or property.
- 2. "Reckless manner" means in a manner with willful and wanton disregard for the safety of persons, animals or property.
- FE. For any person to sell, at retail or wholesale, or to offer for sale, at retail or wholesale, fireworks to any person under the age of 16 years of age. It shall be the responsibility of any seller of fireworks to obtain and/or require proof of age of any customer at the time of purchase, which proof requirement may be satisfied by inspecting the customer's valid Washington State photo driver's license or valid Washington State photo identification card or the equivalent thereof issued by another state or jurisdiction.
- GF. For any person under the age of 16 years of age to possess or to discharge any fireworks within the City without direct supervision of his/her parent or guardian.
- **HG**. In addition, it shall be unlawful for any person to use, discharge or explode any type of firework in any manner on any school grounds or park located within the City of Lakewood or in

any City rights-of-way. [Ord. 564 § 4, 2013; Ord. 416 § 1, 2006; Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

## 8.68.030 Sales application – Permit.

An application for a permit to offer for sale, at retail or wholesale, or to sell, at retail or wholesale, any fireworks within the City shall be made at the offices of the Fire Marshal for the City on or before June 10th of the year for which the permit is desired. Such a permit shall be issued only upon the following minimum conditions and requirements:

- A. The application shall be filed with and accompanied by a permit fee of \$100.00.
- B. Approval of the permit by the City Manager or designee, subsequent to an investigation by the City's Fire Marshal or designee.
- C. The application shall have a valid license issued by the state authorizing the holder thereof to engage in the business of sale of fireworks.
- D. If the applicant does not own or have the right to possess a temporary fireworks stand complying with the standards required for temporary fireworks stands, then the applicant shall have as a place for the sale of fireworks a building which is of fireproof construction and with proper firefighting equipment located therein, as approved by the City's Fire Marshal or his designee. In all cases, the placing of fireworks for display in the fireworks stand or place of sale shall be in such a manner as to be beyond the reach of customers.
- E. The applicant shall procure and maintain a policy or policies of public liability and property damage insurance with a company or companies acceptable to the City Attorney in the following amounts: \$100,000 or more for injuries to any one person in any one accident or occurrence; \$200,000 or more for injuries to two or more persons in any one act or occurrence; \$50,000 or more for damage to property in any one accident or occurrence. The City shall be named as an additional insured in each policy providing coverage in connection with the manufacture, importation, exportation, regulation, possession, sale, use and/or discharge of fireworks.
- F. The permittee's location or place business, if a temporary fireworks stand, shall be only in those areas or zones within the City which have been approved by the Fire Marshal of the City or designee. The permittee's location or place of business, if the fireworks stand or display is located within a permanent structure, shall be only in those zones within the City in which commercial businesses may be located.
- G. The applicant shall post with the City Clerk a performance bond or cash bond in the amount of not less than \$50.00, subject to the following conditions: The deposit shall be returned to the applicant only if the applicant promptly removes the temporary fireworks stand and cleans the area of its location to the satisfaction of the Fire Marshal or his designee, or, in the case of a fireworks stand being located within a permanent structure, if the applicant promptly cleans the area of its location to the satisfaction of the Fire Marshall or his designee. In the event that the applicant fails to do so, the performance bond or cash deposit shall be forfeited to the City. In no event shall the applicant be entitled to the return of the performance bond or the cash deposited if he/she fails to complete the above described work by July 15th of any year. [Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

#### 8.68.040 Fireworks stands.

Fireworks stands shall conform to the requirements of Chapter <u>212-17</u> WAC and the following minimum standards, conditions and requirements:

- A. All fireworks stands shall be inspected and approved by the City's Fire Marshal or designee. Temporary fireworks stands need not comply with all of the provisions of the City's Building Code; provided, however, that all such temporary fireworks stands shall be erected under the supervision of the City's Fire Marshal or designee, or in accordance with the specified standards of the City's Fire Marshal or designee, including but not limited to the requirement that all temporary fireworks stands be constructed in a safe manner for both persons selling fireworks at the temporary fireworks stand and for potential customers of the temporary fireworks stand. In the event any fireworks stand is wired for and connected to electric power, then the wiring shall be approved by the City's Fire Marshal or the Electrical Inspector or their designee to ensure compliance with Article 502-2(a), Class II, Div. I of the N.E.C. or successor regulations.
- B. No temporary fireworks stand shall be located within 50 feet of any other building or structure constructed entirely or partially of combustible materials or with unprotected openings, nor within 20 feet of any building or structure constructed entirely of noncombustible materials; nor within 100 feet of any gas station, oil storage tank or premises where flammable liquids are kept or stored.
- C. Each fireworks stand must have at least two exits; which shall be unobstructed at all times.
- D. Each fireworks stand shall have in readily accessible places two or more extinguishers approved by the City's Fire Marshal or designee, and a two-gallon pail of water.
- E. All weeds, grass and combustible materials shall be cleared from the location of a fireworks stand and the surrounding area, a distance of not less than 20 feet measured from the exterior walls on each side of the fireworks stand.
- F. No smoking shall be permitted in or near a fireworks stand and fireworks stands shall be posted with "No Smoking" signs with letters at least two inches in height, in conspicuous places on all four sides of the fireworks stand. Each temporary fireworks stand or fireworks display within a permanent structure where fireworks are displayed and offered for sale shall have at least one adult in attendance at all times during which fireworks are available for sale.
- G. All unsold stock and accompanying litter shall be removed from the vicinity of the fireworks stand by 12:00 noon on July 5th of any year, and shall be stored and/or disposed of as provided in Chapter 212-17 WAC.
- H. There shall be no discharging or igniting of fireworks within 100 feet of any fireworks stand.
- I. No fireworks stand shall be located within 10 feet of a public sidewalk or street.
- J. There shall be no sleeping in any fireworks stands, nor within any structure where fireworks are stored.
- K. There shall be no matches, lighters, pressurized or nonpressurized propane, kerosene, gas, fuel oil lanterns, or similar devices, or other open flame devices stored, nor offered for sale in any fireworks stand, nor within any structure where fireworks are stored.

In the event that there are any conflicts between the provisions hereof and the provisions of

Chapter 212-17 WAC, the more restrictive of the two shall control. [Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

## 8.68.050 Public displays of fireworks.

- A. Application for Permits for Public Displays of Fireworks. Any person desiring to give or make a display of fireworks within the City shall, not less than 10 days in advance of the proposed display, make an application for a permit to operate the public display, in writing, to the City Manager or designee. The application shall set forth the following information:
- 1. The name of the organization sponsoring the display, together with the names and addresses of persons actually in charge of the firing/presentation of the display;
- 2. The date and time of day at which the display is to be held;
- 3. The exact location planned for the display;
- 4. A description setting forth the age and experience of the persons who are to do the actual discharging of the fireworks, and copies of their public display permit issued pursuant to RCW 70.77.280 or comparable applicable statute;
- 5. The number, type and description of fireworks to be discharged;
- 6. The manner and place of storage of such fireworks prior to the display; and
- 7. A diagram of the grounds on which the display is to be held showing the point at which the fireworks are to be discharged, the location of all buildings, highways and other lines of transit or communication as well as telephone, electric and other utility lines and poles and any other structures, facilities or objects which could present overhead obstructions, located within 500 feet of the point of discharge.
- B. Fee for Public Display Permit. There shall be no permit fee for a public display permit other than the license required by the State Fire Marshal.
- C. Investigation on Site Certificate of Compliance by City's Fire Marshal Notice of Approval by City's Fire Marshal or Designee. Upon receipt of such application, at least 20 days in advance of the date set for the display, the City's Fire Marshal or designee shall make an investigation of the site of the proposed display for the purpose of determining whether the provisions of these regulations are complied with in the case of the particular display. If the City's Fire Marshal or designee is satisfied that the display is lawful and there has or will be full compliance with all applicable laws, state and local, then the City's Fire Marshal or designee shall issue a written recommendation for or against the permit which shall be kept on file in the City's Fire Marshal's or designee's office and available for review by authorized reviewing agencies. If the City's Fire Marshal or designee finds that the permit applicant has complied with all applicable laws, then the City's Fire Marshal or designee may issue a certificate of compliance stating an endorsement of the display as being in conformance with all applicable laws and with these regulations. For any scheduled public display, applicants must submit such information as is deemed appropriate by the City's law enforcement agency to ensure that adequate traffic control and crowd protection policing and any other measures necessary or appropriate for public safety have been arranged either through private security agencies or through a contract with a law enforcement agency and/or with commissioned law enforcement

officers of the agency. A written notice that the applicant has complied with these requirements shall be issued by the City's Police Chief before a public display permit is issued; provided, that if the applicant should contract for traffic control and crowd protection policing with the City, for use of its law enforcement officers, in no event shall the sum agreed upon as payment for such policing be less than the actual expenses incurred by the City for providing such services. Such consideration shall be calculated in terms of personnel resources at the hourly rate for overtime under current collective bargaining agreements and/or rates of pay, plus that percentage which is paid by the public agency for fringe benefits, whichever applies, and all such sums paid under the contract shall be paid in accordance with procedures specified by the City's Fire Marshal.

- D. Every public display of fireworks shall be handled by at least two competent operators approved by the City's Fire Marshal or designee, and every public display of fireworks shall be of such character, and so located, discharged or fired that, in the opinion of the City's Fire Marshal or designee, after proper investigation, it would not constitute a hazard to property or endanger any person.
- E. A state pyrotechnics license is required for at least one operator at each public display of fireworks. The state licensed operator shall be the person who actually discharges or ignites the fireworks.
- F. A bond or certificate of insurance must be furnished to the City Manager or designee before a permit is issued. The bond shall be in the amount of \$1,000,000 and shall be conditioned upon the applicant's payment of all damages to persons and property resulting from or caused by any public display of fireworks, or by any negligence on the part of the applicant or its agents, servants, employees or subcontractors in the presentation of the display. The certificate of insurance shall evidence a comprehensive general liability (including automobile coverage) insurance policy providing limits of \$1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence and annual aggregate, naming the City of Lakewood as an additional insured. Any such bond or insurance policy must be approved by the City Attorney.
- G. A cash deposit in the amount of \$500.00 must be posted with the City Manager or designee at least 30 days in advance of the public display date to provide for the costs of site cleanup. The deposit shall be forfeited to the City if the operator fails to perform such cleanup within six days of the public display. If the operator properly performs the cleanup, the deposit shall be returned to the operator.

#### H. Storage.

- 1. As soon as the fireworks have been delivered to the display site, they shall be attended and shall remain dry.
- 2. All shells shall be inspected upon delivery to the display site by the display operator. Any shells having tears, leaks, broken fuses or showing signs of having been wet shall be set aside and shall not be fired. After the display, any such shells shall be either returned to the supplier or destroyed according to the supplier's instructions.
- 3. All fireworks at the firing site must be stored in ready boxes (substantially constructed wood magazines). During the display, magazines must be 25 feet upwind (in relation to the firing item)

from the nearest mortar. Magazine lids must be open in the opposite direction of the firing. All ready boxes are to be protected by a flameproof water repellent canvas cover until emptied.

- 4. The shell storage area shall be located at a minimum distance of not less than 25 feet from the discharge site.
- 5. During the display, shells shall be stored upwind from the discharge site. If the winds shift during the display, the shell storage area shall be relocated to be upwind from the discharge site.
- 6. There shall be at least two 2A-rated fire extinguishers (two and one-half gallons water), UL approved kept as widely separated as possible within the actual area where the discharging will occur.
- I. Preparation of Site Crowd Control.
- 1. All dry grass, weeds and other combustible waste within 50 feet of the firing site shall be removed.
- 2. The site shall be located so that the trajectory of shells shall not come within 50 feet of any overhead object including but not limited to aboveground telephone, telegraph or electric lines, trees or wooded areas.
- 3. Discharged fireworks shall not come within 100 feet of any tent or canvas shelter.
- 4. The firing and storage site shall be located not less than 200 feet from any building, public highway or railroad or other means of travel.
- 5. No boats shall be allowed within 200 feet of the firing or storage site.
- 6. The operators shall provide sufficient personnel to assure that no unauthorized persons are allowed within 200 feet of the firing and storage site. This requirement shall be in effect from one-half hour prior to the arrival of fireworks until the fireworks debris, equipment and fireworks have been removed from the site.
- 7. Spectators shall be restrained behind lines or barriers at least 200 feet from the firing and storage locations.
- J. Installation of Mortars.
- 1. Mortars shall be inspected by the operators for dents, bent ends, and cracked or broken plugs prior to ground placement. Mortars found to be defective in any way shall not be used. Any scale on the inside surface of the mortars shall be removed.
- 2. Mortars shall be positioned so that the shells are carried away from spectators and buildings. When fired over water, mortars shall be installed at an angle of not less than 10 degrees, pointed towards the water.
- 3. Mortars shall be either buried securely into the ground to a depth of two-thirds to three-fourths of their length or fastened securely in mortar boxes or drums. In soft ground, heavy timber or rock slabs shall be placed beneath the mortars to prevent their sinking or being driven into the ground during firing.
- 4. In damp ground, a weather-resistant bag should be placed under the bottom of the mortar prior to placement in the ground to protect the mortar against moisture.
- 5. Weather-resistant bags shall be placed over the open end of the mortar in damp weather to keep moisture from accumulating inside the surface of the mortar.

- K. Operation of the Display.
- 1. The operators shall provide fire protection at the site as required by the City's Fire Marshal or designee.
- 2. Only permitted fireworks are authorized for use.
- 3. When display is fired from a barge or vessel, a secured area shall be established around the barge or vessel to prevent boats from entering the fallout area. No boats shall be allowed within 200 feet of the firing or storage site. A boat shall be on standby to remove personnel from the barge and otherwise respond in the case of an emergency. Additional fire extinguishers, rated 2A minimum, shall be on the barge and so spaced that an extinguisher shall be available at all times.
- 4. If, in the opinion of the City's Fire Marshal or designee or authorized representative, lack of crowd control should pose a danger, the display shall be immediately discontinued until such time as the situation is corrected.
- 5. If at any time high winds or unusually wet weather prevail such that in the opinion of the City's Fire Marshal or designee or authorized representative of the display operators, a definite fire danger exists, the public display shall be discontinued or postponed until weather conditions improve so as to permit safe discharge of fireworks.
- 6. Light snow or mist need not cause cancellation of the display; however, all materials used in the display shall be protected from the weather until immediately prior to use.
- 7. Display operators and assistants shall use only flashlights or approved electrical lighting for artificial illumination.
- 8. No smoking or open flames shall be allowed within 50 feet of the firing or storage area so long as shells are present. Signs to this effect shall be conspicuously posted.
- 9. The first shell fired shall be carefully observed to determine that its trajectory will carry it into the intended firing range and that the shell functions are over and any debris falls into the planned landing area.
- 10. Mortars shall be re-angled or reset if necessary at any time during the display to properly adjust the trajectory or landing area.
- 11. When a shell fails to ignite in the mortar, the mortar shall not be touched for a minimum of five minutes. After five minutes it shall be carefully flooded with water. Immediately following the display, the mortar shall be emptied into a bucket of water. The supplier shall be contacted as soon as possible for proper disposal instructions.
- 12. Operators shall not attempt to repair a damaged shell nor shall they attempt to dismantle a dry shell. In all such cases, the supplier shall be contacted as soon as possible for proper disposal instructions.
- 13. Operators shall not dry a wet shell, nor shall they lance or pot a wet shell for reuse.
- 14. The entire firing range shall be inspected immediately following the display to locate any defective shells. Any such shells found shall be immediately doused with water before handling. The shells shall be placed in a bucket of water. The supplier shall then be contacted as soon as possible for proper disposal instructions.
- 15. When fireworks are displayed in darkness, the sponsor shall ensure that the firing range is

inspected early the following morning.

- 16. Any fireworks remaining unfired after the display shall be immediately disposed of or removed from the City in a safe manner.
- 17. The debris from discharged fireworks shall be disposed of in a proper manner.
- 18. The operator shall further comply with the requirements of Chapter <u>212-17</u> WAC. In the event that the requirements of Chapter <u>212-17</u> WAC are inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions hereof, the more restrictive of the two shall control.
- L. The denial by the City's Fire Marshal or designee of a permit for the public display of fireworks may be appealed to the City Council. If no such appeal is made within 60 days, the denial is final. [Ord. 416 § 1, 2006; Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

#### 8.68.060 Sale of fireworks.

The sale at retail of any fireworks other than "common fireworks" or fireworks authorized to be sold to the public in WAC <u>212-17-198</u> is prohibited; provided, however, that toy pistols, toy canes, toy guns or other similar devices, in which paper caps containing not more than 0.25 grains of explosive compound for each cap is used, may be sold at any time. The transfer of dangerous fireworks, whether by sale, at wholesale or retail, by gift or by means of conveyance, or the delivery of any fireworks to any person who does not possess a valid permit issued pursuant to LMC <u>8.68.050</u> at the time of such transfer is prohibited. All sale of fireworks from stands and locations within the City of Lakewood shall be reported as taxable events within the City of Lakewood, and the same shall be indicated on the permit issued pursuant to this chapter, so that sales tax due the City shall be properly routed. [Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

#### 8.68.070 Unclassified fireworks.

The sale, transportation, possession or discharge of fireworks not marked with manufacturer's license number and the Washington State Department of Community Trade and Economic Development's classification, as required by Chapter 70.77 RCW or Chapter 212-17 WAC, is prohibited. [Ord. 416 § 1, 2006; Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

#### **8.68.080** Exceptions.

The provisions of this chapter shall not apply to "toy sparklers" and "toy caps" containing not more than 0.25 grains of explosive compound for each cap and/or sparkler. It is further provided that nothing contained in this chapter shall be deemed to prohibit the use of any explosive or flammable compound, blasting caps and similar items used for industrial purposes, nor to prohibit the use of any blank cartridges for use by person for bona fide ceremonial services, sporting events or demonstrations. This chapter shall not be construed so as to prohibit the use of torpedoes, flares or fuses by the operators of motor vehicles or railroads, nor by other transportation agencies for signal purposes. This chapter shall also not apply to the assembling, use and display of fireworks, of whatever nature, by any persons engaged in the production of fireworks when such use and display are necessary parts of the production and such persons

possess requisite state permits to do so. This chapter shall also not apply to manufacturers, wholesalers, dealers or jobbers who possess the appropriate licenses and/or permits, from manufacturing or selling any kind of fireworks for direct shipment out of the City or out of the state, nor for manufacturing and/or selling at wholesale, any dangerous fireworks to properly licensed persons holding a valid permit for a public display of fireworks. [Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

#### 8.68.090 Violation – Penalty.

- A. Any person violating any provision of this chapter is guilty of a gross misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine in an amount not exceeding \$51,000, or by imprisonment in jail for a term not exceeding 90-364 days, or by both. In the case of a conviction for a violation of this chapter, the City's Fire Marshal or designee may order the fireworks stand closed and may deny approval of a request by the person for a fireworks license for the next year.
- B. A person is guilty of a separate offense for each separate and distinct violation of any provisions of this chapter, and a person is guilty of a separate offense for each day during which he/she commits or allows to continue a violation of any provisions of this chapter.
- C. Any fireworks which are illegally sold, offered for sale, used, discharged, possessed or transported in violation of the provisions of this chapter or of Chapter 70.77 RCW shall be subject to seizure by any police officer or by the City's Fire Marshal or his designee.
- D. For the purposes of this chapter, any person violating LMC <u>8.68.020(H)</u> in a manner not rising to the level of negligence or recklessness as defined by LMC <u>8.68.020</u> shall have committed a civil infraction. The penalty for a violation of LMC <u>8.68.020(H)</u> shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$75.00 in addition to any other costs and assessments provided by law. The City shall have the burden of proving the violation by a preponderance of the evidence. [Ord. 416 § 1, 2006; Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

#### 8.68.100 Savings.

If any portion of LMC <u>8.68.020</u> is held invalid, upon the determination of invalidity, LMC <u>8.68.020</u> shall revert to that version which existed prior to the amendment set forth in Ordinance <u>564</u> (to wit: Ordinance <u>416</u> § 1 (part), 2006). [Ord. 564 § 4, 2013.]

- Section 2. Severability. If any portion of this Ordinance or its application to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the Ordinance or the application of the provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected.
- Section 3. Effective Date. That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect thirty (30) days after publication of the Ordinance Summary.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 742

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LAKEWOOD, WASHINGTON, DO ORDAIN as Follows:

Section 1. That Chapter 8.68 of the Lakewood Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

#### **8.68.010 Definitions.**

The words and phrases herein used for the purposes of this chapter shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section, except in those instances where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

"Common Consumer fireworks" includes only such fireworks that have been defined in RCW 70.77.136 or WAC 212-17-035.

"Dangerous fireworks" includes all fireworks which do not meet the common fireworks definition under RCW 70.77.136. or WAC 212 17 035.

"Fireworks stands" includes all displays and locations where fireworks are displayed in connection with sale of fireworks, offered for sale or are stored. Fireworks stands includes temporary fireworks stands as well as permanent structures where fireworks are offered for sale or are stored.

"Person" includes any individual, firm, partnership, joint venture, association, corporation, estate, trust, receiver, syndicate or any other group or combination acting as a unit.

"Public display of fireworks" means an entertainment feature where the public is admitted or

permitted to view the display or discharge of dangerous fireworks.

"Sale at retail" includes any sale or transfer, including contracts or orders for sales or transfers, wherein any person at a fixed location or a place of business sells, transfers or gives fireworks to a consumer or user.

"Sale at wholesale" includes a sale or transfer to a retailer or any other person for resale, and which also includes any sale or transfer of fireworks to a permittee of a public display of fireworks. [Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

## 8.68.020 General provisions.

Each of the following are hereby declared to be unlawful within the City:

- A. For any person to offer for sale, at retail or wholesale, or to sell, at retail or wholesale, any fireworks without having first obtained a permit or license to do so;
- B. For any person to possess, use or explode any dangerous fireworks or any fireworks other than those listed as being able to be sold to the public in WAC <u>212-17-198</u>, except as specifically provided for public displays in this chapter;
- C. For any person to sell, possess, use or explode any fireworks except as provided in this chapter;
- D. For any person to sell, at retail or wholesale, or offer for sale, at retail or wholesale, any fireworks to be sold within the City except from 12:00 noon on June 28th through 11:00 p.m. on July 4th. Fireworks may not be sold between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 9:00 a.m. from June 28th through July 3rd.
- E. For any person to use, discharge or explode any fireworks in a negligent or reckless manner or during a period other than from 11:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. on July 4<sup>th</sup> from July 3rd through July 5th of any year and from 11:00 p.m. December 31st to 1:00 a.m. January 1st.
- 1. For purposes of this section, "negligent manner" means in a manner which endangers or is likely to endanger persons, animals or property.
- 2. "Reckless manner" means in a manner with willful and wanton disregard for the safety of persons, animals or property.
- F. For any person to sell, at retail or wholesale, or to offer for sale, at retail or wholesale, fireworks to any person under the age of 16 years of age. It shall be the responsibility of any seller of fireworks to obtain and/or require proof of age of any customer at the time of purchase, which proof requirement may be satisfied by inspecting the customer's valid Washington State photo driver's license or valid Washington State photo identification card or the equivalent thereof issued by another state or jurisdiction.
- G. For any person under the age of 16 years of age to possess or to discharge any fireworks within the City without direct supervision of his/her parent or guardian.
- H. In addition, it shall be unlawful for any person to use, discharge or explode any type of firework in any manner on any school grounds or park located within the City of Lakewood or in

any City rights-of-way. [Ord. 564 § 4, 2013; Ord. 416 § 1, 2006; Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

## 8.68.030 Sales application – Permit.

An application for a permit to offer for sale, at retail or wholesale, or to sell, at retail or wholesale, any fireworks within the City shall be made at the offices of the Fire Marshal for the City on or before June 10th of the year for which the permit is desired. Such a permit shall be issued only upon the following minimum conditions and requirements:

- A. The application shall be filed with and accompanied by a permit fee of \$100.00.
- B. Approval of the permit by the City Manager or designee, subsequent to an investigation by the City's Fire Marshal or designee.
- C. The application shall have a valid license issued by the state authorizing the holder thereof to engage in the business of sale of fireworks.
- D. If the applicant does not own or have the right to possess a temporary fireworks stand complying with the standards required for temporary fireworks stands, then the applicant shall have as a place for the sale of fireworks a building which is of fireproof construction and with proper firefighting equipment located therein, as approved by the City's Fire Marshal or his designee. In all cases, the placing of fireworks for display in the fireworks stand or place of sale shall be in such a manner as to be beyond the reach of customers.
- E. The applicant shall procure and maintain a policy or policies of public liability and property damage insurance with a company or companies acceptable to the City Attorney in the following amounts: \$100,000 or more for injuries to any one person in any one accident or occurrence; \$200,000 or more for injuries to two or more persons in any one act or occurrence; \$50,000 or more for damage to property in any one accident or occurrence. The City shall be named as an additional insured in each policy providing coverage in connection with the manufacture, importation, exportation, regulation, possession, sale, use and/or discharge of fireworks.
- F. The permittee's location or place business, if a temporary fireworks stand, shall be only in those areas or zones within the City which have been approved by the Fire Marshal of the City or designee. The permittee's location or place of business, if the fireworks stand or display is located within a permanent structure, shall be only in those zones within the City in which commercial businesses may be located.
- G. The applicant shall post with the City Clerk a performance bond or cash bond in the amount of not less than \$50.00, subject to the following conditions: The deposit shall be returned to the applicant only if the applicant promptly removes the temporary fireworks stand and cleans the area of its location to the satisfaction of the Fire Marshal or his designee, or, in the case of a fireworks stand being located within a permanent structure, if the applicant promptly cleans the area of its location to the satisfaction of the Fire Marshall or his designee. In the event that the applicant fails to do so, the performance bond or cash deposit shall be forfeited to the City. In no event shall the applicant be entitled to the return of the performance bond or the cash deposited if he/she fails to complete the above described work by July 15th of any year. [Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

#### 8.68.040 Fireworks stands.

Fireworks stands shall conform to the requirements of Chapter <u>212-17</u> WAC and the following minimum standards, conditions and requirements:

- A. All fireworks stands shall be inspected and approved by the City's Fire Marshal or designee. Temporary fireworks stands need not comply with all of the provisions of the City's Building Code; provided, however, that all such temporary fireworks stands shall be erected under the supervision of the City's Fire Marshal or designee, or in accordance with the specified standards of the City's Fire Marshal or designee, including but not limited to the requirement that all temporary fireworks stands be constructed in a safe manner for both persons selling fireworks at the temporary fireworks stand and for potential customers of the temporary fireworks stand. In the event any fireworks stand is wired for and connected to electric power, then the wiring shall be approved by the City's Fire Marshal or the Electrical Inspector or their designee to ensure compliance with Article 502-2(a), Class II, Div. I of the N.E.C. or successor regulations.
- B. No temporary fireworks stand shall be located within 50 feet of any other building or structure constructed entirely or partially of combustible materials or with unprotected openings, nor within 20 feet of any building or structure constructed entirely of noncombustible materials; nor within 100 feet of any gas station, oil storage tank or premises where flammable liquids are kept or stored.
- C. Each fireworks stand must have at least two exits; which shall be unobstructed at all times.
- D. Each fireworks stand shall have in readily accessible places two or more extinguishers approved by the City's Fire Marshal or designee, and a two-gallon pail of water.
- E. All weeds, grass and combustible materials shall be cleared from the location of a fireworks stand and the surrounding area, a distance of not less than 20 feet measured from the exterior walls on each side of the fireworks stand.
- F. No smoking shall be permitted in or near a fireworks stand and fireworks stands shall be posted with "No Smoking" signs with letters at least two inches in height, in conspicuous places on all four sides of the fireworks stand. Each temporary fireworks stand or fireworks display within a permanent structure where fireworks are displayed and offered for sale shall have at least one adult in attendance at all times during which fireworks are available for sale.
- G. All unsold stock and accompanying litter shall be removed from the vicinity of the fireworks stand by 12:00 noon on July 5th of any year, and shall be stored and/or disposed of as provided in Chapter 212-17 WAC.
- H. There shall be no discharging or igniting of fireworks within 100 feet of any fireworks stand.
- I. No fireworks stand shall be located within 10 feet of a public sidewalk or street.
- J. There shall be no sleeping in any fireworks stands, nor within any structure where fireworks are stored.
- K. There shall be no matches, lighters, pressurized or nonpressurized propane, kerosene, gas, fuel oil lanterns, or similar devices, or other open flame devices stored, nor offered for sale in any fireworks stand, nor within any structure where fireworks are stored.

In the event that there are any conflicts between the provisions hereof and the provisions of

Chapter 212-17 WAC, the more restrictive of the two shall control. [Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

## 8.68.050 Public displays of fireworks.

- A. Application for Permits for Public Displays of Fireworks. Any person desiring to give or make a display of fireworks within the City shall, not less than 10 days in advance of the proposed display, make an application for a permit to operate the public display, in writing, to the City Manager or designee. The application shall set forth the following information:
- 1. The name of the organization sponsoring the display, together with the names and addresses of persons actually in charge of the firing/presentation of the display;
- 2. The date and time of day at which the display is to be held;
- 3. The exact location planned for the display;
- 4. A description setting forth the age and experience of the persons who are to do the actual discharging of the fireworks, and copies of their public display permit issued pursuant to RCW 70.77.280 or comparable applicable statute;
- 5. The number, type and description of fireworks to be discharged;
- 6. The manner and place of storage of such fireworks prior to the display; and
- 7. A diagram of the grounds on which the display is to be held showing the point at which the fireworks are to be discharged, the location of all buildings, highways and other lines of transit or communication as well as telephone, electric and other utility lines and poles and any other structures, facilities or objects which could present overhead obstructions, located within 500 feet of the point of discharge.
- B. Fee for Public Display Permit. There shall be no permit fee for a public display permit other than the license required by the State Fire Marshal.
- C. Investigation on Site Certificate of Compliance by City's Fire Marshal Notice of Approval by City's Fire Marshal or Designee. Upon receipt of such application, at least 20 days in advance of the date set for the display, the City's Fire Marshal or designee shall make an investigation of the site of the proposed display for the purpose of determining whether the provisions of these regulations are complied with in the case of the particular display. If the City's Fire Marshal or designee is satisfied that the display is lawful and there has or will be full compliance with all applicable laws, state and local, then the City's Fire Marshal or designee shall issue a written recommendation for or against the permit which shall be kept on file in the City's Fire Marshal's or designee's office and available for review by authorized reviewing agencies. If the City's Fire Marshal or designee finds that the permit applicant has complied with all applicable laws, then the City's Fire Marshal or designee may issue a certificate of compliance stating an endorsement of the display as being in conformance with all applicable laws and with these regulations. For any scheduled public display, applicants must submit such information as is deemed appropriate by the City's law enforcement agency to ensure that adequate traffic control and crowd protection policing and any other measures necessary or appropriate for public safety have been arranged either through private security agencies or through a contract with a law enforcement agency and/or with commissioned law enforcement

officers of the agency. A written notice that the applicant has complied with these requirements shall be issued by the City's Police Chief before a public display permit is issued; provided, that if the applicant should contract for traffic control and crowd protection policing with the City, for use of its law enforcement officers, in no event shall the sum agreed upon as payment for such policing be less than the actual expenses incurred by the City for providing such services. Such consideration shall be calculated in terms of personnel resources at the hourly rate for overtime under current collective bargaining agreements and/or rates of pay, plus that percentage which is paid by the public agency for fringe benefits, whichever applies, and all such sums paid under the contract shall be paid in accordance with procedures specified by the City's Fire Marshal.

- D. Every public display of fireworks shall be handled by at least two competent operators approved by the City's Fire Marshal or designee, and every public display of fireworks shall be of such character, and so located, discharged or fired that, in the opinion of the City's Fire Marshal or designee, after proper investigation, it would not constitute a hazard to property or endanger any person.
- E. A state pyrotechnics license is required for at least one operator at each public display of fireworks. The state licensed operator shall be the person who actually discharges or ignites the fireworks.
- F. A bond or certificate of insurance must be furnished to the City Manager or designee before a permit is issued. The bond shall be in the amount of \$1,000,000 and shall be conditioned upon the applicant's payment of all damages to persons and property resulting from or caused by any public display of fireworks, or by any negligence on the part of the applicant or its agents, servants, employees or subcontractors in the presentation of the display. The certificate of insurance shall evidence a comprehensive general liability (including automobile coverage) insurance policy providing limits of \$1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence and annual aggregate, naming the City of Lakewood as an additional insured. Any such bond or insurance policy must be approved by the City Attorney.
- G. A cash deposit in the amount of \$500.00 must be posted with the City Manager or designee at least 30 days in advance of the public display date to provide for the costs of site cleanup. The deposit shall be forfeited to the City if the operator fails to perform such cleanup within six days of the public display. If the operator properly performs the cleanup, the deposit shall be returned to the operator.

#### H. Storage.

- 1. As soon as the fireworks have been delivered to the display site, they shall be attended and shall remain dry.
- 2. All shells shall be inspected upon delivery to the display site by the display operator. Any shells having tears, leaks, broken fuses or showing signs of having been wet shall be set aside and shall not be fired. After the display, any such shells shall be either returned to the supplier or destroyed according to the supplier's instructions.
- 3. All fireworks at the firing site must be stored in ready boxes (substantially constructed wood magazines). During the display, magazines must be 25 feet upwind (in relation to the firing item)

from the nearest mortar. Magazine lids must be open in the opposite direction of the firing. All ready boxes are to be protected by a flameproof water repellent canvas cover until emptied.

- 4. The shell storage area shall be located at a minimum distance of not less than 25 feet from the discharge site.
- 5. During the display, shells shall be stored upwind from the discharge site. If the winds shift during the display, the shell storage area shall be relocated to be upwind from the discharge site.
- 6. There shall be at least two 2A-rated fire extinguishers (two and one-half gallons water), UL approved kept as widely separated as possible within the actual area where the discharging will occur.
- I. Preparation of Site Crowd Control.
- 1. All dry grass, weeds and other combustible waste within 50 feet of the firing site shall be removed.
- 2. The site shall be located so that the trajectory of shells shall not come within 50 feet of any overhead object including but not limited to aboveground telephone, telegraph or electric lines, trees or wooded areas.
- 3. Discharged fireworks shall not come within 100 feet of any tent or canvas shelter.
- 4. The firing and storage site shall be located not less than 200 feet from any building, public highway or railroad or other means of travel.
- 5. No boats shall be allowed within 200 feet of the firing or storage site.
- 6. The operators shall provide sufficient personnel to assure that no unauthorized persons are allowed within 200 feet of the firing and storage site. This requirement shall be in effect from one-half hour prior to the arrival of fireworks until the fireworks debris, equipment and fireworks have been removed from the site.
- 7. Spectators shall be restrained behind lines or barriers at least 200 feet from the firing and storage locations.
- J. Installation of Mortars.
- 1. Mortars shall be inspected by the operators for dents, bent ends, and cracked or broken plugs prior to ground placement. Mortars found to be defective in any way shall not be used. Any scale on the inside surface of the mortars shall be removed.
- 2. Mortars shall be positioned so that the shells are carried away from spectators and buildings. When fired over water, mortars shall be installed at an angle of not less than 10 degrees, pointed towards the water.
- 3. Mortars shall be either buried securely into the ground to a depth of two-thirds to three-fourths of their length or fastened securely in mortar boxes or drums. In soft ground, heavy timber or rock slabs shall be placed beneath the mortars to prevent their sinking or being driven into the ground during firing.
- 4. In damp ground, a weather-resistant bag should be placed under the bottom of the mortar prior to placement in the ground to protect the mortar against moisture.
- 5. Weather-resistant bags shall be placed over the open end of the mortar in damp weather to keep moisture from accumulating inside the surface of the mortar.

- K. Operation of the Display.
- 1. The operators shall provide fire protection at the site as required by the City's Fire Marshal or designee.
- 2. Only permitted fireworks are authorized for use.
- 3. When display is fired from a barge or vessel, a secured area shall be established around the barge or vessel to prevent boats from entering the fallout area. No boats shall be allowed within 200 feet of the firing or storage site. A boat shall be on standby to remove personnel from the barge and otherwise respond in the case of an emergency. Additional fire extinguishers, rated 2A minimum, shall be on the barge and so spaced that an extinguisher shall be available at all times.
- 4. If, in the opinion of the City's Fire Marshal or designee or authorized representative, lack of crowd control should pose a danger, the display shall be immediately discontinued until such time as the situation is corrected.
- 5. If at any time high winds or unusually wet weather prevail such that in the opinion of the City's Fire Marshal or designee or authorized representative of the display operators, a definite fire danger exists, the public display shall be discontinued or postponed until weather conditions improve so as to permit safe discharge of fireworks.
- 6. Light snow or mist need not cause cancellation of the display; however, all materials used in the display shall be protected from the weather until immediately prior to use.
- 7. Display operators and assistants shall use only flashlights or approved electrical lighting for artificial illumination.
- 8. No smoking or open flames shall be allowed within 50 feet of the firing or storage area so long as shells are present. Signs to this effect shall be conspicuously posted.
- 9. The first shell fired shall be carefully observed to determine that its trajectory will carry it into the intended firing range and that the shell functions are over and any debris falls into the planned landing area.
- 10. Mortars shall be re-angled or reset if necessary at any time during the display to properly adjust the trajectory or landing area.
- 11. When a shell fails to ignite in the mortar, the mortar shall not be touched for a minimum of five minutes. After five minutes it shall be carefully flooded with water. Immediately following the display, the mortar shall be emptied into a bucket of water. The supplier shall be contacted as soon as possible for proper disposal instructions.
- 12. Operators shall not attempt to repair a damaged shell nor shall they attempt to dismantle a dry shell. In all such cases, the supplier shall be contacted as soon as possible for proper disposal instructions.
- 13. Operators shall not dry a wet shell, nor shall they lance or pot a wet shell for reuse.
- 14. The entire firing range shall be inspected immediately following the display to locate any defective shells. Any such shells found shall be immediately doused with water before handling. The shells shall be placed in a bucket of water. The supplier shall then be contacted as soon as possible for proper disposal instructions.
- 15. When fireworks are displayed in darkness, the sponsor shall ensure that the firing range is

inspected early the following morning.

- 16. Any fireworks remaining unfired after the display shall be immediately disposed of or removed from the City in a safe manner.
- 17. The debris from discharged fireworks shall be disposed of in a proper manner.
- 18. The operator shall further comply with the requirements of Chapter <u>212-17</u> WAC. In the event that the requirements of Chapter <u>212-17</u> WAC are inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions hereof, the more restrictive of the two shall control.
- L. The denial by the City's Fire Marshal or designee of a permit for the public display of fireworks may be appealed to the City Council. If no such appeal is made within 60 days, the denial is final. [Ord. 416 § 1, 2006; Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

#### 8.68.060 Sale of fireworks.

The sale at retail of any fireworks other than "common fireworks" or fireworks authorized to be sold to the public in WAC <u>212-17-198</u> is prohibited; provided, however, that toy pistols, toy canes, toy guns or other similar devices, in which paper caps containing not more than 0.25 grains of explosive compound for each cap is used, may be sold at any time. The transfer of dangerous fireworks, whether by sale, at wholesale or retail, by gift or by means of conveyance, or the delivery of any fireworks to any person who does not possess a valid permit issued pursuant to LMC <u>8.68.050</u> at the time of such transfer is prohibited. All sale of fireworks from stands and locations within the City of Lakewood shall be reported as taxable events within the City of Lakewood, and the same shall be indicated on the permit issued pursuant to this chapter, so that sales tax due the City shall be properly routed. [Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

#### 8.68.070 Unclassified fireworks.

The sale, transportation, possession or discharge of fireworks not marked with manufacturer's license number and the Washington State Department of Community Trade and Economic Development's classification, as required by Chapter 70.77 RCW or Chapter 212-17 WAC, is prohibited. [Ord. 416 § 1, 2006; Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

#### **8.68.080** Exceptions.

The provisions of this chapter shall not apply to "toy sparklers" and "toy caps" containing not more than 0.25 grains of explosive compound for each cap and/or sparkler. It is further provided that nothing contained in this chapter shall be deemed to prohibit the use of any explosive or flammable compound, blasting caps and similar items used for industrial purposes, nor to prohibit the use of any blank cartridges for use by person for bona fide ceremonial services, sporting events or demonstrations. This chapter shall not be construed so as to prohibit the use of torpedoes, flares or fuses by the operators of motor vehicles or railroads, nor by other transportation agencies for signal purposes. This chapter shall also not apply to the assembling, use and display of fireworks, of whatever nature, by any persons engaged in the production of fireworks when such use and display are necessary parts of the production and such persons

possess requisite state permits to do so. This chapter shall also not apply to manufacturers, wholesalers, dealers or jobbers who possess the appropriate licenses and/or permits, from manufacturing or selling any kind of fireworks for direct shipment out of the City or out of the state, nor for manufacturing and/or selling at wholesale, any dangerous fireworks to properly licensed persons holding a valid permit for a public display of fireworks. [Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

## 8.68.090 Violation – Penalty.

- A. Any person violating any provision of this chapter is guilty of a gross misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine in an amount not exceeding \$51,000, or by imprisonment in jail for a term not exceeding 90-364 days, or by both. In the case of a conviction for a violation of this chapter, the City's Fire Marshal or designee may order the fireworks stand closed and may deny approval of a request by the person for a fireworks license for the next year.
- B. A person is guilty of a separate offense for each separate and distinct violation of any provisions of this chapter, and a person is guilty of a separate offense for each day during which he/she commits or allows to continue a violation of any provisions of this chapter.
- C. Any fireworks which are illegally sold, offered for sale, used, discharged, possessed or transported in violation of the provisions of this chapter or of Chapter 70.77 RCW shall be subject to seizure by any police officer or by the City's Fire Marshal or his designee.
- D. For the purposes of this chapter, any person violating LMC <u>8.68.020(H)</u> in a manner not rising to the level of negligence or recklessness as defined by LMC <u>8.68.020</u> shall have committed a civil infraction. The penalty for a violation of LMC <u>8.68.020(H)</u> shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$75.00 in addition to any other costs and assessments provided by law. The City shall have the burden of proving the violation by a preponderance of the evidence. [Ord. 416 § 1, 2006; Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

#### 8.68.100 Savings.

If any portion of LMC <u>8.68.020</u> is held invalid, upon the determination of invalidity, LMC <u>8.68.020</u> shall revert to that version which existed prior to the amendment set forth in Ordinance <u>564</u> (to wit: Ordinance <u>416</u> § 1 (part), 2006). [Ord. 564 § 4, 2013.]

- Section 2. Severability. If any portion of this Ordinance or its application to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the Ordinance or the application of the provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected.
- Section 3. Effective Date. That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect thirty (30) days after publication of the Ordinance Summary.

It shall be the responsibility of any seller of fireworks to obtain and/or require proof of age of any customer at the time of purchase, which proof requirement may be satisfied by inspecting the customer's valid Washington State photo driver's license or valid Washington State photo identification card or the equivalent thereof issued by another state or jurisdiction.

G. For any person under the age of 16 years of age to possess or to discharge any fireworks within the City without direct supervision of his/her parent or guardian.

H. In addition, it shall be unlawful for any person to use, discharge or explode any type of firework in any manner on any school grounds or park located within the City of Lakewood or in any City rights of way. [Ord. 564 § 4, 2013; Ord. 416 § 1, 2006; Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

#### 8.68.030 Sales application - Permit.

An application for a permit to offer for sale, at retail or wholesale, or to sell, at retail or wholesale, any fireworks within the City shall be made at the offices of the Fire Marshal for the City on or before June 10th of the year for which the permit is desired. Such a permit shall be issued only upon the following minimum conditions and requirements:

A. The application shall be filed with and accompanied by a permit fee of \$100.00.

- B. Approval of the permit by the City Manager or designee, subsequent to an investigation by the City's Fire Marshal or designee.
- C. The application shall have a valid license issued by the state authorizing the holder thereof to engage in the business of sale of fireworks.
- D. If the applicant does not own or have the right to possess a temporary fireworks stand complying with the standards required for temporary fireworks stands, then the applicant shall have as a place for the sale of fireworks a building which is of fireproof construction and with proper firefighting equipment located therein, as approved by the City's Fire Marshal or his designee. In all cases, the placing of fireworks for display in the fireworks stand or place of sale shall be in such a manner as to be beyond the reach of customers.
- E. The applicant shall procure and maintain a policy or policies of public liability and property damage insurance with a company or companies acceptable to the City Attorney in the following amounts: \$100,000 or more for injuries to any one person in any one accident or occurrence; \$200,000 or more for injuries to two or more persons in any one act or occurrence; \$50,000 or more for damage to property in any one accident or occurrence. The City shall be named as an additional insured in each policy providing coverage in connection with the manufacture, importation, exportation, regulation, possession, sale, use and/or discharge of fireworks.
- F. The permittee's location or place business, if a temporary fireworks stand, shall be only in those areas or zones within the City which have been approved by the Fire Marshal of the City or designee. The permittee's location or place of business, if the fireworks stand or display is located within a permanent structure, shall be only in those zones within the City in which commercial businesses may be located.
- G. The applicant shall post with the City Clerk a performance bond or cash bond in the amount of not less than \$50.00, subject to the following conditions: The deposit shall be returned to the applicant only if the applicant promptly removes the temporary fireworks stand and cleans the area of its location to the satisfaction of the Fire Marshal or his designee, or, in the case of a fireworks stand being located within a permanent structure, if the applicant promptly cleans the area of its location to the satisfaction of the Fire Marshall or his designee. In the event that the applicant fails to do so, the performance bond or cash deposit shall be forfeited to the City. In no event shall the applicant be entitled to the return of the performance bond or the cash deposited if he/she fails to complete the above described work by July 15th of any year. [Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

#### 8.68.040 Fireworks stands.

Fireworks stands shall conform to the requirements of Chapter 212 17 WAC and the following

minimum standards, conditions and requirements:

A. All fireworks stands shall be inspected and approved by the City's Fire Marshal or designee. Temporary fireworks stands need not comply with all of the provisions of the City's Building Code; provided, however, that all such temporary fireworks stands shall be erected under the supervision of the City's Fire Marshal or designee, or in accordance with the specified standards of the City's Fire Marshal or designee, including but not limited to the requirement that all temporary fireworks stands be constructed in a safe manner for both persons selling fireworks at the temporary fireworks stand and for potential customers of the temporary fireworks stand. In the event any fireworks stand is wired for and connected to electric power, then the wiring shall be approved by the City's Fire Marshal or the Electrical Inspector or their designee to ensure compliance with Article 502 2(a), Class II, Div. I of the N.E.C. or successor regulations.

B. No temporary fireworks stand shall be located within 50 feet of any other building or structure constructed entirely or partially of combustible materials or with unprotected openings, nor within 20 feet of any building or structure constructed entirely of noncombustible materials; nor within 100 feet of any gas station, oil storage tank or premises where flammable liquids are kept or stored.

- C. Each fireworks stand must have at least two exits; which shall be unobstructed at all times.
- D. Each fireworks stand shall have in readily accessible places two or more extinguishers approved by the City's Fire Marshal or designee, and a two-gallon pail of water.
- E. All weeds, grass and combustible materials shall be cleared from the location of a fireworks stand and the surrounding area, a distance of not less than 20 feet measured from the exterior walls on each side of the fireworks stand.
- F. No smoking shall be permitted in or near a fireworks stand and fireworks stands shall be posted with "No Smoking" signs with letters at least two inches in height, in conspicuous places on all four sides of the fireworks stand. Each temporary fireworks stand or fireworks display within a permanent structure where fireworks are displayed and offered for sale shall have at least one adult in attendance at all times during which fireworks are available for sale.
- G. All unsold stock and accompanying litter shall be removed from the vicinity of the fireworks stand by 12:00 noon on July 5th of any year, and shall be stored and/or disposed of as provided in Chapter 212-17 WAC.
- H. There shall be no discharging or igniting of fireworks within 100 feet of any fireworks stand.
- I. No fireworks stand shall be located within 10 feet of a public sidewalk or street.
- J. There shall be no sleeping in any fireworks stands, nor within any structure where fireworks

#### are stored.

K. There shall be no matches, lighters, pressurized or nonpressurized propane, kerosene, gas, fuel oil lanterns, or similar devices, or other open flame devices stored, nor offered for sale in any fireworks stand, nor within any structure where fireworks are stored.

In the event that there are any conflicts between the provisions hereof and the provisions of Chapter 212 17 WAC, the more restrictive of the two shall control. [Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

### 8.68.060 Sale of fireworks.

The sale at retail of any fireworks other than "common fireworks" or fireworks authorized to be sold to the public in WAC 212-17-198 is prohibited; provided, however, that toy pistols, toy canes, toy guns or other similar devices, in which paper caps containing not more than 0.25 grains of explosive compound for each cap is used, may be sold at any time. The transfer of dangerous fireworks, whether by sale, at wholesale or retail, by gift or by means of conveyance, or the delivery of any fireworks to any person who does not possess a valid permit issued pursuant to LMC 8.68.050 at the time of such transfer is prohibited. All sale of fireworks from stands and locations within the City of Lakewood shall be reported as taxable events within the City of Lakewood, and the same shall be indicated on the permit issued pursuant to this chapter, so that sales tax due the City shall be properly routed. [Ord. 84 § 1, 1996.]

# To Whom It May Concern:

While I understand the argument that igniting explosive fireworks is good clean fun for Americans who celebrate the Declaration of Independence, it is a fact that many breathe our Lakewood air who lack the common-sense, courtesy, and intelligence necessary to deal with fireworks in a safe, sane and legal manner.

Last year a neighbor, acting like a goofball, came close to setting my property on fire when his party shot fireworks from the middle of a city street over our 7' fence into our fir trees with two large rockets landing on my roof. Fireworks also fell into my neighbors' property. Had this inconsiderate neighbor caught my fir trees or other abundant vegetation on fire, my home and its occupants, which are surrounded by trees and vegetation, could have burned to the ground.

Fortunately, I no longer have a combustible shake roof, but rather a standing seam metal roof. The burning fireworks created a large stain on my metal roof as it burned itself out on top of my house with us sleeping inside late at night.

Anyone of us, including several neighbors, could have been injured or killed with the burning fireworks falling from the

sky. We were held prisoners in our own homes daring not to venture outside, except quick trips to check for fire.

The offending neighbor had two guests / relatives attending his dangerous fireworks party. One was a policeman (Not Lakewood Police). The other was a fireman.

When I confronted my neighbor regarding my safety concerns, he bragged about having police and fire on the scene, and thus stated he was doing nothing illegal. He refused to stop.

Because there are ignorant, dangerous idiots mixed in with our general population, Lakewood City Council needs to do the right thing, the intelligent thing, to protect our community. Private fireworks needs to be outlawed in our city every single day of the year.

When these arson happy trouble makers attacked my house, 911-Dispatch reported to me that Lakewood Police did not have the staffing to respond to fireworks complaints. That fact forces the possibility; private citizens will arm themselves to confront stupidity to protect lives and property—what a recipe for disaster.

If our city and our police are not able or willing to solve the fireworks problem, then when under attack, some citizens may choose to fire back using illegal fireworks of their own aimed directed at the offender's home, trees, or the offender. There is a distinct possibility a victim may choose to up the ante with superior firepower. Superior firepower means the suspect brought fireworks to a gunfight.

One might quickly respond with the the thought that the victim neighbor should not stoop to the suspect's behavior to avoid becoming just as bad as the suspect. The counter to that is, Why not? The victim has to protect his family and property and the police are not going to show up for a fireworks complaint anyway.

When you think about it, this should be the responsibility of the city and our police, not untrained citizens.

In the likely event, Lakewood does not make fireworks illegal all year long then the city should fund extra police patrols to ticket offenders along with confiscating violator's fireworks for unlawful and dangerous fireworks behavior.

While my opinions are strong, my statements are based on what I saw and learned during my 25 years as a police officer going to dispatched calls just like this.

A superior way to solve a problem is to avoid the problem in the first place.

Lakewood City Council, please have the courage to do the right thing. Outlaw private fireworks in the City of Lakewood.

Dear Mayor Anderson,

I'm writing on behalf of People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) and our more than 6.5 million members and supporters worldwide, including many thousands across Washington, in response to the proposed code amendments that would ban the discharge of fireworks on July 3 and 5. We strongly urge you to adopt these fireworks limitations and also consider banning fireworks on July 4 in order to protect all of Lakewood's residents.

Traditional fireworks sound like an all-out war—not only to those suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder but also to dogs, cats, and wildlife—and their use has devastating consequences. Terrified dogs climb or dig their way out of fenced-in yards as they frantically try to escape the chaos, resulting in increased stray-animal intakes at shelters across the nation, which further strains community resources. Many arrive with bloody paws or broken bones, some are never reunited with their families, and others are doomed to a worse fate.

Fireworks produce plumes of smoke laden with particles that are harmful to the respiratory systems of humans and other animals. Birds caught in or near fireworks displays easily choke on the toxic residue. The California Coastal Commission banned the city of Gualala's display when, following a 2006 show, seabirds fled their nests, leaving their chicks vulnerable to predators. Most birds cannot see well in the dark, so this type of disruption can cause them to become injured if they inadvertently crash into power lines, cars, buildings, trees, or each other. In one case, 5,000 birds died on a New Year's Eve in Arkansas after a fireworks display caused them to take flight and crash into objects such as houses and cars.

Such tragedies are not limited to animals: Many humans have been injured in fireworks accidents, and the displays can exacerbate asthma and other respiratory problems. Veterans and others suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder are also sensitive to and can be deeply disturbed by the noise of the explosives and the smell of the gunpowder. And on average, 180 people go to emergency rooms daily with fireworks-related injuries for an entire month around July 4.

We hope you'll enact the proposed restrictions and perhaps consider extending them even further by also including a ban on igniting fireworks on July 4. Thank you for your time and consideration. We look forward to hearing from you.

I'm writing to support the new limitations being proposed. Fireworks are at best entertainment and at worst a danger to others, but they are specifically detrimental to the well being of many including:

We live in a special Lakewood neighborhood located at the end of Phillips Road, down the hill in a ravine along Chambers Creek, surrounded by heavy forests on both sides. We are 18 residences with addresses between 6711 through 7033 Phillips Rd SW, and there is only one narrow road for entering and exiting our neighborhood.

July is a dry month. Our community has major concerns about the dry woods making our area susceptible to forest fires. Our single road would make escape during a fire impossible for some people. Ten of our eighteen homes are occupied by elderly people.

The current law that legal fireworks are welcome in Lakewood presents a danger for our families on Chambers Creek. In order to prevent a potential disaster caused by fire started by illegal forms of fireworks, we would request that the Lakewood City Council consider voting for one or more of the following recommendations:

- Ban fireworks from Turquoise Rd SW and 65th Avenue West on the hills above our residences
- Provide constant police and/or fire patrol on Turquoise Rd SW and 65th Avenue West for illegal fireworks during the times fireworks are legal in Lakewood
- Ban fireworks throughout Lakewood entirely

Taking such a position would not only help us, it may save another Lakewood citizen or entity from being held responsible should their actions cause property damage, personal injuries or deaths.

My wife works for the VA and mental health. She brings home stories of her veterans blockading themselves in their homes beginning about June 20. They will put batting over windows and doors in vain of keeping the terror at bay. I have taught active duty and retired military folks for many years, and while there are many who love the excitement of blowing off fireworks, there is a significant minority who find 4 July holiday absolutely terrifying.

Last year when we returned home from our Mt. Rainier get-the-dogs-where-they-won't-be-terrified trip at 3 AM detonations continued, and the air was so thick with smoke that it set off my asthma.

Without enforcement, the current law is useless as will be the change. I have called the police to complain, but have never been convinced that there has been any response. I know that the problem is overwhelming and that enforcement would be difficult.

Knowing that we have over 6000 veterans a year committing suicide, and knowing that fireworks push people into the terror of PTS, the fact that enforcement is difficult does not seem reasonable excuse.

Last year the "pyrotechnic genius" on 116th St SW in Lakewood shot fireworks for days on end at all hours. Lacking the required skill to shoot fireworks, two of his fireballs (Roman Candles) shot over our fence and landed on our roof. These two fireworks devices were on fire when they hit our roof, creating a giant stain on our roofing material that we woke up to the next morning. Two of us could have died in our sleep.

Luckily for us, we had converted from a wood shake roof to a standing seam metal roof, so our house did not burn to the ground, nor was anyone injured or killed. We were also pleased the "fireworks genius" did not start a forest fire in the many fir trees in our neighborhood.

Remnants/trash from fireworks such as bottle rockets were scattered throughout our neighborhood, exposing at least three properties and their occupants to harm.

I was careful to be pleasant when I contacted my neighbor to share our concerns and ask him to stop the dangerous fireworks. He told me one of his guests was a policeman, and another was a fireman. They told him he could shoot all the fireworks he wanted in Lakewood.

We then called the police, but 911 claimed not to have enough staff to respond to fireworks complaints. Fireworks complaints should come as no surprise to Lakewood City Council and the Lakewood Police Department.

City Council should make sure our police department has appropriate funding for proper staffing to handle fireworks complaints, including enforcing the law and confiscating illegal fireworks. When I worked Lakewood, we had a specially dedicated law enforcement team to respond to fireworks complaints.

Lacking police protection, the City of Lakewood is promoting having its citizens take vigilante action. Vigilante action occurs when citizens deem law enforcement to be inadequate.

While I have a long history of supporting our Lakewood Police Department and will continue to do so in the future, last year the department was inadequate during the fireworks period.

Citizen anger, fireworks, and civilian guns are not a good mix. Ask yourself, "Should I let someone set my house on fire or should I fight back to defend my property?"

An adequate fireworks ordinance can prevent the devastation depicted in my photo below from occurring in the City of Lakewood if Lakewood City Council has the required backbone to do the right thing by eliminating fireworks in our city.

The ordinance should then be supported by enforcement. If the word spreads in our community that illegal use of fireworks is sure to bring consequences, then the dangerous behavior will stop.



My photo depicts the possible results of combining fireworks with a weak city ordinance and no law enforcement. One home, one motorhome, and one jeep destroyed along with the home's contents.

Families victimized by injury, death, property damage, and devastation are not likely to wish the Lakewood City Council a Happy 4th of July!

I realize our council is only considering reducing the hazardous days from 4 days to 2 days and I thank you for that. The proposed ordinance will help, so I urge you to please vote YES.

Next, I would ask that Lakewood City Council create and pass an ordinance that eliminates all fireworks every day of the year.

Ms. Schumacher and Lakewood City Council members –

As a resident of the City of Lakewood approximately 10 years, I write in strong support of your proposed amendments to Chapter 8.68 of the Lakewood Municipal Code, Fireworks. In fact, I urge you to go further and issue an outright ban of the sale and discharge of fireworks during both the 4 <sup>th</sup> of July and winter periods.

According to the Washington State Patrol, Fire Prevention Bureau <sup>1</sup>, roughly 93 cities ban the sale, discharge, or both of fireworks during both the summer and winter periods, including the cities of Fircrest, Steilacoom, Ruston, and Tacoma. Another five ban the sale and/or discharge during the summer period, and 63 ban the sale/or discharge during the winter period. Seven counties ban the sale, discharge, or both during both the July and winter periods, 1 bans the sale and/or discharge during the summer period, and 8 ban the sale and/or discharge during the winter period. Numerous other cities and counties have enacted ordinances that are more restrictive than state law. You would not be out ahead of the pack in enacting a ban, and there are many examples available to draw from regarding implementation and enforcement.

Because the other major cities within Pierce County tightly control the sale and/or discharge of fireworks, I would suppose that this increases the use of fireworks in Lakewood, with people travelling from the other cities to join with Lakewood residents. On American Lake we are surrounded by houses with fireworks parties running for several days and late into the night during the summer. Banning fireworks would not ban the ability of these groups to continue to meet but would reduce the noise levels significantly.

Your press release states that "a complete ban may not be successful at stopping firework discharges," however, with so many cities already enacting bans, you have endless examples to learn from. Moreover, while some residents will not follow the

law, many more will, and the incidences can be reduced dramatically. It is unseemly to concede "compromise" merely because some residents are not law abiding. I do applaud the fact that you already employ both criminal and civil penalties as options.

I appreciate your understanding that many residents "view fireworks as a nuisance" as well as the need to "limit the impact to pets and animals adversely affected by loud noises commonly associated with fireworks." <sup>2</sup> I imagine that such noises also negatively impact certain military personnel and others who may experience post-traumatic stress. For my family, the constant barrage of noise is so bad that we are forced to take time off work and travel to a location that bans fireworks. Our dog is absolutely terrified and traumatized from the days of loud noises. It takes days for him to recover afterward. The blasts continue late into the night; and more often than not, the next day is a workday, forcing us to take leave because we are not able to sleep until the wee hours of the morning. We would much prefer to stay home, enjoy the lake and our community, and invite friends and family over to join us, but it is simply not possible anymore.

Additionally, the amount of fireworks debris, cigarette butts, beer cans/bottles, and broken glass that wash ashore in the days following fireworks periods is appalling. The amount of lake litter always increases during the summer months, but it is exponential in the days following the first week of July. Swimmers and others enjoying the lake cannot risk removing their shoes. Based on the garbage that lands in my front and back yards, the environmental impact cannot be good.

Short of a full ban, I encourage you to take this opportunity to expand your emergency authority to enact a ban under specific circumstances. Ordinance 8.68.050(K) appears to relate only to public displays and states that they can be discontinued based on concerns over crowd control or high winds or wet weather that create a fire danger. Given that you are in the process of amending the chapter, please consider adopting an amendment that allows emergency prohibitions citywide based on those same circumstances as well as adding a more general provision such as when "extenuating emergency conditions exist" (See, e.g. Whatcom County Code 5.20.105) to give you latitude to address extraordinary circumstances.

My family and I have lived here for five years and instead of looking forward to celebrating our nation's independence day, we dread it. Powerful, if not professional grade, fireworks start being shot off at least a week in advance and usually extend another week or so beyond the 4th of July. Last year on July 3rd and 4th, these jarring explosives were set off all around us literally every few minutes beginning at dusk and going till 2AM (this is not an exaggeration). They were so close that we observed the sparks and ash falling on our roof through the grove of dry trees around us, and we have serious concerns about fires. We do what we can to keep out the noise, but not much helps and we have to try and calm our animals who howl in terror for hours. By the end of the night all of our nerves are completely shot. Last year was the first time I called the police. They dutifully took down my complaint and said they would look into it, but we never saw a patrol car in the neighborhood. We understand that the offenders are so prolific that it's likely impossible to enforce even the current rules.

In an area where there are multiple options for viewing professional firework shows offered by local municipalities, I find it completely unnecessary that anything other than fun, kid-friendly firecrackers be legal.

On behalf of People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) and our more than 6.5 million members and supporters worldwide, I'm writing with regard to the proposed amendment that would ban the discharge of fireworks on July 3 and 5. We strongly and most respectfully urge you to adopt the fireworks limitations contained in the ban proposal and to consider also banning fireworks on July 4 and New Year's Eve in order to protect all of Lakewood's residents.

Traditional fireworks bring with them devastating consequences. They sound like an all-out war not only to those suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder but also to dogs, cats, and wildlife. Terrified dogs climb or dig their way out of fenced-in yards as they frantically try to escape the explosions, resulting in increased stray-animal intakes at shelters. Many animals arrive with bloody paws or broken bones, some are never reunited with their families, and others are doomed to a worse fate.

Fireworks produce plumes of smoke laden with particles that are harmful to the respiratory systems of humans and other animals. Birds caught in or near fireworks displays often choke on the toxic residue. The California Coastal Commission banned the city of Gualala's display when, following a 2006 show, seabirds fled their nests, leaving their chicks vulnerable to predators. Most birds cannot see well in the dark, so this type of disruption can lead to injuries if they inadvertently crash into power lines, cars, buildings, trees, or each other. In one case, 5,000 birds died on a New Year's Eve in Arkansas after a fireworks display caused them to take flight and crash into objects such as houses and cars.

Such tragedies are not limited to animals: Many humans have been injured in fireworks accidents, and the displays can exacerbate asthma and other respiratory problems. Veterans and others suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder are also sensitive to and can be deeply disturbed by the noise of the explosives and the smell of the gunpowder. And on average, 180 people go to emergency rooms daily with fireworks-related injuries for an entire month around July 4.

As the Fourth of July holiday fast approaches, we hope you'll enact the proposed restrictions and consider extending them further by including a ban on igniting fireworks on Independence Day and December 31. Thank you for your time and consideration. We look forward to hearing from you.

I am a Lakewood resident writing to urge the Council to make a broader stroke at the upcoming council meeting - in order to end the multitude of problems caused by fireworks and to ban fireworks altogether, once and for all, and to return our city to a preferred place to live in Pierce County! More citizens, more tax revenue? Yes! Although, I do appreciate the Council finally taking this step – to consider changes to our current rules - making a half step at this critical time of forward thinking, is a mistake.

My husband and I to chose to relocate to Washington and specifically to live in Lakewood because it is beautiful and we found a house we loved. As a retired Army veteran, my husband and I are pleased and proud to live near Joint Base Lewis-McChord. We are homebodies and our yard is completely fenced. It is a safe place for our pets to go outside to lounge in the sun, lie in the grass, and to watch bugs and birds. We have several bird visitors in crows, stellar jays, hummingbirds, and sparrows that frequent our yard and we enjoy them. My husband and I like to sit outside to play backgammon and take in the wildlife, but this scene is completely shattered beginning in late June, day and night, continuing well past the 4<sup>th</sup> of July. The wildlife disappears for days, (who knows where they go) and our pets refuse to go outside.

Each summer, well in advance of the 4<sup>th</sup>, I must take my dog to the vet (an office visit expense) in order to purchase prescribed medications (prescriptions cost money) so that I can (drug my dog – which has proven necessary) for what is usually seven or more days of "warfare" that takes place in our normally peaceful neighborhood adjacent to Fort Steilacoom

Park. Each year, to prepare for the onslaught, I am proactive. My dog wears a Thunder Vest, takes his medication, I turn on soft music, I plug in a pheromone diffuser, and after all of these, my dog still cowers in the bedroom closet, trembling and panting for hours. Holding him does nothing to comfort him. I must use these methods every year because they are the only remedies I have. The laws, as they now stand, are always broken. I am the Regional Manager for TNT FIREWORKS in the State of Washington. TNT is the largest wholesaler of Washington legal fireworks in the state of Washington. I am not writing to discourage the council from taking any action, I am writing to postpone the decision. The nonprofit groups that sell fireworks as fundraisers are barely even able to organize to meet. The nonprofits in your community cannot meet publicly to organize a response. With the pandemic we are currently experiencing, and the fact that the effect of the decision will not take place until 2021 at the earliest, not allowing a public hearing at the very least is unfair and not providing the public due process to publicly speak about something seems incredibly subversive. #### Briana.

I appreciate the opportunity to comment on the proposed changes to the law regarding the use of personal fireworks in the City of Lakewood.

I moved to Lakewood in October 2013 and was surprised to find out in July 2014 that the personal use of fireworks is allowed for days. It had been years since I lived somewhere where people were allowed to use fireworks for such a long period of time.

I enjoy watching fireworks; however, I don't believe that people should be allowed to use them for 12 hours a day for 3 days. My preference would be that the personal use of fireworks be banned as is the law in several area communities - for example Lacey, Steilacoom, Tacoma, Firwood, and JBLM. If not banned then limited to the 4th of July (University Place and Puyallup) If the use of personal fireworks are continued to be allowed, I also believe the hours should be reduced -- you can not see them during the day light hours. I think what many people are using during the daylight hours are "fireworks" that make loud noises only and do not have a beautiful display.

I realize that the input I provided above is not what is being considered. I assume that the rationale is that it more palatable to make small changes at a time rather than making bigger changes. I don't agree with that concept; however any reduction in days/hours would be better than what is currently allowed. Although, I firmly believe that fireworks should only be presented by the City/County/Joint Base.

When John Adams said that he hoped the anniversary of our independence would be marked for years to come by guns/bonfires/illuminations he was 1) referring to the 4th of July only --not the 3rd or the 5th or any other days and 2) times/communities have significantly changed since he made that comment. If people started using guns to celebrate in 2020, chaos would occur, as well as injuries and deaths.

I have read some of the comments made about the current proposal and therefore realize that my comments may not be new; however I am going to include them.

1) I do not believe that limiting the use or banning the use of personal fireworks affect our freedom. Many of member of my family served in the military during WWII --they were fighting for our freedom - to keep us from being ruled by fanatics from Germany and Japan --not for our right to use fireworks. My husband was in in the Air Force and served two terms of duty in Viet Nam - not so people can use fireworks.

Freedom requires us to make the best choices for the good of the whole, not the individual. (Years ago I had a sports car --I would have enjoyed driving it at 100 MPH; however I did not have the freedom to do so,as it may have been dangerous to others and to self if I had done so. That is why we have laws --to protect others and ourself.)

- 2] The noise from the fireworks/noise makers is harmful to dogs and to some people. My dog is frightened by the noise which requires medical care. Yes, if the City/County/Joint Base provides a firework display there is noise; however I know what day and time and can provide the needed care/attention my dog needs. I can NOT keep him medicated for 12+ hours for several days in a row. I have Stage IV cancer; one of the symptoms I experience at times is excruciating headaches; I can, again, take the necessary action to minimize the pain when I know the day and time of the fireworks display; however not non-stop for days at a time. (I know there are thousands of people in our community who have dogs who react as my dog does and that there are also hundreds. perhaps thousands of people who have health problems that are affected by the noise.) There are thousands of people in our community who work various shifts and need their sleep; which is difficult to get if their is on-going noise for hours for several days.
- 3) There is a risk of injury and/or death when fireworks are used by people who are not trained in the proper use. Not only does this affect the individual and his/her family/friends; it affects the community as a whole, as resources are used that often times are limited and/or the person doesn't have the funds to pay for the resources used. I spent 30+ years in health care. In those communities where the personal use of fireworks were allowed, we had to add additional staffing in our emergency departments to care for the injuries of those who made stupid mistakes. And often these same individual didn't have the resources to pay for the care they received.
- 4} There is a risk of fires -often times to property of others; not the property of the individual using the fireworks.
- 5) Fireworks are harmful to nature and the environment. Yes, this is true of the firework displays offered by the City, etc. However again, in those instances, it is controlled and for a limited time. Are the "containers/packaging" that fireworks come in recyclable? Do the people who "shoot" the fireworks go in the neighborhood and pick up the trash they have caused to exist? Based upon what I have found in my driveway and on my property in the past, my response is, "no."
- 6) I have read comments on social media that there shouldn't be any changes to the current law as it is not being enforced so why make it stricter if the new law won't be enforced. I don't agree with that reasoning. However, I do believe that whether the law stays the same or is amended that it needs to be enforced. I also understand that with COVID19, that unbudgeted expenses has occurred and that adding additional staffing to enforce this type of law may not be a priority. However, it needs to be enforced. Perhaps, it is enforced in two or three neighborhoods this year --as the word spreads that it is enforced, some people may decide not to shoot fireworks or may do so within the requirements of the law.

I encourage city Council to amend the current policy of allowing fireworks between 11 a.m. and 11 p.m. on July 3, 4 and 5 and New Year's Eve to only the 4th of July and New Year's Eve. I would prefer they were banned completely but this does not appear to be a consideration. My reasons are the following.

- 1. Fireworks are sources of pollution, see <u>Festive Fireworks Create Harmful Pall of Pollution</u> and <u>Are Fireworks Harming your Health?</u> As local air quality diminishes, particularly given the increase of summer fires which impact many citizens, adding to air pollution for a celebratory activity is misplaced.
- 2. Fireworks can trigger stress and PTSD. Given our proximity to JBLM and the many active and retired military who live in Lakewood, it is appropriate to limit the use of fireworks. See *coping with PTSD during Fireworks Season*.
- 3. Fireworks, when used irresponsibility, can cause injury to individuals and property. See <u>US Consumer Information Fireworks</u>. 9,000 people were treated for firework injuries in 2019. From the National Fire Protection Association, "Fireworks start an average of 18,500 fires per year, including 1,300 structure fires, 300 vehicle fires, and 16,900 outside and other fires. These fires caused an average of three deaths, 40 civilian injuries, and an average of \$43 million in direct property damage."

As a resident of Lakewood, I'm writing to oppose the suggested changes in fireworks regulations.

I'm generally in favor of safety-based regulations. I usually have no problem with such rules -- I am not in any way an anti-regulation person. However, I think fireworks need special consideration because of their cultural significance to so many people.

The US (and Washington State) is already one of the most restrictive places in the western world when it comes to use of fireworks. Many countries and states have little to no restrictions on fireworks in terms of both type or date. This is a freedom many others enjoy, but which is heavily restricted in the "land of the free".

I am a US citizen, originating in the UK. In the UK, little to no restrictions on fireworks exist at all, and education campaigns in schools are used effectively to reduce harm from fireworks. In my culture, we celebrate with fireworks on November 5th (Guy Fawkes Night). This cultural practice is one I already am barred from participating in here, which is very upsetting to me. It's always hard to adapt to a new country, but to lose access to British traditions makes it even harder to feel at home. In my view, ex-pats should be able to pass these traditions down to their children.

The compromise that we've reached in our family is to celebrate Guy Fawkes Night on July 3rd. We can then celebrate July 4th like everyone else. However, if fireworks are further restricted, there will be literally no days that aren't already claimed by other celebrations.

Additionally, since my wife is a healthcare worker, she often has to work on July 4th. That means that around 50% of years she will have **zero** days to be able to even celebrate July 4th with fireworks. Such a rule would be especially unfair to many essential workers that we rely on. In light of all the hard work they're doing to fight COVID-19, I think they should be able to relax and enjoy celebrating Independence Day as well.

Please do not adopt this change.

Ms. Schumacher and Lakewood City Council Members:

As a resident of the City of Lakewood for 55 years, I write in strong support of your proposed amendments to Chapter 8.68 of the Lakewood Municipal Code, Fireworks. In fact, I urge you to go further and ban the sale and discharge of fireworks during the 4th of July.

For my family, the constant barrage of noise is so bad that we are forced to take time off work and travel to a location in Eastern Washington that bans fireworks. The blasts have already started this year around the 25<sup>th</sup> of June and continue late into the night; and more often than not, the next day is a workday (as we are public service employees), forcing us to take time off because we are not able to sleep (sometimes until 300 am). We already have firework debris on our roof that we just had replaced last year (at a cost of \$20,000).

Although we would like to report the usage of fireworks before the required times and the use of illegal fireworks, we know that Lakewood Police have more pressing matters to handle. Since we are public service employees as well, we fear neighbors will retaliate if we do mention something to them or call the police.

Some people are concerned that the non-profits who sale fireworks won't be getting money for their cause. I rarely see people at the "safe" fireworks stands. Most of the fireworks that are being deployed are the 'illegal' fireworks that are sold on reservations.

In closing, I would hope that you would affirm the proposed changes to the City Code that would restrict when fireworks can be discharged within the city limits to July 4th and New Year's Eve to take effect in 2021. As I mentioned earlier, I would like fireworks to be banned during all times in the City of Lakewood. These proposed changes are a good start. However, I will continue to hope fireworks will be completely banned. The danger to life and property, the distress of our veterans afflicted with PTSD, the stress inflicted on animals, fires, and the trash that litters the streets and yards (which I end up picking up) are just some of my major concerns.

A timing restriction should also apply to December 31/January 1. I am not opposed to fireworks per se, but I am opposed to the noise and stress that is caused by their use.

I live near Steilacoom Lake. It is very popular for the lakeside residents to use fireworks on these holidays in addition to other residents in the area.

Pets and a neighbor that has post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) suffer with the loud noise created by the legal (and possibly illegal) fireworks. Fireworks started several days before July 4th. On July 4th, they occurred non-stop for several hours and I was still hearing fireworks at 2 am on July 5.

I understand the desire to see fireworks on these holidays, but the stress they cause needs to be mitigated. One way is to reduce the stress and anxiety caused is to limit the duration of the fireworks. Another is to further limit the type of fireworks that can be used within the city limits.

I spoke to the Lakewood City Council on January 16, 2018 regarding the number and size of fireworks discharged into the air around our neighborhood which is adjacent to the Clover Park High School. At that time I urged the City Council to eliminate fireworks like the neighboring cities of Steilacoom, University Place, Fircrest, and Tacoma have. A small percentage of Lakewood residents began igniting fireworks this year at least a week prior to July 3, and continued doing so nearly two weeks after July 5. The size of these explosives and the height to which they were propelled made them audible for many city blocks and were so loud our house windows shook and shock waves were felt inside our house. The silent majority of Lakewood residents that do not impact their neighbors with these enormous fireworks should not have to suffer because a few individuals have no consideration or limitation on when to ignite them. Allowing fireworks only on July 4 sends a message that the city of Lakewood protects those of us that do not consider disturbing the peace for nearly three weeks in July a privilege to be taken advantage of. ## Ladies and Gentlemen,

I am writing in support of instituting a ban on the sale and discharge of fireworks in the City of Lakewood, for the reasons reflected below.

While current regulations only allow for use of fireworks within specific time restrictions for three days in July, and for sale of fireworks during a short period leading up to those days, my middle class and otherwise reasonably quiet neighborhood has been subjected to fireworks since April, most frequently in the middle of the night (0200 to 0300). Based on experience of many years, we anticipate that we will continue to be subjected to them, at all hours of the day and night, until October. While I understand the City recently planned to utilize our police drones to capture activity surrounding the actual holiday, that process could not possibly reflect the reality of fireworks violations over a period of six months. Although July 4th is now over two weeks ago, we are still being assaulted regularly by everything from a massive explosion at 2300 hours last night to a deafening "concert" lasting a full hour several nights ago. If the noise and disrupted sleep were not enough, as we move into the hottest and driest part of the year we must also concern ourselves with the potential for our homes and vehicles to be set alight, threatening lives and property and unnecessarily wasting fire department resources on the related calls (which, due to reporting procedures, are not always specifically identified in statistics as fireworks related).

Even restricting our concerns to legal dates/times of discharge, extreme safety issues are rampant. None of the homes sharing a fence line with my property discharged fireworks on July 4th. Nevertheless, on the morning of July 5th I found significant debris from explosives which would have been launched not from my road, but from the next road over, lying in my back yard, which is shared by my dogs and filled with drying vegetation. I was fortunate to find nothing on my roof. On the 4th or 5th of July I listened as a small car sped along that same road, with explosions every few seconds timed perfectly to the location of that vehicle. Although I could not actually see the car, I feel confident in my belief that the occupants were tossing fireworks from the car as it sped down the road. Thankfully, it was not followed by a massive fire department response.

We are fortunate to live in an exquisitely beautiful and bountiful part of America. In our city, that bounty includes an amazing variety of wildlife, both on the ground and in the air. I can only imagine the terror of those creatures, for a full three days and nights every July, as they try desperately to escape a genuine threat to their very existence, their young, and their homes, with nowhere safe to hide from the terrifying cacophony. For many of us, protection of our domestic pets over this so-called "holiday" ranges everywhere from holding a trembling 120 pound dog on our lap to drugging our animals into a stupor for a week, but that only works for pets with

responsible, vigilant "parents". Although I cannot provide you with statistics, it is no secret that animal control, animal shelters, and veterinary emergency clinics are overrun every 4<sup>th</sup> of July, frequently with a very sad and thoroughly unnecessary outcome. Human hospitals and emergency rooms fare little better, with unsupervised youngsters and innocent bystanders incurring life-altering injuries, if they survive at all.

If our wildlife and pets have nowhere safe to hide from this assault, both expected (an uninterrupted four hours on July 4th) and unexpected (0300 some night in the middle of May), neither do our Combat Veterans have an escape. In a city which prides itself on the number of active and former military members living within its borders and a close relationship with neighboring military installations, there should be greater consideration for those individuals' experiences. After very nearly 20 years at war, there are untold numbers of US service members, both past and present, suffering from PTSD and other combat related issues, whether diagnosed or not. We owe those veterans the consideration and compassion of not exposing them to yet another nightmare by surrounding them with inescapable reminders of their terrors in a place where they should feel safe.

As long as the City of Lakewood allows for sale and even restricted use of fireworks, we will continue to experience the above abuses, threats, terrors and tragedies, with no escape. Our police department cannot possibly respond to every violation, even if citizens wistfully call them in, so violators know there are no consequences (resulting in law-abiding citizens simply "giving up" and no longer bothering to call). Granted, if fireworks are no longer sold in Lakewood, the die-hards will go elsewhere to get them, but many won't, and as more cities and counties are joining in the ban, fireworks of all types are becoming less accessible. Lack of availability combined with greater emphasis on enforcement, at least in the short term, would eventually change the current situation.

While you may see the 4th of July as a time to celebrate a proud nation, many of your citizens have come to look on it with dread. I now hate even the idea of July 4th. It isn't a holiday. It's a misery which must, unnecessarily, be endured (for months after the fact!). ...and it leaves me every year with a conundrum no one seems prepared to address. Why is it that our military, law enforcement and any number of other government agencies, spend thousands of dollars to carefully select, train, and maintain specialized units to deal with things that go BOOM, yet our City is happy to hand out not-so-improvised explosive devices to any idiot with a few bucks and a beer?!? Is it just for a few measly tax dollars? Surely we can make that money up somewhere that doesn't leave America's citizens dreading her birthday.

In any neighborhood, sounds can carry pretty far. Explosions even further. Many, many families can hear one person's fireworks. This one person's fun steals peace from a large number of others. His explosions threaten their hearing, their babies, their pets. His fun fills the air with smoke. His fun makes it impossible for many others to sleep. His fun presents risks of fire and bodily harm to neighbors (and himself). With fireworks, one person's "rights" have come to dominate the rights of many.

Just as non-smokers have a right to breathe clean air, Lakewood residents deserve peace and safety in their own homes. We should not be forced to endure the sounds of war, with non-stop explosions and blasts, hour after hour, well past midnight each night - - for three consecutive days and nights! If you don't believe it's bad every year, you haven't driven around the non-wealthy neighborhoods of Lakewood on July 3, 4 and 5 (and Dec. 31).

Other cities have outlawed fireworks but Lakewood promotes them with big circus tents all over the city, some advertising "Military Grade Armaments". While Lakewood is understandably loyal to the U.S. military, it cannot ignore families and pets.

So why not make the use of fireworks safer, with less bothersome noise and air pollution? The City could solve this by establishing designated safe areas for setting off fireworks, and make them illegal in neighborhoods. Parking lots are ideal areas where fire risk can be minimized, safe usage can be encouraged, and noise can be controlled.

Fireworks users will complain, but they accept going to a gun range to fire their weapon, and someday they too might become a pet owner or a parent, or come to appreciate sleep. And in gathering together for the activity, everyone gets to see and experience more.

If the City wants to continue supporting fireworks, it should provide safe places for using them, which do not punish the rest of its citizens. For the majority of us, we don't need to have PTSD to feel the oppression of violence from three days of explosions surrounding our homes in Lakewood.

Greetings Lakewood City Council,

The intent of this letter is to ask for your support and expeditious action in banning private fireworks in the city of Lakewood. We wrote to you last year requesting a ban. Given the city's concern with limiting its liability, we are discouraged by the slow pace towards legislative action.

This year, we were out of town on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July and upon returning discovered a fire had burned a substantial patch of ground and foliage on the Lake Louise Drive right-of-way along the side of our property. We contacted the West Pierce Fire Department staff who inspected the burn area on 16 July 2020. A neighbor confirmed that the fire occurred on the night of the 4<sup>th</sup> of July. It is probable this blaze was caused by use of fireworks. Had the fire spread up the bank to our wooden fence, our shed, our trailer and its propane tanks, or to our house, it could have destroyed all in its path. The West Pierce Fire Department investigator told us that they had responded to 23 brush fires on the fourth, but not this blaze.

A block away, Lake Louise Drive runs along a border to Fort Steilacoom Park. Dry grass and brush, and dead trees abound in and on the edge of the park. Should fireworks land in this area, it could be catastrophic for the neighborhood and city!

Each year we leave our home the week of the 4<sup>th</sup> of July to avoid the noise of personal fireworks, at all hours of the night and for weeks before and after the 4<sup>th</sup> of July and New Year's Eve. Lake Louise area residents completely disregard the regulations on fireworks. Use and duration of fireworks activity in Lakewood goes far beyond its intended celebratory purposes. In April this year, we were consistently bombarded by someone regularly putting off fireworks at about 3:00 AM in the vicinity of Lake Louise. This activity went on for several weeks.

Please take action now to ban the use private fireworks in the city of Lakewood, as other adjoining communities have done. Current regulations are not being adhered to or enforced, resulting in a dangerous and annoying situation for this Lakewood neighborhood.

Your decisive action in this matter is needed and greatly appreciated.

Dear Lakewood City Council members,

I fully support the recommendation before the City Council to restrict the use of fireworks in the city only between 11:00 am and 11:00 pm on July 4<sup>th</sup> and on December 31<sup>st</sup>.

Whereas I respect the right of residents to use **legal** fireworks on the holiday, they need to respect the rights of people who want peace and quiet. We are both retired and live near Lake Steilacoom off of 104<sup>th</sup>. Fireworks, both legal and illegal, are exploded many days before the current legal date of July 3<sup>rd</sup> and continue well past July 5<sup>th</sup>. We have a dog that is extremely scared of the excessive noise. We have to drug our animal and sit in the closet with him until one or two in the morning for multiple nights. My future son-in-law suffers from PTSD (2 tours in Iraq and Afghanistan) as does my neighbor behind me.

Lakewood sounds like a war zone during Independence Day celebrations. I believe many of the firecrackers being are set off are the illegal explosive devices – M-80s, M-100s, etc. To me, it is unconscionable for fireworks to be set off where war veterans are recovering from PTSD.

Please adopt the recommendation to restrict fireworks to July 4<sup>th</sup> and December 31<sup>st</sup> only, and develop a policy for enforcement.



That was back when General Harrison was Mayor and I don't know if he, like me, just loves watching fireworks or if being a retired general he was just that patriotic but he seemed to support the fireworks vs banning them. The City is again looking at further restrictions on fireworks and in the last council meeting it was brought up that they may even consider banning them all together.

With the Pandemic this year there were no professional firework shows to be seen but WOW the Lakewood sky sure looked good lit up with amazing displays everywhere my head turned. There may be a few people that wish to restrict or ban fireworks but from the look of the sky on July Fourth I would say an overwhelming majority had a show in their backyards.



When I heard one of the council members mention a ban it got me wondering how big a problem fireworks are in the City of Lakewood. So, I filed a public records request (#20519) with The City to see how many violations there were between July 01, 2019 and July 10, 2020.

To my surprise Not A Single Citation had been issued. In comments I submitted to the Council for the public hearing on fireworks I quoted the Public Safety Advisory Committee "At the direction of council the Public Safety Advisory Committee conducted informal surveys, held discussions and reviewed regulations in place in neighboring jurisdictions. The result of that work was a recommendation not to amend city code due to a low impact of the calls for service around fireworks discharges."

It really makes me ponder why with recent input from their own Advisory Committee and with no citations during the course of two July 4th's and one New Years is the Council even considering to restrict or ban fireworks?

One last question . . . If they do ban them all together does that mean The City will step up and put on a professional show at the average cost of \$1,000 per minute? I mean the Steilacoom show is awesome to watch but getting in and out of the great town is a challenge.

If law enforcement does not respond and investigate, then, of course, there is not going to be a citation.

Current conditions in Lakewood push citizens towards vigilantism where a fireworks victim may need to send illegal fireworks towards the offender's home. Once the offender's home is ablaze, maybe he, Lakewood City Council, and the Lakewood Police will be able to see the problem.

(4) You mention the Lakewood Public Safety Committee. That committee, like most committees, is comprised of well-meaning, do nothing citizens. They sit around wringing their hands and looking for ways to not take action or generate solutions.

I sat on that committee for two years and when I could no longer stand the all talk, no action process, I quit.

Bottom line. The committee's findings and statements often easily mean nothing.

(5) You talk about there being a low impact on calls for service. Another reader suggests you check the 911 records for citizens calling to complain. There are lots of complaints, but Lakewood Police cannot or will not do anything to prevent obvious property damage risk, injury, or death.

When property is damaged, people are injured, and people die, you Mr. Hills will have blood on your hands.

If you do not yet get my point, please provide me with your home address. Next forth of July you can relive your childhood. I can duplicate my dangerous home environment by setting up illegal fireworks in the middle of the street in front of your home. Once your home is fully engulfed in flames with your loved ones inside, then; maybe then, you will support a ban on fireworks in the City of Lakewood.

Big displays were put on professionally at sports arenas, and Disneyland.

The trouble is this. What people are shooting off is a LOT different than the fireworks we bought at the Red Devil fireworks stands when I was a child. The crap people are getting from the reservation fireworks stands are causing a lot of havoc.

When someone three doors down is shooting off crap that makes my windows rattle, and doing it all night long for about a three week period keeping every other neighbor awake...when people's pets are terrorized, when people with PTSD are being terrorized, and when people are losing their homes to fires caused by illegal fireworks, and large tracts of land are going up in smoke in wildfires caused by fireworks, something needs to change.

In another discussion, a woman stated that she had lost her home to fire caused by fireworks.

This past 5th of July, my husband was working in the back yard. A man living two doors down was deliberately aiming mortars low and aiming them at other people's yards. Quite a few went off low enough they started grass fires in our back yard in an

area we've been trying to kill off grass so we can build a deck area, and even started some pine needles on our roof burning.

Luckily my husband was working out there and saw it happen, and extinguished the flames with the hose. My husband then called police, but we have no idea whether they ever even responded.

If we hadn't been home, we could easily have lost our home. If he'd been doing it during the wee hours, we could easily have lost our lives. The neighbor is one of the idiots Joseph Boyle was describing.

I've also been home bound for the past 3 years with a chronic infection between my sinuses and trachea, which has my doctors baffled because it's antibiotic resistant. This infection started because people were too stupid to stay home when they'd been sick, and I also permanently lost my singing voice due to it. My immune system is all but non existent.

I have a lot of trouble when neighbors on both sides are using charcoal grills, or outdoor fire pits, and on the 4th of July and New Years Eve when they're all shooting off fireworks, and not the safe and sane variety. They must expend hundreds if not thousands of dollars on the big reservation ordinance. I can't breathe easily when this happens, inside of my own home, and with doors and windows closed. I end up having to use my nebulizer more often than usual, and with this pandemic I feared this past 4th that I might end up having to go to the E.R. for treatment, and risk exposure and infection with Covid-19.

My cat is also terrified by the explosions, as are all the animals in the area. Neighbor dogs are screeching and yiking in terror as their own owners are setting off the big explosions. Their owners don't care.

And then there is the very real threat of fires set by these fireworks. People have lost their homes. When is enough enough? Why is the so called right to set off illegal fireworks overruling people's rights to sleep at night without fear of their home catching fire from fireworks?

With what's been going on in this nation, I'm not sure the U.S.A. deserves a birthday celebration.

I'm all for banning fireworks in city limits, and citing offenders, IF we have enough officers who will actually perform that duty. I've lived in this home for 36 years now, and fireworks complaints called in during the wee a.m. hours are largely ignored.

#### Hello,

I live in the city of Lakewood, Oakbrook area, just behind the disc golf/mental hospital. I love my city. I try to get out and volunteer to make it even better. I work early in the morning and have a customer-facing job, which requires me to be awake and good spirits. I have owned my house here for two years now (so 2 fourth of July's worth of time).

The fireworks here are terrible. If they were contained to one night, that would be okay... but here, people light off fireworks over a MONTH before AND after July 4th. Plus they tend to light them off at all hours of the night...and morning. There is no responsibility. Personally, they wake me up most nights. I also have a dog who is mortified of them. She is at high risk for heart attack because she is so stressed out (per my veterinarian). I can't even imagine what a military veteran with PTSD must feel for the months of June, July, and August (as well as New Years Eve)! I am also quite sure that people go up to the disk golf course to light them off...most nights they sound like they might be in my backyard. This is certainly "disturbing the peace" RCW 9.26.050(4) and are definitely a dangerous nuisance.

Additionally, when I go up to the disk golf course (and walk around my neighborhood with my dogs) around this time of the year (both years I have lived here), the amount of firework trash left behind is ridiculous. It may not even be intentional, as many times I will find it remains of fireworks just below the trees...but I have picked up bags of firework trash that simply show that the users don't care about damaging the environment.

Again, I would be completely on-board with fireworks if it was JUST on the 4th of July. At least then I have the option to leave town that night to avoid them. However, we are in late August and some nights I am still awoken by them. People are just not mature enough to responsibility use this type of item.

I have also heard many stories from my neighbors of the damage that they do and have done to people they know. I feel that I can't make this claim because I have not been personally damaged (other than severe loss of sleep) but this is absolutely a concern as well.

I hope that Lakewood will consider that Thurston County (Olympia, Lacey, Tumwater) has an effective fireworks ban. Further, my independent research is showing that other cities, states, and countries have also enacted bans across the world. I attempted to play Devil's Advocate here but the only thing I could come up with is that people need a 1-2 second distraction with sparkly lights and boom sounds, without regard of anyone else other than those in the group. Fireworks don't give anything back to society that can't be better achieved by other means.

Please give me my sleep back! Ban fireworks in Lakewood.

My name is Melissa Dean, and my home is at 8306 Amber Drive SW. here in Lakewood.

I would like to comment to City Council **not** to impose any new ban on fireworks here in Lakewood. The currently allowed days, times and types of fireworks should remain in effect.

This year had been very disconnected socially however on July 4th and the Friday, Sunday of that weekend our neighbors put on a beautiful display of fireworks here in my neighborhood. It is the first time that I personally purchased fireworks too. The fireworks really made us feel connected again as we shared our appreciation over the phone to neighbors that we do know and on social media for the rest of our neighborhood and city.

It was a really uplifting weekend for us all.

I understand that some people in our community do continue fireworks after the accepted hours and some may use illegal fireworks however these people are breaking the law. These examples should not hinder the rights of law-abiding residents to continue to have fireworks on July 3, 4 and 5.

I live by Fort Steilacoom Park. I am very concerned about the fireworks on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July, New Years and the other 363 days of the year.

Fireworks are being shot off at all hours of the day and night, but mostly between 12:00 midnight and 4:00 in the morning and coming from the direction of the park. The night of 9/3/2020 the fireworks lasted about 20 minutes. So much for sleep the rest of the night. The evening of 9/4/2020 around 7:00PM, I'm watching fireworks being shot off around the neighborhood.

After a night or two of fireworks and staying up with garden hoses in hand, I then must pick up all the remains of the fireworks in my yard and on my roof.

The fireworks not only disrupt people and their family pets but also the wildlife. The wildlife is run out of their habitat by the noise with no where to go but Into the nearby neighborhoods. The family pets that <u>are afraid</u> of the noise, and <u>not sedated</u> and manage to get out, may be lucky enough to be picked up by Animal Control and taken to the Humane Society.

Lakewood has become very populated and the homes are being built closer together. It wouldn't take but one firework to set a couple of homes on fire and displace people even more.

In the early 1990's we saw what two fires did to the park. Trees were burned and cut down. The park wasn't useable for a while until the tree roots stopped burning and the burned grass grew back.



SUBJECT: VISION 2050 Population and Housing Projections

Pierce County has initiated the process to adopt new Growth Management Act (GMA) population and housing targets. This action is being pursued in an effort to comply with the Puget Sound Regional Council's VISION 2050.

On January 16, 2020, the Executive Board received the Growth Management Policy Board's (GMPB) recommended draft VISION 2050 plan (December 2019). Action by the Executive Board on VISION 2050 was delayed due to COVID-19 and restrictions on inperson meetings. The Executive Board met in July to continue discussing VISION 2050. At its September 24, 2020 meeting, the Executive Board will consider amendments to the GMPB Recommended draft and take action to recommend adoption to PSRC's General Assembly. The General Assembly is tentatively scheduled to meet virtually on October 29, 2020.

The last time Pierce County updated its targets was in 2016 and 2017. Attached to this memorandum is a PowerPoint presentation that discusses updated population and housing projections for Lakewood. The purposes of the presentation are threefold. The first, to acquaint the City Council with the allocation process. The second, to provide the City Council with information on different growth rates. And the third, to seek an early or preliminary consensus from the City Council on projected growth.

# HERE'S THE SETTING...

- Washington has the 8th fastest growth rate in the country and has grown by about a million people each decade since 1990.
- Puget Sound Regional Council (PSRC) has provided new growth projections as part of their regional growth plan called VISION 2050.
- > PSRC is projecting 1.8 million more residents and 1.2 million more jobs.
- Pierce County is expected to take 21% (264,784 persons) of the projected growth, for a total county population of 1,165,484 by 2044.
- Of the 264,784 persons, Pierce County's "Core Cities" (including Auburn, Lakewood, Puyallup and University Place), are assumed to collectively absorb 60,900 of the 264,784 persons (23%.)
- > The exercise is to determine Lakewood's share of the 60,900 number.

#### WHY IS THIS IMPORTANT?

- PSRC is the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) that covers Snohomish, King, Kitsap, and Pierce counties.
- The basic purpose of an MPO is to ensure regional cooperation in transportation planning. The MPO allocates federal dollars for regional transportation projects.
- The role of PSRC has expanded in the last 10-years to also include comprehensive planning. Now, in order to receive federal transportation dollars from PSRC, all GMA cities' Comprehensive Plans must be "certified" as consistent with VISION (the region's multicounty planning policies) by PSRC.
- An ongoing concern: King County, because of its larger population, controls important PSRC policy making decisions over the other three counties.

#### WHAT IS LAKEWOOD'S CURRENT TARGET POPULATION?

Per Pierce County Ordinance 2017-24s:



- Starting in 2020, Lakewood's population is set at 60,030\*.
- Each year, from 2020 through 2030, Lakewood is projected to add 1,197 persons, or about 503 units per year (assuming 2.38 persons per household).
- Thus, by 2030, Lakewood has a population target of 72,000.

\*The April 1, 2020 Office of Financial Management population allocation to Lakewood is also 60,030.

#### 2020 POPULATION ALLOCATION PROCESS



Pierce County hired AHBL to facilitate the 2020 process by which the County and cities will be determining future population allocations.

As a starting point and *first calculation*, based on the Lakewood's projected target 2030 population of 72,000, AHBL carried the same growth rate through to 2044 *assuming no growth policy changes*.

"Based on an 1,197 person annual growth rate, Lakewood would see an increase of 16,758 persons, for a total population of 88,758 in 2044."

#### 2014 BUILDABLE LANDS POPULATION ALLOCATION -

AHBL also provided a *second calculation* on "population capacity" based on the Pierce County 2014 Buildable Lands Report (14BLR.)

"Lakewood's 14BLR housing capacity is 34,824 units, which translates into a population capacity number of 80,488. That number is 8,270 less than the total projected growth of 88,758."

#### What does this mean?

✓ Based on current buildable land assumptions, Lakewood's maximum growth is set at 80,488, *unless the City changes growth policies, and among other things, increases density.*





#### WHY IS LAKEWOOD'S GROWTH RATE SLOW?

- Lakewood is a built-out community, not much vacant land. Land assembly and demolition are required, which is expensive.
- Existing infrastructure does not exist or is in need of replacement.
- Site contamination.
- Lakewood is not a full-service city/requires a high level of coordination (six different agencies Pierce County Public Works, Lakewood Water District, West Pierce Fire & Rescue, & three different power purveyors).

- Public agency policy conflicts. (i.e., each agency approaches client services differently.)
- Infill parcels are often smaller & irregular in size, & have a unique set of constraints.
- Infill development is not popular within established neighborhoods.

#### WHAT SHOULD LAKEWOOD'S 2044 POPULATION TARGET BE?

**Recommendation:** Use a 0.5 percent assumed growth rate, and round up to 68,000; however, recognizing that the forecasted population may only reach 63,000.

- ☐ A 2044 Lakewood population of 68,000 represents a net increase of 7,970 persons, which is 13 percent of the total population for Core Cities.
- □ That means Auburn, Puyallup, and University Place would need to make-up the difference for the remaining 87 percent of the Core City population, or 52,930 persons (60,900-7,970=52,930).
- Based on the outcome of Core City allocation process, any residual population not allocated to Core Cities could be disbursed to other cities or unincorporated Pierce County.

### AS OF RIGHT NOW, WHAT DOES THE CITY COUNCIL NEED TO DO?

For the moment, nothing. However, regard this presentation as a notification of things to come.

- Pierce County Core Cities are to make an initial report out to Pierce County in mid-November regarding their positions on the two relevant population allocation proposals provided by the consultant in August 2020.
- ☐ The results of this meeting will be reported to the City Council November/December 2020.
- Through 2020 and 2021, the Growth Management Coordination Committee (GMCC) and the Pierce County Regional Council (PCRC) will meet and forward recommendations to the Pierce County Council for adoption.
- City Council may be asked to adopt a resolution formally adopting projected population, housing, and employment allocations/targets.
- ☐ The Pierce County Council is scheduled to take action on new population, housing and employment targets to replace Ordinance 2017-24s in mid-2021.
