WHEREAS, his services as a highly decorated Officer in the United States Army spanned thirty years and included assignments with Infantry, Special Forces and Civil Military Operations units; and

WHEREAS, during his thirty years of service he received many U.S. Decorations and Badges to include the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Joint Service Achievement Medal, Army Commendation Medal, Army Achievement Medal, CIB/CAB/EIB, Master Parachutist Badge, Special Forces Tab, SCUBA Badge, and the Pathfinder Badge; and

WHEREAS, COL (R) Knight is a graduate of the National Defense University's National War College and the U.S. Air Force Air Command and Staff College holding a Doctorate in Public Administration and advanced degrees in Political Science, International Relations and National Security Strategy; and

WHEREAS, as the Joint Base Chief of Staff he used his many talents to provide superb leadership, advice and continuity to six Garrison Commanders, eight Army and Air Force Senior Service Component Commanders, and to a civilian work force of over 2,483 employees; and

WHEREAS, COL (R) Knight's outstanding federal civilian service spans from 2007 through 2021 totaling over 14 years; and

WHEREAS, COL (R) Knight is universally recognized for his uncompromising values and ethical foundation for leading by example, sound reasoning, and creative skills for solving complex challenges and problems associated with providing mission essential services; and

WHEREAS, COL (R) Knight worked tirelessly with the City of Lakewood and surrounding leaders to promote community relations and negotiated hundreds of solutions to shared challenges with mutually beneficial outcomes for the entire region; and

WHEREAS, he was instrumental in the formation and establishment of the South Sound Military and Community Partnership's (SSMCP) supporting, establishing and leading many initiatives to benefit our service members and their families; and

WHEREAS, through his SSMCP leadership role he enabled the partnership to establish and pursue legislative priorities with the State of Washington that resulted in a \$500 Million I-5 corridor improvement project that will alleviate traffic congestion near JBLM by increasing the roadway capacity in each direction throughout the six-mile JBLM corridor; and

WHEREAS, COL (R) Knight provided the leadership to develop a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) that outlines the action plan to resolve encroachment in the McChord North Clear Zone; and

WHEREAS, COL (R) Knight was instrumental in partnering with the City of Lakewood and SSMCP that resulted in the creation and funding of a new federal law, the Defense Community Infrastructure Program (DCIP); and

WHEREAS, COL (R) Knight also guided SSMCP to secure Office of Economic Adjustment (OEA) funding to address traffic, housing affordability and availability for Service Members and their families, impact of light pollution on flight and other military training operations; and

WHEREAS, during his tenure as Joint Base Chief of Staff, COL (R) Knight administered the investment of over \$2.0 billion in federal funds in a wide range of significant military construction projects on JBLM ranging from transportation, housing, barracks, six elementary schools, training facilities, and recreation amenities that addresses and ensures our service members and their families are properly taken care of; and

WHEREAS, COL (R) Knight's exceptional career helped make JBLM the premier and most diverse installation within Department of Defense, the station of choice for both Army and Air Force Service Members, and a committed partner to the City of Lakewood and surrounding communities.

Review of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) CARES Act CDBG-CV2 Funding.

Program Manager Jeff Gumm shared that the city is entitled to an additional allocation of \$136,706 in CARES Act CDBG-CV2 funding. He highlighted funding activities that these monies are eligible for and shared that it is recommended that the city allocate funding to the Living Access Support Alliance (LASA) for a Client Services Center expansion. He shared that there is a required five-day comment period through April 22, 2021 and a public hearing will be held at the Community Services Advisory Board meeting of April 21, 2021. Discussion ensued.

REPORTS BY THE CITY MANAGER

Review of 2021 South Sound Military and Communities Partnership (SSMCP) Work Plan.

Program Manager Bill Adamson provided an overview of the South Sound Military and Communities Partnership (SSMCP) 2020 key accomplishments and the 2021-2022 work plan priorities.

Review of Transportation Benefit District (TBD) Annual Report.

Assistant City Manager for Administrative Services Kraus reviewed the 2020 Transportation Benefit District (TBD) Annual Report. She shared that in 2020 the city received \$882,000 in TBD revenues and she highlighted the status of the improvement projects that received funding, the Chip Seal Program and the JBLM North Access Improvement Project.

Planning Manager Speir reviewed the proposed interlocal agreement for the South Sound Housing Affordability Partners (SSHA³P). She shared that comments on the draft agreement are due by April 23rd.

City Manager Caulfield reported that the 2021 State Legislative Session is coming to an end on April 25th and that a comprehensive report of the 2021 Legislative Session will come forward at the May 25th City Council study session.

He shared that last weekend the City held the Spring Community Clean-Up event and spoke about limitations due to COVID-19 noting that more information will be provided following debrief meeting.

He recognized Assistant City Manager for Administrative Services Kraus and the Finance Department for receiving a Financial Award of Achievement for the 2019 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report.

He shared that the new shelter at American Lake Park has been installed and a Community Resource Fair was held at Springbrook Park last weekend.

He reported that we submitted a request to Congresswoman Strickland for federal funding in the amount of \$2.4 Million to complete the final section of South Tacoma Way at 88th Street, notification of funding selection will occur in June. He also shared that virtual meetings with the federal delegation will be scheduled in the coming weeks.

CITY COUNCIL COMMENTS

Councilmember Moss congratulated the Finance Department and spoke about an article she contributed to in the Tacoma News Tribune related to diversity in the jury pools.

Councilmember Belle shared that she volunteered at the Spring Community Clean-Up event and attended the Colonial Plaza public art artist walk through meeting. She also congratulated the Finance Department.

Councilmember Brandstetter also complimented the Finance Department and reflected on the positive comments received from Veterans Court participants.

Councilmember Farmer also complimented the Finance Department. She spoke about collaborating with Deputy Mayor Whalen and Councilmember Belle to finalize the Equity Statement and shared that she attended the Spring Community Clean-Up event and will attend the Community Services Advisory Board and the Sex Offender Policy Board meeting this week.

Councilmember Bocchi also complimented the Finance Department and shared that he attended the Pierce County Regional Council meeting last week. He reported that Pierce County Council has approved \$4 Million in funding to support small businesses and he spoke about the impacts of multiple funding sources and the need to help businesses access these funds.

Deputy Mayor Whalen echoed compliments for the Finance Department and shared last week he attended the Pierce County Regional Council meeting, received his second COVID-19 vaccination and noted that Public Art Subcommittee meetings with artists interviews are scheduled for next week.

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Anderson called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

ROLL CALL

<u>Councilmembers Present</u>: 7 – Mayor Don Anderson, Deputy Mayor Jason Whalen; Councilmembers Mary Moss, Mike Brandstetter, Patti Belle, Paul Bocchi and Linda Farmer.

ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION:

Review of 2020 Year End Financial Report.

Assistant City Manager for Administrative Services Kraus provided a high-level overview of the 2020 Year End Financial Report.

Review of 2021 Carry Forward Budget Adjustment.

Assistant City Manager for Administrative Services Kraus reviewed the 2021 Carry Forward Budget Adjustment highlighting the new program funding requests for 2021. She shared that if approved the total ending funding balance for is estimated at \$10.8 Million. Discussion ensued.

Abatement and Nuisance Code Update.

Assistant City Manager for Development Services Bugher provided an overview of the nuisance abatement process. He shared that there are around 60-65 active properties under investigation as potential abatements at any time. He reviewed a map of active abatements in the city. He then summarized each of the proposed municipal code changes. Discussion ensued.

Review of Lakewood Station District Subarea (LSDS) Plan.

Planning Manager Speir, who was joined by Lisa Gruter, BERK and Associates provided an overview of the City Council review and consideration of the LSDS. She highlighted the elements of the LSDS Plan and Planned Action Ordinance and

provided a high-level overview of recommended amendments to Ordinance No. 751 and Ordinance No. 752.

Assistant City Manager for Development Services Bugher provided a summary of discussions he had with property owners Steve Borman and Seth Borman following public testimony received during the April 5th public hearing. He shared that discussion included the definitions of row house and townhouse, the use of condominium provisions, traffic mitigation and the subarea permitting process. Discussion ensued.

REPORTS BY THE CITY MANAGER

County Authority related to Hazard Pay.

City Manager Caulfield shared that the Pierce County Council is considering an Ordinance establishing a hazard pay requirement for grocery employees working in Pierce County noting that the Ordinance would apply to both unincorporated and incorporated areas of Pierce County, if passed.

City Attorney Wachter shared that in summary based on a 1971 Attorney General opinion, the Pierce County Council does not have the authority to apply their Ordinance to incorporated areas. Discussion ensued and it is recommended that a letter be drafted to be sent to the Pierce County Council outlining the Lakewood's position.

City Manager Caulfield shared that Pierce County Executive Dammeier has set up a vaccination task force to promote and assist residents in Pierce County to get vaccinated. He shared that countywide 20% have been fully vaccinated and over 30% have received one dose. He shared that there are various community vaccination sites at the Tacoma Dome and former Lakewood Towne Center Dress Barn that will allow for drive through and walk up options.

He shared that the City of Tacoma will be holding a public hearing this week regarding the non-interim tide flat regulations and SSMCP has sent a letter outlining concerns with the regulations.

He then shared that the State Legislative Session ended on April 25th and the city secured \$3.7 Million in funding to support community development and parks improvement projects and SSMCP received \$1.4 Million in support of North Clear Zone acquisition and \$5 Million for a study in the I-5 Nisqually Delta corridor. He shared that a Legislative Session Update will be scheduled for the May 24th City Council meeting.

He reported that a contract has been negotiated with Greater Lakes Mental Healthcare which includes the addition of a second Mental Health Professional for the Behavioral Health contact team, approval of the contract will come forward during the City Council meeting of May 3rd and during the May 10th study session the City Council will receive an update on the communication strategy related use of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding.

He provided an update on the Federal Community Project Funding Requests for Transportation Projects that were submitted to Congresswoman Strickland noting that it is anticipated the city will be notified as to whether projects will be funded in the May or June timeframe. He also noted that virtual meetings will be scheduled with the Federal Delegation in the near future.

He shared that the State Legislature passed a measure that makes Juneteenth a legal state holiday noting that more information will be provided to the City Council at a future meeting.

He then shared that Western State Hospital CEO Dave Holt has retired and the city is still waiting to receive an updated Western State Hospital Master Facility Plan from the Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS).

He reported that United Way of Pierce County is celebrating their 100th Anniversary in Pierce County and will be celebrating by hosting several food drives one of which will be held in Lakewood on May 14th from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.

He shared that the Pierce County Council has been working on an Ad Hoc Committee to end Homelessness. Planning Manager Speir has been representing Lakewood, a draft Action Plan will be presented to the Pierce County Council on May 3rd and it is recommended that the City Council schedule time to review and discuss the Plan at a future meeting.

Discussion ensued related to public outreach and notification regarding vaccination sites and Pierce Transit offering free rides for passengers traveling to vaccination appointments.

CITY COUNCIL COMMENTS

Councilmember Bocchi spoke about Lakewold Garden's State Legislative funding for a Carriage House.

Councilmember Farmer thanked the 28th and 29th Legislative Delegation for their work this legislative session. She shared that the Sex Offender Policy Board recommendations were enacted as SB 5163 concerning the placement and treatment of conditionally released sexually violent predators.

Councilmember Belle shared that she attended a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony for the Children's Museum at JBLM.

Deputy Mayor Whalen also commented Lakewood Gardens funding for the Carriage House and the Lakewood's Arts Commission meetings to conduct interviews of artists for the Colonial Plaza public art project.

Mayor Anderson announced that the City Council will recess into Execution Session for approximately 30 minutes pursuant to RCW 42.30.110(1)(b) to consider the

selection of a site or the acquisition of real estate and pursuant to 42.30.110(1)i to discuss with legal counsel representing litigation or potential litigation. The City Council is not expected to take action following the Executive Session.

The City Council recessed into Executive Session at 9:00 p.m. At 9:30 p.m., Mayor Anderson announced that the Executive Session will be extended an additional 10 minutes. At 9:40 p.m., Mayor Anderson announced that the Executive Session will be extended for an additional 10 minutes. At 9:50 p.m., Mayor Anderson announced that the Executive Session will be extended an additional 10 minutes. The City Council reconvened at 10:00 p.m.

REPORTS BY THE CITY MANAGER

Chambers Creek Canyon Trail Update.

Parks, Recreation and Community Services Director Dodsworth shared that Pierce County and the cities of Lakewood and University Place continue to work on the development of the Chambers Creek Canyon Trail project. She highlighted the history of the project, design process, trail alignment, bridges, trailheads and proposed trail improvements. She reviewed shared costs associated with Phase 1 which totals \$179,451 for Lakewood and the estimates for phase 2 improvements. Discussion ensued.

Park Sign Update.

Parks, Recreation and Community Services Director Dodsworth highlighted the history of the park sign program and shared photos of current city park signs. She then shared options recommended by the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board for a standardized park sign to be installed throughout the city. She noted that the plan is to replace the signs over the next three years. Discussion ensued.

City Manager Caulfield reported that the response rate for the 2020 Census in Lakewood was 68% which is up from 64% in 2010.

He shared that the Pierce County Council established a committee to draft an action plan to lay out a development for a Pierce County Comprehensive Plan to end homelessness noting that the goal is to have the Plan completed by fall 2021. He requested that an update come forward during the May 10th or May 17th Council meetings.

He then shared that Sound Transit will be conducting testing on the Point Defiance Bypass Rail the weekend of May 22^{nd.}

He then reported that due to the rising number of COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations Pierce County Executive Dammeier has created a vaccination task force which is focused on spreading the word related to vaccinations noting that over 1/3 of residents are somewhere in the vaccination process and 23% are fully vaccinated. He shared that the Tacoma Dome, Pacific Lutheran University, the former Dress Barn in Lakewood Towne Center and several other locations will serve as vaccination sites.

He shared that the City's Nyanza Road project was not selected for the federal Community Project Funding although the South Tacoma Way at 88th Street project is moving forward for federal transportation funding.

He then reported that Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS) has submitted a revised Western State Hospital Master Facility Plan and the city is reviewing the document for completion prior to posting the project webpage.

He shared that the Public Safety Advisory Committee has inquired about pedestrian crossing at Clover Creek Drive SW and the City has requested that Sound Transit include pedestrian access as part of a potential project as part of the Lakewood Sounder Station improvements.

CITY COUNCIL COMMENTS

Councilmember Moss shared that she will be attending the Lakewood's Promise Advisory Board meeting this week.

Councilmember Belle shared that she participated in the Lakewood Arts Commission public art selection meetings.

Deputy Mayor Whalen spoke about the Lakewood Arts Commission public art subcommittee meetings. He requested that the City Council increase the spending to \$150,000 for the Colonial Plaza public art project. Discussion ensued and it was recommended that the 2021 Carry Forward Budget Adjustment include funding up to \$150,000 for the Colonial Plaza public art project.

Mayor Anderson announced that the City Council will recess into Execution Session for approximately 15 minutes pursuant to RCW 42.30.110(1)(b) to consider the selection of a site or the acquisition of real estate by lease or purchase when public knowledge regarding such consideration would cause a likelihood of increased price and for approximately 15 minutes pursuant to 42.30.110(1)(i) to discuss with legal counsel representing the city litigation or potential litigation. The City Council is not expected to take action following the Executive Session.


FISCAL IMPACT (continued from page 1):

The original allocation for the Maple St. Sanitary Sewer Extension project was \$981,000. The Engineer's Estimate for the project was \$988,253.77.

Five (5) general Contractors submitted competitive bids for this project and the low bid was \$192,341.48 (or 19%) less than the Engineer's Estimate.

The contruction contract with a ten percent construction contingency is \$875,503.52. Design costs for the project team were around \$50,000. Construction administration costs are expected to be \$35,000.

It is anticipated the project expenditures will be \$910,503.

Overview

The City of Lakewood and Pierce County has selected SCJ Alliance (SCJ) to provide professional services to develop preliminary design for stormwater and public access improvements at Seeley Lake Park. SCJ Alliance is under contract with the City of Lakewood; however, our agreement terminated December 31, 2020. The following amendment has been prepared due to the extended time frame and additional efforts to complete the construction documents, perform bidding support services, construction administration, and project closeout. It is intended that the design and construction will be completed in 2021.

This amendment includes efforts associated with finalizing the conceptual design as well as preparing construction documents, providing bidding support and construction administration.

Phase 1 – Conceptual Design Completion (2021)

SCJ commenced with conceptual design in 2020; however, there are a few tasks to be completed prior to advancing to permitting and preparation of construction documents. The following tasks will be performed:

- Update draft version of the conceptual plan to incorporate the preferred alternatives.

- Update rough order of magnitude cost estimate for selected improvements.
- Present final conceptual plan to City of Lakewood.

There is approximately \$6,000 remaining and will be moved to Phase 2.





All designs, drawings, specifications, notes, data, sample materials, reports and other tangible documents developed by M2C are instruments of service and as such remain the property of M2C. It is expressly agreed that all documents are only for use on the projects identified in this Agreement. M2C shall be held harmless against all loss, damage, liability, and claim resulting from the use of any documents not authorized by the Agreement. The Client agrees that all documents furnished to the Client or his agents and assigns, which are not paid for, will be returned upon demand and will not be used for any purpose.

7.0 Compensation and Payment:

Compensation will be in accordance with the scope of services, budgets and fee schedules described in this Agreement. M2C will render invoices monthly, either as a final or progress billing, and will be payable upon receipt. An account becomes past due thirty (30) days after receipt of an invoice. Interest will be charged at a rate of 1.5% per month on past-due accounts.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the City Council authorize the City Manager to to enter into contract for services with DP Excavations in the amount of \$140,672, plus costs for asbestos abatement and removal, for the purpose of demolishing portions of an existing apartment complex known as Village at Oak Meadows Apartments, located at 7127 150 Street SW.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: The property is located at 7127 150th St. SW, Lakewood, WA and consists of twenty nine (29) individual assessor parcels, numbered sequentially 4002590010 – 4002590290. The site is a commercial property with a long-developed multifamily apartment complex commonly known as the Village at Oak Meadows Apartments (or the Roann Apartments). The apartment complex consists of twenty seven (27) multi-unit apartment buildings, of single- and double-story construction, and multiple storage and accessory buildings. The present zoning of the property is Industrial Business Park (IBP). The existing apartment complex is a nonconforming use.

<u>ALTERNATIVE(S)</u>: None. These properties have been deemed public nuisances by the City. Failure to take action could potentially subject the City to liability claims.

<u>FISCAL IMPACT</u>: Property abatement funds are found in Fund 105. There is also an agreed abatement order with the property owner to reimburse the City for all expenses incurred. There should be no fiscal impact upon the City.

<u>DISCUSSION, CONTINUED</u>: The property has been inspected multiple times by staff, the first on August 7, 2018 when staff conducted a RHSP inspection and noted multiple failing conditions. The property has been degrading for years and continues to remain a nuisance property to this day. The owner is in the process of closing the property by the end of June 2021.

The City entered into an Agreed Abatement Order with the property owner on October 29, 2020. The Order provides the City with access to the property to remove all dangerous and nuisance conditions present. The Order provides for full reimbursement of all expenses incurred by the City for this process. It should be noted the City worked with this same owner on a similar property (7305 146th St. SW) to address dangerous and nuisance conditions and received full reimbursement of expenses. The City is confident of expense reimbursement, however should there arise the need, the City may recoup all expenses through the process of filing a tax lien through lis pendence and filing with the Pierce County Assessor. If a tax lien is filed it carries 12 percent interest per annum.

The property currently has 15 vacant structures (7105, 7107, 7109, 7111, 7115, 7117, 7119, 7121, 7125, 7131, 7217E, 7219, 7223, 7225, and 7227) with 9 under abatement contract (7107, 7109, 7119, 7121, 7125, 7131, 7217E, 7219, and 7227). See the figure below which shows buildings and address locations. With the owner planning to close the property by the end of June 2021, buildings are continuously being vacated.



Through a competitive bid process, the City is proposing to contract with DP Excavation for \$140,672. This cost amount does not include asbestos abatement/removal. Current practice is to account for asbestos abatement/removal through a follow-up change order. This two-step process expedites demolition and land clearing. City proposes to follow the same practice with this project, but given its

size and the era in which the buildings were constructed (where asbestos use was widespread), in full disclosure, the cost for abatement/removal is estimated at \$240,000.

The property has a history of structure fires and transients occupying the property. Recently the property has suffered multiple fires with 7109, 7119, 7217, and 7131 involved in structure fires. The contractor recently secured the property by boarding up all vacant structures. Demolition of the 15 vacant structures is anticipated to be completed by June 2021. The City will negotiate with the owner as to whether it will complete the remaining 12 structures or have the owner complete the demolition. Full demolition of all structures is anticipated to be completed by end of summer 2021.

Background

The Property is located at 7127 150th St. SW, Lakewood, WA and consists of twenty nine (29) individual parcels, numbered sequentially 4002590010 – 4002590290, as described above. The site is a commercial property with a long-developed multifamily apartment complex commonly known as the Roann Apartments or Village at Oak Meadows Apartments. The apartment complex consists of twenty seven (27) multi-unit apartment buildings, of single- and double-story construction, and multiple storage and accessory buildings. The present zoning of the property is Industrial.

The Property came to the City's attention on August 7, 2018 when Jeff Gumm, Program Manager inspected the Property on report of code and building violations by multiple tenants. Inspection of the Property found multiple violations as identified below:

Common Areas. The Property had large amounts of dog feces in many areas, and the garbage area was found to be overflowing with garbage. Multiple mattresses and pieces of furniture were scattered about the common areas. Graffiti and gang tags were present on multiple buildings. Many buildings were missing screening which allowed birds and pests entry into

the structures. There was an extensive water leak at the back of the well pump house that appeared to have been ongoing for a lengthy period of time. Many of the buildings suffered from a lack of maintenance with many having failing roof, fascia, and gutter systems; failing or rotten posts, beams, and structural support members; multiple broken windows; improper or missing flashing; evidence of long-standing water damage caused by ongoing water infiltration into roof structures and interior wall and ceiling components; and improper wiring, including bare, exposed and unprotected wiring and components. Additionally, fire extinguishers were discovered to be missing in many required locations; the extinguishers that were found had not been properly serviced on an annual basis as required by the International Fire Code (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Unit 7217 B3. Extensive evidence of water infiltration into the structure was discovered, including water infiltration into the walls and ceilings of the structure. All bedrooms were missing smoke detectors as well as a common hallway smoke detector/carbon monoxide detector. The electrical panel was missing the cover plate leaving the electrical circuitry open and exposed at the hazard of the tenants. The unit was found to have an active infestation of roaches.

Unit 7217 B1. Extensive evidence of water infiltration into the structure was discovered, including water infiltration into the walls and ceilings of the structure. The gutter system was found to be failing and missing sections of gutter. Water damage to the bathroom floor was found behind the toilet and beneath the bathroom sink due to deferred maintenance caused by water leakage from the toilet or other sources. All bedrooms were missing smoke detectors as well as a common hallway smoke detector/carbon monoxide detector. The unit was found to have an active infestation of roaches.

Unit 7217 D2. Extensive evidence of water infiltration into the structure was discovered, including water infiltration into the walls and ceilings of the structure. Water was leaking through the kitchen ceiling vent fan. Water damage to the bathroom floor was found behind the toilet and beneath the bathroom sink due to deferred maintenance caused by water leakage from the toilet or other sources. The electrical panel was missing breaker cover plates leaving wiring exposed. All bedrooms were missing smoke detectors as well as a common hallway smoke detector/carbon monoxide detector. The unit was found to have an active infestation of roaches.

Unit 7223 B. The unit was found to have an active infestation of roaches.

Unit 7223 C. Extensive evidence of water infiltration into the structure was discovered, including water infiltration into the walls and ceilings of the structure. The gutter system was

found to be failing and missing sections of gutter. Water damage to the bathroom floor was found behind the toilet and beneath the bathroom sink due to deferred maintenance caused by water leakage from the toilet or other sources. All bedrooms were missing smoke detectors as well as a common hallway smoke detector/carbon monoxide detector. The kitchen was found to have a faulty electrical outlet.

On September 19, 2018, Program Manager Gumm and Building Inspector Roy Simmons met Ms. Zheng Yin at the Property. Inspection was conducted of the exterior of the buildings and common areas. Ms. Yin was shown the issues concerning the Property, including leaking water system; failing roof systems; failing gutters; broken windows; improper and unprotected wiring; failing siding; water intrusion into structures; missing support posts, beams and members; failing septic systems; excessive ponding on site; and the general lack of maintenance. Permit requirements and repair timelines were discussed.

On January 11, 2019, Program Manager made a follow up inspection of the Property and found the conditions of the site and the building remained unchanged. Many of the buildings suffered from a lack of maintenance with many having failing roof, fascia, and gutter systems; missing, failing, or rotten posts, beams, and structural support members; multiple broken windows; improper or missing flashing; evidence of long-standing water damage caused by ongoing water infiltration into roof structures and structural components; large puddles in driveway along the S and E driveways; and failing or dilapidated siding allowing water infiltration. The garbage area was littered with multiple mattresses and furniture scattered about. Some replacement of support posts had been made to the Property; however, no permits were found to be issued for the repairs and no inspection was made of the work.

On April 11, 2019, Program Manager Gumm inspected the Property on tenant report of a failed septic system and sewage backing up into tenant's units and onto the grounds directly outside unit 7121. When Program Manager Gumm arrived the tenant showed him a video of sewage backing up outside the building and apartment complex staff pumping the septic tank into a neighboring septic tank. Inspection found the septic tank lid was not secured. The area around the tank was saturated and there was an intense smell of sewage. A corrugated black hose was found leading from the back of the building to the front near the septic tank access. The hose was easily identified as the same hose that was used in the video shown to Program Manager Gumm. The tank lid was lifted and sewage was found to be at or very near the top of the septic tank. Additional code and building violations to unit 7121 included:

Unit 7121 B. Evidence of water infiltration into the structure was discovered, including water infiltration into the walls and ceilings of the structure. Failing roof and gutter systems allowing water to infiltrate and damage structure. Extensive water damage and mold to the bathroom

exterior wall due to long-term deferred maintenance and a failed shower surround allowing water into framing. Improper or failing siding allowing water intrusion into structure. Improper or unprotected electrical wiring. Water damage to the bathroom floor was found behind the toilet and beneath the bathroom sink due to deferred maintenance caused by water leakage from the toilet or other sources.

On June 10, 2019, Program Coordinator Sam Maloney was called to inspect building 7109 due to a strong sewage odor in units. When Program Coordinator Maloney arrived the tenant showed him a video of sewage backing up and being drained into the green space directly behind the building. Inspection noted the septic tank lid was unsecured and smelled of sewage with evidence of a sewage leak along the back (E elevation) of the building. A corrugated black hose was located along the side of the building, similar to the hose located along building 7121. Extinguishers on the building had not been maintained annually with the latest inspection date noted as December 2013. Inspection inside the unit found the following:

Unit 7109 B. Multiple charred outlets; all bedrooms were missing smoke detectors as well as a common hallway smoke detector/carbon monoxide detector; there was a large hole cut into the exterior siding and left exposed to the elements; bird blocking was missing allowing birds and rodents to enter structure; and a failing roof and gutter systems allowing water intrusion into the structure; and leaking plumbing systems and evidence of sewage backing up into this unit.

On September 11, 2019, at the request of the tenants of unit 7223 A, Program Coordinator Maloney inspected the Property for code and building violations noting the following:

Unit 7223 A. Egress windows in second story bedroom would not open; the rear entry slider door would not close properly allowing a large hole in the bottom to stay unclosed and pests and the elements to enter the structure; water damaged walls and finishes; missing or nonfunctional smoke detectors in the bedrooms; faulty or improper baseboard heater; and the unit was found to have an active infestation of roaches.

On September 27, 2019, a notice of inspection findings dating from August 7, 2018 through September 11, 2019, was sent to the property owner. The notice informed the owner the Property was not in compliance with the City's Rental Housing Safety Program as it had not been registered and was operating without a proper license, and informed the owner the entire Property must meet housing inspection protocols no later than October 20, 2019. The notice was resent to the property owner on October 2, 2019.

On November 27, 2019, the Pierce County Health Department recorded a Certificate of Noncompliance, Unapproved Method of Sewage Treatment and Disposal, with the Pierce County Assessor-Treasurer's office concerning 7121 150th St. SW. The filing has never been removed, nor has any release been filed to date.

On January 23, 2020, Program Coordinators Sam Maloney and Heather Holverstott inspected the Property. An inspection of the exterior site and building conditions was conducted with the property owner. Conditions at the property remained primarily unchanged. A follow up inspection was scheduled for January 30, 2020.

On January 30, 2020, Program Manager Gumm and Program Coordinators Maloney, Holverstott and Martha Larkin inspected the Property. All outbuildings and common areas and a total of sixty three (63) individual rental units were inspected in accordance with the City's Rental Housing Safety Program protocols. No buildings or individual units passed inspection. Common code and building violations included failed septic systems; failed roof and gutter systems allowing water infiltration into the structure and framing; failed, improper or unmaintained siding and exterior surfaces allowing water intrusion; failing, missing or damaged structural elements including posts, beams, sheathing, and framing; failed, improper, unprotected, exposed and bare electrical wiring and components; unpermitted and uninspected modification; missing, damaged or altered fire-rated assemblies; broken windows; egress windows that will not properly open or lock to secure; water damage to interior surfaces and finishes; pest infestation; garbage or trash covered premises; missing or nonfunctional smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors; and missing or expired fire extinguishers (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Notification of the January 30, 2020 inspection was emailed to the owner on February 19, 2020. A full inspection report was attached with a completion deadline of March 30, 2020.

On August 7, 2020, a Notice of Rental Housing Safety Program (RHSP) Noncompliant Unit Notification was mailed via USPS and emailed to the owner of the Property. The letter noted the entire Property was not in compliance with the RHSP program as a re-inspection was never scheduled by the owner, nor was any re-inspection made of the Property to confirm repairs had been made. The letter mandated a re-inspection of the Property on September 10, 2020, with all units non-passing units being considered noncompliant units. The letter also included notification the Property continued to operate illegally without proper license and included a requirement to have an assessment of the Property's entire septic system conducted by an approved Pierce County sewer contractor and have the assessment results provided to the City no later than September 10, 2020.

On September 9, 2020, Program Manager Gumm and Program Coordinator met on site to conduct a pre-inspection of the Property. The owner, Ms. Yin, met Program Manager Gumm and Coordinator Maloney and informed them the repairs had not been completed and that they were continuing to work to close down units that did not comply. Ms. Yin stated some of the repairs had been made but the Property was not fully completed and ready for inspection. She did state the septic at unit 7121 had been repaired. No other repairs had been made. Ms. Yin requested a meeting with Dave Bugher, Assistant City Manager for Development to discuss the Property.

Assistant City Manager Bugher, Program Manager Gumm and Ms. Yin met at 4:00 p.m. on September 9, 2020 to discuss the Property. Ms. Yin provided details on the repairs and her intent to redevelop the Property. Mr. Bugher discussed the City's position regarding the unsafe conditions at the Property. Ms. Yin agreed to provide the City with a schedule of repair for the entire Property and a complete assessment of the septic systems by September 21, 2020. To date, no such documents have been received. Only partial repair schedules have been submitted; however, they lack any completion dates and the City never received an assessment of the Property's septic systems.

On October 28, 2020, Program Manager Gumm and Ms. Yin met at 12:30 p.m. to discuss the Agreed Abatement Order of 7127 150th St. SW. Ms. Yin proposed to allow the City to complete the abatement of dangerous buildings 7131, 7107, 7109, and 7219, to clean out and board up all vacant buildings, assist tenants currently living in units 7107, 7109 and 7219 with relocation assistance pursuant to RCW 59.18.085, and decommission utilities to demolished buildings as required. Ms. Yin also proposed to have a list of buildings that will remain vacant and/or be demolished, and all buildings that are to be repaired and occupied. She said she would provide the list to the City within two weeks.

Current Nuisance Conditions.

While limited progress has been made to address the code and building violations, the Property remains a nuisance property, with multiple structures remaining vacant, abandoned and unsafe to occupy. Common code and building violations include failed roof and gutter systems allowing water infiltration into the structures and framing; extensive water damage to interior finishes and structural components; failed septic systems; failed, improper or unmaintained siding and exterior surfaces allowing water intrusion; failing, missing or damaged structural elements including posts, beams, sheathing, and framing; improper, unprotected, exposed and bare electrical wiring and components; unpermitted and uninspected modification; missing, damaged or altered fire-rated assemblies; broken windows; egress windows that will not properly open or lock to secure; pest infestation; garbage or trash covered premises; missing or nonfunctional smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors; and missing or expired fire extinguishers (inspection cards noted December

2013 as last inspection date). To date, there has been no application of permits to correct any code or building deficiencies on this Property.

In accordance with chapter 15.05 of the Lakewood Municipal Code (LMC) (Adoption of International Codes); chapter 8.16 of LMC (Public Nuisances); chapter 8.40 of LMC (Property Maintenance); chapter 35.80 RCW (Unfit Dwellings, Building, and Structures); chapter 7.48 RCW (Public Nuisance), the state and condition of this Property constitutes a general nuisance and hazard to the public, the Property contains one or more dangerous buildings, and is therefore subject to abatement.

Non-Compliant with Rental Safety.

The Property is not in compliance with the City's inspection protocols pursuant to LMC 5.60.080 (Inspection and Certificate of Compliance Required) and LMC 5.60.100 (Unlawful to Rent Noncompliant Units). On September 15, 2020, the City posted the Property with a Notice of Rental Housing Safety Program (RHSP) Noncompliant Properties notice. The notice identified 7101 through 7229 150th St. SW as noncompliant units. All occupied units were posted along with notices at the manager's office and at all common mailbox locations.

Violations - Danger Declared.

A. Due to unsafe conditions and modifications, improper use, damage, and dilapidation, the buildings and structures are dangerous or unfit for human habitation or other uses, as defined by LMC 15A.05.090, as follows:

1. Any door, aisle, passageway, stairway, exit or other means of egress that does not conform to the approved building or fire code of the jurisdiction as related to the requirements for existing buildings.

Building #7131- The building has been illegally converted from a pool house/common space into a single family habitable space without proper permit or inspection (IBC Section 105), creating a bedroom which lacks a proper egress window. The entry ramp is so deteriorated and rotten it is unsafe for egress, damage includes holes in the surface, missing railings, rotten and failing railings, and is constructed or repaired with materials that are not for exterior use or properly protected from the elements. The ramp lacks proper hand railings along its length.

Building #7217- Multiple bedroom windows in F units do onto operate properly for egress.

Building #7225- Unit C lacks proper bedroom window egress requirements.

Building #7227- The space has been modified without proper permit or inspection (IBC Section 105). The entry door has a double deadbolt installed that does not allow safe egress from the structure without special knowledge or equipment.

2. The walking surface of any aisle, passage, stairway, exit or other means of egress is so warped, worn loose, torn, or otherwise unsafe as to not provide safe and adequate means of egress.

Building #7101- Sections of the soffits and fascia are extensively water damaged due to failing or missing roof and gutter systems. Sections of gutters have fallen along the N elevation.

Building #7103- Sections of the soffits and fascia are extensively water damaged due to failing or missing roof and gutter systems.

Building #7105- The building has multiple support posts which are rotten and damaged such that they subject to failure or collapse. Sections of the soffits are extensively water damaged due to failing or missing roof and gutter systems. Sections of fascia have already failed and have fallen away from the structure.

Building #7107- The building has multiple support posts which are rotten and damaged such that they subject to failure or collapse. Sections of the soffits are extensively water damaged due to failing or missing roof and gutter systems. Sections of fascia have already failed and have fallen away from the structure

Building #7109- Sections of the soffits and fascia are extensively water damaged due to failing or missing roof and gutter systems.

Building #7217B- The building had multiple support posts which were rotten, damaged or missing. Support posts have been replaced without proper permit or inspection. Sections of the soffits are extensively water damaged due to failing or missing roof and gutter systems.

Building #7217C- The building had multiple support posts which were rotten, damaged or missing. Support posts have been replaced without proper permit or inspection. Sections of the soffits are extensively water damaged due to failing or missing roof and gutter systems.

Building #7217D- The building had multiple support posts which were rotten, damaged or missing. Support posts have been replaced without proper permit or inspection.

Sections of the soffits are extensively water damaged due to failing or missing roof and gutter systems.

Building #7221- Sections of the soffits are extensively water damaged due to failing or missing roof and gutter systems.

Building #7223- Sections of the soffits are extensively water damaged due to failing or missing roof and gutter systems. Sections of fascia have already failed and have fallen away from the structure.

6. The building or structure, or any portion thereof, is clearly unsafe for its use and occupancy.

Building #7101- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building has an unrepaired broken window and others that do not lock properly leaving units unsecured. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. The building has active water leaks. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7103- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building has windows that do not lock properly leaving units unsecured. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7105- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. Multiple units have active plumbing leaks and fixtures that do not operate properly. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building has an unrepaired broken window and others that do not lock properly leaving units unsecured. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and

structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. Several support posts are rotten and subject to failure. Heating systems do not function properly in all units. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7107- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The structure has strong odor of sewage in multiple units. Multiple units have active plumbing leaks and drainage systems do not work properly in multiple units. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building has windows that do not lock properly leaving units unsecured. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system and improperly installed and maintained siding. Several support posts are rotten and subject to failure. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7109- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The structure has strong odor of sewage in multiple units. Multiple units have active plumbing leaks and drainage systems do not work properly in multiple units. The building has open and exposed wiring and multiple scorched/burned outlets in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building has broken windows and windows that do not lock properly leaving units unsecured. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system and improperly installed and maintained siding. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7111- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. Multiple units have active plumbing leaks and fixtures that do not work as designed. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building has windows and doors that do not lock properly leaving units unsecured. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. Multiple units suffer from extensive mold to interior finishes due to prolonged water intrusion. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7113- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building has windows and doors that do not lock properly leaving units unsecured. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system and improperly installed and maintained

siding. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7115- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building has windows and doors that do not lock properly and windows that are broken or missing leaving units unsecured. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system and improperly installed and maintained siding. Heating systems do not function properly in all units. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7117- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. Multiple units have active plumbing leaks and fixtures that do not work as designed. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building has windows and doors that do not lock properly and windows that are broken or missing leaving units unsecured. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system and improperly installed and maintained siding. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7121- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. Multiple units have active plumbing leaks and drainage systems do not work properly in multiple units. The septic system for this building has been decommissioned. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building has windows and doors that do not lock properly and windows that are broken or missing leaving units unsecured. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system and improperly installed

and maintained siding. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7123- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. Multiple units have active plumbing leaks and drainage systems do not work properly in multiple units. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7125- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. Multiple units have active plumbing leaks. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7127- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The building has active plumbing leaks and fixtures that do not work as designed. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. Several support posts are rotten and subject to failure. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7129- Unit lacks functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. Several support posts are rotten and subject to failure. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7131- The second story of the building has been illegally converted from a pool house/common space into a single family habitable space without proper permit or inspection (IBC Section 105), creating a bedroom, a kitchen and bathroom. The space has had electrical and mechanical modification without proper permit or inspection. The building has windows that are broken, missing, or that do not lock properly. The entry ramp is so deteriorated and rotten it is unsafe for egress, damage includes holes in the surface, missing railings, rotten and failing railings, and is constructed or repaired with materials that are not for exterior use or properly protected from the elements. The ramp lacks proper hand railings along its length.

The first story of the building has broken out and boarded up windows, and structural modification without proper permit or inspection. A window opening has been reframed and sheathed over with ½" tile backer board without proper permit or inspection (IBC Section 105). The building has extensive open, exposed, and bare wiring, and electrical modification without permit or inspection in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The fire separation between the first and second floors has been removed or has failed along much of the ceiling and many of the walls. The interior of the space is littered with garbage, debris, and miscellaneous construction debris and scrap.

The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. The siding has not been properly maintained and is allowing water intrusion in several areas. A small attached and covered pump house along the W elevation is not properly secured, has a severely rotten and failing roof system, and has ongoing water intrusion into an electrical service panel and electrical components. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7217A- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. Multiple units have active plumbing leaks and fixtures that do not work as designed. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building has windows that do not lock properly and windows that are broken or missing leaving units unsecured. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system and improperly installed and maintained siding. Heating systems do not function properly in all units. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7217B- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. Multiple units have active plumbing leaks and fixtures that do not work as designed. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building has windows that do not lock properly and windows that are broken or missing leaving units unsecured. Multiple windows have been replaced without proper permit or inspection (IBC Section 105). The building had multiple support posts which were rotten, damaged or missing. Support posts have been replaced without proper permit or inspection (IBC Section 105). The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system and improperly installed and maintained siding. The roof is in poor repair with many sections no longer weather resistant. Multiple units suffer from extensive mold to interior finishes

due to prolonged water intrusion. Heating systems do not function properly in all units. Multiple units suffer from pest infestation. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7217C- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. Multiple units have active plumbing leaks and fixtures that do not work as designed. The building had multiple support posts which were rotten, damaged or missing. Support posts have been replaced without proper permit or inspection (IBC Section 105). The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system and improperly installed and maintained siding. The roof is in poor repair with many sections no longer weather resistant. Heating systems do not function properly in all units. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7217D- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The building had multiple support posts which were rotten, damaged or missing. Support posts have been replaced without proper permit or inspection (IBC Section 105). The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system and improperly installed and maintained siding. The roof is in poor repair with many sections no longer weather resistant. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7217E- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system and improperly installed and maintained siding. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7217F- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The building has windows that do not lock properly and windows that are broken or missing leaving units unsecured. Windows in the building have been replaced without proper permit or inspection (IBC Section 105). The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system and improperly installed and maintained siding. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7219- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The structure has active plumbing leaks, fixtures that do not work as designed, and drainage systems that do not work properly in multiple units. The building has open and exposed wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building has windows that do not lock properly and windows that are broken or missing leaving units unsecured. Windows in the building have been replaced without proper permit or inspection (IBC Section 105). The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7221- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The structure has active plumbing leaks and fixtures that do not work as designed. The building has improper wiring in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. Multiple units suffer from pest infestation. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7223- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The building has active plumbing leaks and fixtures that do not work as designed. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. Heating systems do not function properly in all units. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7225- Units lack functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The building has windows that do not lock properly and windows that are broken or missing leaving units unsecured. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. Multiple units suffer from extensive mold to interior finishes due to prolonged water intrusion. Multiple units suffer from pest infestation. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7227- The structure has been illegally modified without proper permit or inspection (IBC Section 105). The entry door has a double deadbolt installed that does not allow safe egress from the structure without special knowledge or equipment. The building lacks functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The roof is actively leaking into the SE elevation causing extensive water damage to the structure. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural

elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. Required fire separation has not been maintained between storage areas and living spaces. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

7. The building or structure is neglected, damaged, dilapidated, unsecured or abandoned so as to become an attractive nuisance to children who might play in the building or structure to their danger, becomes a harbor for vagrants, criminals or immoral persons, or enables persons to resort to the building or structure for committing a nuisance or an unlawful act.

The Property has multiple unoccupied and vacant units that remain unsecured.

The Property remains littered with garbage, trash, debris, discarded furniture, mattresses, multiple inoperable vehicles, dead/fallen trees and overgrown vegetation.

8. Any building or structure has been constructed, exists or is maintained in violation of any specific requirement or prohibition applicable to such building or structure provided by the approved building or fire code of the jurisdiction, or any law or ordinance to such an extent as to present either a substantial risk of fire, building collapse or any other threat to life and safety.

All buildings lack proper smoke detectors, carbon monoxide detectors and have fire extinguishers which are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Buildings #7227 and 7131 have been illegally modified without proper permit or inspection, including electrical, mechanical, and structural modification. Required fire separation between storage areas and living spaces have been compromised, altered, or completely removed.

The Property has multiple unoccupied and vacant units that have not had all combustible materials, junk, trash, building material, and furnishings completely removed and all doors and windows secured. Section 311 of the 2015 International Fire Code requires all vacant buildings shall remove all accumulations of combustible materials, flammable or combustible waste or rubbish and shall securely lock or otherwise secure doors, windows and other openings to prevent entry by unauthorized persons.

The Property remains littered with garbage, trash, debris, discarded furniture, mattresses, multiple inoperable vehicles, dead/fallen trees and overgrown vegetation.

9. A building or structure, used or intended to be used for dwelling purposes, because of inadequate maintenance, dilapidation, decay, damage, faulty construction or arrangement, inadequate light, ventilation, mechanical or plumbing system, or otherwise, is determined by the Public Officer to be unsanitary, unfit for human habitation or in such a condition that is likely to cause sickness or disease.

Buildings #7107, 7109, 7219 and 7121 all have failed or failing septic systems. The septic system for Building #7121 has been decommissioned and is awaiting approval from the Pierce County Health Department.

All buildings suffer from a lack of maintenance and water infiltration causing damage to interior finishes and structural components resulting from failing roof and gutter systems. Many structures have failing or improperly maintained siding and flashing allowing water infiltration and pest entry into structures.

Buildings #7131 and 7227 have been illegally modified without permit or inspection (IBC Section 105), including structural, electrical, and mechanical modification. Required fire separation between storage and living space has been compromised, altered, or completely removed.

10. Any building or structure, because of lack of sufficient or proper fire-resistant-rated construction, fire protection systems, electrical system, fuel connections, mechanical system, plumbing system or other cause, is determined by the Public Officer to be a threat to life or health.

Building #7227- The structure has been illegally modified without proper permit or inspection (IBC Section 105). The entry door has a double deadbolt installed that does not allow safe egress from the structure without special knowledge or equipment. The building lacks functioning smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The roof is actively leaking into the SE elevation causing extensive water damage to the structure. The building suffers from prolonged water intrusion into interior finishes and structural elements caused by a failing roof and gutter system. Required fire separation has not been maintained between storage areas and living spaces. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

Building #7131- The second story of the building has been illegally converted from a pool house/common space into a single family habitable space without proper permit or inspection (IBC Section 105), creating a bedroom, a kitchen and bathroom. The space has had electrical and mechanical modification without proper permit or inspection.

The first story of the building has broken out and boarded up windows, and structural modification without proper permit or inspection. A window opening has been reframed and sheathed over with '4" tile backer board without proper permit or inspection (IBC Section 105). The building has extensive open, exposed, and bare wiring, and electrical modification without permit or inspection in violation of RCW 19.28.101. The required fire separation between the first and second floors has been removed or has failed along much of the ceiling and many of the walls. The interior of the space is littered with garbage, debris, and miscellaneous construction debris and scrap.

A small attached and covered pump house along the W elevation is not properly secured, has a severely rotten and failing roof system, and has ongoing water intrusion into an electrical service panel and electrical components. Fire extinguishers are missing or expired (inspection cards noted December 2013 as last inspection date).

B. Due to the above acts, omissions, places, conditions or things, the Property is considered an annoyance of others and a danger to the health and safety of the public in violation of the following:

8.16.010 Nuisances Affecting Public Health.

The following specific acts, omissions, places, conditions and things are declared to be nuisances: the erecting, maintaining, using, placing, depositing, causing, allowing, leaving, or permitting to be or remain in or upon any private lot, building, structure, or premises, or in or upon any street, avenue, alley, park, parkway, or other public or private place in the City, any one or more of the following places, conditions, things or acts to the prejudice, danger, or annoyance of others:

- B. Filthy, littered or trash-covered premises, including all buildings and structures thereon and areas adjacent thereto;
- D. Trash, litter, rags, debris, accumulations of empty barrels, boxes, crates, packing cases, mattresses, bedding, excelsior, packing hay, straw, or other packing material, lumber not neatly piled, scrap iron, tin and other metal not neatly piled which provides harborage for rodents, or other pests;
- E. Any unsightly and dangerous building, billboard or structure;
- J. Blackberry vines or any tall grass or weeds over two feet in height which are rodent infested.
- K. Grass clippings, cut brush or cut weeds which may create fly or rodent harborage.

8.40.020 Duty to Maintain Property.

- A. No person owning, or responsible for any property by virtue of leasing, renting, occupying, or being in possession or having charge of any property in the City, including vacant lots, shall maintain or allow to be maintained on such property, except as may be permitted by any other City ordinance, any of the following conditions visible from any public street or alley, or from any other private property:
- 1. Junk, trash, litter, boxes, discarded lumber, salvage materials, or other similar materials in any front yard, side yard, rear yard or vacant lot;
- 3. Broken or discarded furniture, household equipment and furnishings in any front yard, side yard, rear yard or vacant lot;
- 5. Dead, decayed, diseased or hazardous trees, or any other vegetation to include a majority of vegetation (other than vegetation located in flower beds) which is dangerous to public health, safety and welfare, located in any front yard, side yard, rear yard, or upon any vacant lot;
- 9. Any accumulation of weeds, brambles, berry vines, or other vegetation which is overgrowing any structure or which exceeds an average height of 15 inches, or any accumulation of junk, litter, trash, dead organic matter, debris, offal, rat harborages, stagnant water, combustible materials and similar materials or conditions constituting fire, health or safety hazard;
- 10. Dilapidation or state of filthiness or uncleanness of any dwelling or other structure which endangers health or life or which permits entrance by rats, mice or other rodents.

8.40.030 Declaration of public nuisance.

Any property found to be maintained in violation of LMC 8.40.020 is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and shall be abated by rehabilitation, removal, trimming, demolition or repair. [Ord. 46 § 1, 1996.]

Agreed Order

1. All owners and parties in interest, including but not limited to Y@Z LLC, a Washington Limited Liability Company, formerly Roann Apartments, LLC, or Roann Apartments, LLC, are hereby ordered to clean up the Property and remove the nuisance and dangerous building conditions, as follows:

- Immediately cease the use and occupancy of Building #7121, as the septic system for this building has been decommissioned, and the building has been declared dangerous. The building may be entered only for the purposes of inspection, removing contents, and for work directly associated with repairing it/them or preparing it/them for repair or demolition.
- Immediately cease the use and occupancy of Building #7107, 7109, and 7219, as these buildings have been declared dangerous. This declaration shall remain in place until the City is in receipt of a report of assessment of septic system for these units by an approved Pierce County septic contractor. Re-occupancy of the units will not be granted unless the assessment documents the systems are fully operational with no deficiencies that would impair the system's operations or all noted deficiencies have been corrected. The buildings may be entered only for the purposes of inspection, removing contents, and for work directly associated with repairing it/them or preparing it/them for repair or demolition.
- Immediately cease the use and occupancy of Building #7131 and 7227, as they have been declared dangerous. The buildings may be entered only for the purposes of inspection, removing contents, and for work directly associated with repairing it/them or preparing it/them for repair or demolition.
- Provide the City with a project schedule and timeline detailing the following no later than November 15, 2020:
 - 1. Buildings to be demolished;
 - 2. Buildings to be vacated and boarded up;
 - 3. Buildings to be repaired and occupied;
 - 4. Specific units tenants will be relocated from and to in order to accomplish building vacations; and
 - 5. A timeline detailing major milestones and project completion.
- Remove all combustible materials, flammable or combustible waste or rubbish from all vacant or unoccupied units no later than <u>November 30, 2020</u>. Securely board up all doors, windows and other openings of all vacant or unoccupied units to prevent entry by unauthorized persons no later than <u>December 11, 2020</u>.
- Remove and legally dispose of all junk, trash, garbage, debris, discarded furniture, mattresses, inoperable or apparently inoperable vehicles, construction debris, tires, overgrown vegetation, brush, fallen dead trees, and similar conditions no later than November 30, 2020.
- Submit complete* applications for permits to demolish or repair ALL buildings noted in this order no later than <u>December 15, 2020</u>. Permit application to include electrical permit application to be submitted to the appropriate electrical purveyor. [*Applications are not considered complete unless they include detailed plans, engineering analysis (if required), contractor information, all applicable fees, and other documents or criteria specified on the

- permit application cover page.]
- For all buildings to be demolished, complete the demolition and cleanup of the building(s) no later than <u>January 30, 2021</u>,
- For all buildings to be repaired, complete the repairs no later than April 30, 2021 or 120 days after repair permits are issued, whichever occurs later or as otherwise specified in writing by the Building Official.
- Ensure the Property is maintained in a secured condition until all repair or demolition and cleanup work is completed.
- Leave the Property in a thoroughly clean, safe condition, free of debris, litter, holes, sharp drops, hazards or other unsafe or nuisance conditions.
- 2. All owners and parties in interest, including but not limited to Y@Z LLC, a Washington Limited Liability Company, formerly Roann Apartments, LLC, or Roann Apartments, LLC, agree to the following:
 - For all buildings closed as a result of this order, the property owner(s) agrees to reimburse all tenants occupying those units at the time of closure, relocation assistance in accordance with RCW 59.18.085 as it relates to a governmental condemnation or posting of a unit as unlawful to occupy. If relocation assistance is paid by the City of Lakewood, the owner agrees to reimburse the City of Lakewood for those expenses incurred.
 - Reimburse the City of Lakewood for all costs associated with this Agreed Abatement Order and all time, materials, and related expenses required to address and correct all dangerous and nuisance conditions present on this Property.
 - The owner(s) consents to allow the City of Lakewood, and any contractors or entities contracted by the City, access to the Property to conduct clean up, repair or demolition activities associated with this agreement.
 - The owner(s) agree to allow the City of Lakewood access to the Property to demolish buildings 7107, 7109, 7121, 7131, and 7219.
 - The owner(s) agree to allow the City of Lakewood access to the Property to remove and legally dispose of all combustible materials, flammable or combustible waste or rubbish from all vacant or unoccupied units and securely board up all doors, windows and other openings of all vacant or unoccupied units to prevent entry by unauthorized persons.
 - The owner(s) agree to allow the City of Lakewood access to the Property to remove and legally dispose of all junk, trash, garbage, debris, discarded furniture, mattresses, inoperable or apparently inoperable vehicles, construction debris, tires, overgrown vegetation, brush, fallen dead trees, and similar conditions.
- 3. Demolition shall be conducted according to all applicable laws and regulations, including but not limited to asbestos survey and removal by properly certified and licensed contractor(s), capping of utilities in accordance with the requirements of each utility, and a demolition permit from the City of Lakewood. Demolition shall include removal and legal disposal of all parts and components of the structure, including footings, foundation, and slab(s), and all associated materials and debris. All other junk, scrap and salvage materials, inoperable or apparently inoperable vehicles, overgrown vegetation, and debris shall be removed from the property. All

such materials shall be removed from the property and disposed in a legal manner. Depressions created by removal of foundations, footings or slabs are to be filled and graded level.

- 4. If the owner or other parties in interest fail to comply with the provisions of this order, the Public Officer will direct or cause such dwelling, building, structure, or premises to be removed or demolished. The Public Official is authorized to enter the property and buildings for inspection, testing, sampling, or other purposes preparatory to and in the conduct the removal or demolition, or other actions, to hire contractors as necessary to perform the work and to spend public funds to complete the work. The amount of the cost of such removal or demolition by the Public Officer shall be assessed against the real property.
- 5. It should be noted this Property is not in conformance with the City's Rental Housing Safety Program. As such, any person(s) failing to comply with any of the requirements of the Rental Housing Safety Program requirements may be subject to an infraction of \$150 per day for the first 10 days that the violation or failure to comply exists and \$500 per day for every day thereafter. Additional penalty may include license revocation or suspension pursuant to LMC 5.60 and subject to LMC 5.02.

LIMITED PUBLIC WORKS CONTRACT FOR ABATEMENT SERVICES AT 7127 150th St. SW

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into on this 29th day of March 2021, by and between the City of Lakewood, a municipal corporation of the State of Washington hereinafter referred to as the "City" and DP Excavation, hereinafter referred to as the "Contractor".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the property at 7127 150th St. SW in Lakewood, Washington, has/have been determined to contain dangerous building(s), dangerous condition(s); and trash, junk, debris and garbage. The property has become a danger to the public, and exists to the detriment and annoyance of the community; and,

WHEREAS, on October 29, 2020, the Owner entered into an Agreed Abatement Order, #A0069, with the City of Lakewood; and,

WHEREAS, the Agreed Abatement Order authorizes the City of Lakewood to address and clean up all dangerous and nuisance conditions associated with this property, including demolition and haul away of all debris associated with buildings 7107, 7109, 7119, 7121, 7125, 7131, 7217E, 7219, and 7227; and,

WHEREAS, in accordance with the City's legal abatement action, the City is in need of services of individuals, employees or firms for removal of the garbage, demolition debris and other conditions constituting such public nuisance; and,

WHEREAS, the City desires to retain the Contractor to provide such services in connection with the City's action to abate the dangerous condition(s) and public nuisance; and,

WHEREAS, the Contractor is qualified and able to provide abatement services in connection with the City's needs for the above-described work, and is willing and agreeable to provide such services upon the terms and conditions herein contained.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. <u>Limited Public Works Contract</u>

Based upon the nature of this action and the anticipated cost, it is a limited public works project pursuant to RCW 39.04.155. Prevailing wage requirements apply to this work. This work is <u>not exempt</u> from performance and payment bond, and said performance and payment bond shall be presented to the City prior to commencement of any work by the Contractor. A total of 5% retainage of the total compensation shall be held for thirty (30) days after completion of work or until all releases are obtained.

2. E-Verify

The Contractor and any subcontractors shall comply with E-Verify as set forth in Lakewood Municipal Code Chapter 1.42. E-Verify is an Internet-based system operated by United States Citizenship and Immigration Services in partnership with the Social Security

Administration. E-Verify is free to employers and is available in all 50 states. E-Verify provides an automated link to federal databases to help employers determine employment eligibility of new hires and the validity of their Social Security numbers. The Contractor shall enroll in, participate in and document use of E-Verify as a condition of the award of this contract. The Contractor shall continue participation in E-Verify throughout the course of the Contractor's contractual relationship with the City. If the Contractor uses or employs any subcontractor in the performance of work under this contract, or any subsequent renewals, modifications or extension of this contract, the subcontractor shall register in and participate in E-Verify and certify such participation to the Contractor. The Contractor shall show proof of compliance with this section, and/or proof of subcontractor compliance with this section, within three (3) working days of the date of the City's request for such proof.

3. Scope of Services

The Contractor agrees to perform in a good and professional manner the tasks described as follows at 7127 150th St. SW in Lakewood, Washington:

- a. The Contractor shall act as general contractor and shall be responsible for all aspects of the job, including determining and following all legal and permitting requirements, hiring, managing, and paying any/all subcontractors and service providers, and for all associated documentation and reporting.
- b. Obtain all necessary permits and approvals, including but not limited to City of Lakewood demolition permit, City of Lakewood grading permit (if necessary), Puget Sound Clean Air Agency notification of asbestos removal (if necessary), Pierce County sewer-capping permit or Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department septic decommissioning permit, and water/electrical/gas disconnect, prior to commencement of work.
- c. Conduct an asbestos survey for the property. The Contractor will be responsible to contract with a certified asbestos firm to conduct an asbestos survey of the property prior to conducting any abatement work. A copy of the completed survey must be provided to the City of Lakewood for review.
 - Note: Property has not been tested for asbestos. If asbestos is discovered, the contractor shall be responsible to have a certified asbestos abatement company abate asbestos prior to demolishing structure(s). Should asbestos-containing materials be identified, any and all asbestos abatement work will be negotiated as a change order to the existing demolition contract.
- d. Have all utilities located, disconnected, and properly capped at the point of entry to each building being demolished, or as directed by the utility companies, prior to commencement of work. Water must be disconnected to all buildings to be demolished prior to application for demolition permits. (Note: Lakewood Water District requires that their personnel be present at time the water main is disconnected.)
- e. A right-of-way permit from the City of Lakewood shall be required for any work in or obstruction of the right-of-way. Regardless of whether or not a permit is obtained, the Contractor shall be responsible for any damage to the public right-of-way.
- f. Demolish and completely remove and legally dispose buildings 7107, 7109, 7119, 7121, 7125, 7131, 7217E, 7219, and 7227, including all associated foundations, concrete basement walls, footings, slabs, landings, steps, utilities, and contents. Demolition to

- include removal of storage shed located behind 7219. Proof of legal disposal may be required.
- g. Where buildings were removed, grade site to a consistent, shallow, walkable contour, with no holes or sharp drops. Infill excavation where basement(s) removed to bring up to grade and level with surrounding site. Note: A site development permit from the City of Lakewood will be required for importation or disturbance of more than 25 cubic yards of material.
- h. Spread straw on sites where buildings removed for weed control after the demolition and cleanup have been inspected and approved.
- i. Pursuant to Lakewood Municipal Code section 13.06.020(B)(3), contractor may haul waste from this site in vehicles owned by contractor's business; however, should contractor require a third-party to haul waste from this site, contractor must obtain these services from Waste Connections/LeMay, Inc., the City's contracted refuse hauler. A subcontractor may haul waste from the site only if the hauling is secondary and incidental to their work on the site. (Only fully separated, uncontaminated recyclables may be hauled by a third-party hauler other than the City's refuse contractor. Any such hauler must be properly licensed and permitted to transport recyclables in Lakewood.) Note: The Contractor's hauling plan must be reviewed and approved by Waste Connections/LeMay, Inc., prior to demolition permit application.
- j. Fully separated, uncontaminated recyclables may be hauled by a third-party hauler other than the City's refuse contractor, provided such hauler is properly licensed and permitted to transport recyclables in Lakewood and provided the materials are delivered to a properlylicensed recycling facility.
- k. The contractor will be responsible for security of the site and their equipment during the project.
- At the completion of the project the work site shall be left in a thoroughly clean, safe condition, free of debris, litter, holes, sharp drops, hazards or unsafe conditions; finish grade shall be level. Cover all exposed soil with straw upon completion. The project will not be considered complete until the site has been inspected and approved by an official of the City of Lakewood.

The Contractor shall perform these services as an independent contractor and shall not be deemed, by virtue of this Agreement and the performance thereof, to have entered into any partnership, joint venture, employment or other relationship with the City.

4. Notice: Changes, Additional Services and Amendments

The parties hereto recognize that the City neither owns nor controls the property subject to this Agreement. During the time necessary to implement this Agreement, obtain permits, and prepare for site work, or during or after completion of the job, the site conditions addressed in the contractor's bid and this Agreement may change. In addition, unforeseen circumstances may arise during the prosecution of the job. Such changes in conditions may necessitate changes to the scope of services and associated compensation, or additional work after completion of the job.

5. Changes in Services

In accordance with the foregoing, the parties hereto may agree that the general scope of services and/or site specific scope of services and associated compensation under this Agreement should be changed, whether increased, decreased or modified. Any such agreement(s) shall be set forth in a written change order signed by both parties and executed prior to the Contractor's performance of the services thereunder, except as may be provided to the contrary in Section 7 of this Agreement. Upon proper completion and execution of a change order, the change order shall be incorporated into this Agreement and all other terms and conditions of this Agreement remain in full force and effect. Provided, however, if the terms and conditions of a change order are contrary to the Agreement, the change order shall control. The City Contract Administrator is authorized to sign change orders on behalf of the City pursuant to this Section as long as any increase in compensation is five thousand (\$5,000) dollars or less.

6. Performance of Additional Services Prior to Execution of a Change Order

The parties hereby agree that situations may arise in which the execution of a change order is impractical prior to the commencement of the Contractor's performance of the services requested by the City. The Contractor hereby agrees that it shall perform such services upon the oral request of an authorized representative of the City, pending execution of a change order pursuant to Section 5 of this Agreement, at a rate of compensation to be agreed to in connection therewith. The invoice procedure for any such additional services shall be as described in Section 12 of this Agreement, or as otherwise specifically agreed to in writing by and between the parties.

7. Amendment, Modification or Waiver

Except as authorized in Sections 5 and 6, no amendment, modification or waiver of any condition, provision, or term of this Contract shall be valid or of any effect unless made in writing, signed by the signatories to this Agreement or their duly authorized representative(s) and specifying with particularity the nature and extent of such amendment, modification or waiver. Any waiver by any party, related to any default by the other party, shall not effect or impair any right arising from any subsequent default.

8. Inspection Prior to Starting Site Work

Prior to beginning site work, the Contractor shall inspect the site and shall immediately notify the City's representative of any conditions that differ materially from the conditions represented in the Contractor's bid and this Agreement, which may require a change to the scope of services and a change to the compensation represented in the Agreement. In the event of material changes, site work shall not proceed, except at the Contractor's own risk, until the City has provided instructions to the Contractor in writing or as otherwise provided in this Agreement. Any changes in services or compensation shall be negotiated by the Contractor and the City's representative and shall be made in writing in accordance with Sections 5, 6, and 7 of this Agreement.

9. Contractor's Representations

The Contractor hereby represents and warrants that he has all necessary licenses and certifications to perform the services provided for herein, is not debarred in the State of Washington, and is qualified to perform the services provided for herein.

10. City's Responsibilities

The City shall do the following in a timely manner so as not to delay the services of the Contractor:

- a. Designate herein its Assistant City Manager (Development) as the City's representative with respect to the services. The City's representative, or a duly authorized designee, shall have complete authority to transmit instructions, receive information, interpret and define the City's policies and decisions with respect to the services.
- b. Furnish the Contractor with information, criteria, objectives, schedules and standards for the project and the services provided for herein if necessary for the performance of this Agreement and if such is within the City's dominion, control and ability to provide.
- c. Arrange for reasonable access to the property or facilities as required for the Contractor to perform the services provided for herein.
- d. Examine and evaluate studies, reports, memoranda, plans, sketches, and other documents prepared by the Contractor and render decisions regarding such documents, if such a decision is necessary and possible, in a timely manner to prevent delay of the services.

11. <u>Acceptable Standards</u>

The Contractor shall be responsible to provide, in connection with the services in this Agreement, work product and services of a quality and professional standard acceptable to the sole satisfaction of the City.

12. <u>Compensation</u>

As compensation for the Contractor's performance of the services provided for herein, the City accepts the Contractor's bid, as submitted on October 7, 2019.

A copy of the Contractor's bid, as received by the City is attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit A as if fully set forth herein. Upon completion of the general scope of services and site specific scope of services to the sole satisfaction of the City, the City shall pay the Contractor \$140,672.00, representing the amount of the bid, including sales tax.

The Contractor shall submit to the City an invoice which the City shall process in the next billing/claim cycle following receipt and shall remit payment to the Contractor thereafter in the normal course, subject to all conditions or provisions in this Agreement, including change orders and amendments, and all applicable laws and regulations.

13. <u>Prevailing Wages</u>

In accordance with RCW Chapter 39.12, all laborers, workers, or mechanics of the Contractor and any subcontractors involved in the performance of this contract shall be paid not less than the prevailing rate of wage for their particular trade or occupation as specified in the Washington State Prevailing Wage Rates For Public Works Contracts for Pierce County, in effect on March 9, 2021. The Washington Department of Labor & Industries prevailing wage rates are located at https://fortress.wa.gov/lni/wagelookup/prvWagelookup.aspx. A copy of the Washington State Prevailing Wage Rates For Public Works Contracts for Pierce County is attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit B as if fully set forth herein.

14. Intents and Affidavits

As soon as practicable upon approval of this agreement, and before work begins, the Contractor

and every subcontractor shall file a Statement of Intent to Pay Prevailing Wage (Intent) with the Washington Department of Labor and Industries.

Upon completion of the work, the Contractor and every subcontractor shall file an Affidavit of Wages Paid (Affidavit) with the Department of Labor and Industries.

The City shall make no payments to the contractor until the Contractor submits to the City an Intent that has been approved by the Industrial Statistician of the Department of Labor and Industries. Retainage shall not be paid prior to receipt from the Contractor of a similarly approved Affidavit.

15. Retainage/Subcontractor and Supplier Liens

Pursuant to RCW Chapter 39.08, and based upon the amount of the Contract being more than thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000), the City and Contractor agree that the Contractor shall provide a performance/payment bond to the City prior to commencement of any work, and the City shall retain five percent (5%) of the Contract amount for a period of thirty (30) days after the date of final acceptance, or until receipt of all necessary approvals and final documents and settlement of any liens filed under RCW Chapter 60.28, whichever is later.

Upon non-payment by the Contractor, any supplier or subcontractor may file a lien against the retained funds, pursuant to RCW Chapter 39.08. Subcontractors or suppliers are required to give notice of any lien or claim within thirty (30) days of the completion of the Work and in the manner provided in RCW 39.08.030. After completion of all Work on the Contract and passage of thirty (30) days, the City shall release and pay in full the retained fund, unless the City has not received all necessary releases, approvals and documents as described herein and/or the City has become aware of outstanding claims made against said funds.

16. Prevailing Wage Dispute Resolution

In accordance with the provisions of RCW 39.12, if any dispute arises as to what are the prevailing rates of wages for work of a similar nature and such dispute cannot be adjusted by the parties in interest, including labor and management representatives, the matter shall be referred for arbitration to the director of the Washington Department of Labor and Industries and his or her decision therein shall be final and conclusive and binding on all parties involved in the dispute.

17. Time for Performance and Term of Agreement

The Contractor shall perform the services provided for herein in accordance with the direction and scheduling of the City, unless otherwise agreed to in writing by and between the parties.

The Term of this Agreement shall commence on the date hereof or upon signing by both parties, and shall terminate within thirty (30) calendar days or upon completion of the performance of the scope of work provided herein, unless otherwise agreed to in writing by the parties.

18. Continuation of Performance

In the event that any dispute or conflict arises between the parties while this Contract is in effect, the Contractor agrees that, notwithstanding such dispute or conflict, the Contractor shall continue to make a good faith effort to cooperate and continue work toward successful

completion of assigned duties and responsibilities, within the anticipated time for performance.

19. Administration of Agreement

This Agreement shall be administered by Paul Newton for DP Excavation, the Contractor, and by the Assistant City Manager (Development), or designee, for the City. Any written notices required by the terms of this Agreement shall be served on or mailed to the following addresses:

20. Notices

All notices or communications permitted or required to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given if delivered in person or deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid, for mailing by certified mail, return receipt requested, and addressed, if to a party of this Agreement, to the address set forth next to such party's signature at the end of this Agreement, or if to a person not a party to this Agreement, to the address designated by a party to this Agreement in the foregoing manner.

Any party may change his, her or its address by giving notice in writing, stating his, her or its new address, to any other party, all pursuant to the procedure set forth in this section of the Agreement.

21. Insurance

The Contractor shall be responsible for maintaining, during the term of this Agreement and at its sole cost and expense, the types of insurance coverage and in the amounts described below. The Contractor shall furnish evidence, satisfactory to the City, of all such policies. During the term hereof, the Contractor shall take out and maintain in full force and affect the following insurance policies:

- a. Comprehensive public liability insurance, including automobile and property damage, insuring the City and the Contractor against loss or liability for damages for personal injury, death or property damage arising out of or in connection with the performance by the Contractor of its obligations hereunder, with minimum liability limits of \$1,000,000.00 combined single limit for personal injury, death or property damage in any one occurrence.
- b. Such workmen's compensation and other similar insurance as may be required by law.

22. Indemnification

The Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the City and its officers, agents and employees, or any of them from any and all claims, actions, suits, liability, loss, costs, expenses, and damages of any nature whatsoever, by any reason of or arising out of the negligent act or omission of the Contractor, its officers, agents, employees, or any of them relating to or arising out of the performance of this Agreement. If a final judgment is rendered against the City, its officers, agents, employees and/or any of them, or jointly against the City

and the Contractor and their respective officers, agents and employees, or any of them, the Contractor shall satisfy the same to the extent that such judgment was due to the Contractor's negligent acts or omissions. It is provided however that the City shall indemnify and hold harmless the Contractor for any liability or claims specifically arising out of the Contractor's entry upon the premises of the public nuisance.

23. Assignment

Neither party to this Agreement shall assign any right or obligation hereunder in whole or in part, without the prior written consent of the other party hereto. No assignment or transfer of any interest under this Agreement shall be deemed to release the assignor from any liability or obligation under this Agreement, or to cause any such liability or obligation to be reduced to a secondary liability or obligation.

24. Termination and Suspension

Either party may terminate this Agreement upon written notice to the other party if the other party fails substantially to perform in accordance with the terms of this Agreement through no fault of the party terminating the Agreement.

The City may terminate this Agreement upon not less than seven (7) days written notice to the Contractor if the services provided for herein are no longer needed from the Contractor. If this Agreement is terminated through no fault of the Contractor, the Contractor shall be compensated for services performed prior to termination in accordance with the rate of compensation provided herein.

25. <u>Parties in Interest</u>

This Agreement shall be binding upon, and the benefits and obligations provided for herein shall inure to and bind, the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns, provided that this section shall not be deemed to permit any transfer or assignment otherwise prohibited by this Agreement. This Agreement is for the exclusive benefit of the parties hereto and it does not create a contractual relationship with or exist for the benefit of any third party, including contractors, sub-contractors and their sureties.

26. Costs to Prevailing Party

In the event of such litigation or other legal action to enforce any rights, responsibilities or obligations under this Agreement, the prevailing parties shall be entitled to receive its reasonable costs and attorney's fees.

27. Applicable Law

This Agreement and the rights of the parties hereunder shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Washington and venue for any action hereunder shall be Pierce County, State of Washington; provided, however, that it is agreed and understood that any applicable statute of limitation shall commence no later than the substantial completion by the Contractor of the services.

28. Captions, Headings and Titles

All captions, headings or titles in the paragraphs or sections of this Agreement are inserted for convenience of reference only and shall not constitute a part of this Agreement or act as a limitation of the scope of the particular paragraph or sections to which they apply.

As used herein, where appropriate, the singular shall include the plural and vice versa and masculine, feminine and neuter expressions shall be interchangeable. 30. Entire Agreement

This Agreement contains the entire understanding of the parties hereto in respect to the transactions contemplated hereby and supersedes all prior agreements and understandings between the parties with respect to such subject matter.

31. Counterparts

This Agreement may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall be one and the same Agreement and shall become effective when one or more counterparts have been signed by each of the parties and delivered to the other party.





Regional Planning Land Use Updates

VISION 2050 Countywide Planning Policies and Buildable Lands Report

VISION 2050 was adopted in October 2020. Ms. Tiffany Speir described to commissioners the multicounty planning policies (MPPs), actions, and regional growth strategies that guide how and where the central Puget Sound region grows through 2050. Based on the size, function, and access to high-capacity transit Lakewood has been designated a "Core City". The Sound Transit Station is located within the Lakewood Station Subarea Plan. Ms. Speir explained per VISOIN 2050, Core Cities should encourage growth near high-capacity transit stations and within regional growth centers to achieve regional growth goals.

Ms. Speir clarified Lakewood has analyzed its historic growth rates and determined it will see significantly less growth rate than the share identified by PSRC. Certain land uses and geological forms reduce developmental capacity in Lakewood by 52%. During the 2000-2020 time period, the City of Lakewood has grown a total of 3%, for an average of 0.1% per year. Based on historical growth trends coupled with restrictions on Lakewood's ability to densify within its current boundary, the City has forecasted a population of 68,000 in 2044 with a growth total of 7,970 persons.

Lakewood has been proactive in planning for additional residential and employment growth where possible. Both the Downtown Subarea Plan and Lakewood Station District Subarea Plan focus on optimizing residential and non-residential uses near transit assets. Total Lakewood subarea planned 20-year growth is 3,979 housing units and 8,645 jobs.

The TIP is not required to be fiscally balanced and decisions on initiating projects comes with the adoption of the City's Capital Improvement Program as a part of the biennial budget.

PREFACE

Chapters 35.77.010 of the Revised Code of Washington (RCW) provide that each city shall annually update its Six-Year Comprehensive Transportation Program (Program) and file a copy of the adopted Program with the Secretary of the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) by July 1 of each year. The Program is necessary to allow cities and counties to obtain State and Federal funding. For a project to obtain funding, it must appear in the agency's current Program.

The Program is based upon anticipated revenues versus desirable projects. There are always more projects than available revenues. Therefore, a primary objective of the Program is to integrate the two to produce a comprehensive, realistic program for the orderly development and preservation of our street system. It is also important to note that the adoption of the Program does not irreversibly commit the City of Lakewood to construct the projects. The Program may at any time be revised by a majority of the City Council, but only after a public hearing.

CONSISTENCY WITH LAND USE MANAGEMENT PLAN

The State's Growth Management Act (GMA) requires local governments to develop and adopt comprehensive plans covering land use, housing, capital facilities, utilities, and transportation. These comprehensive plans must balance the demands of growth with the provision of public facilities and services and, in particular, transportation facilities and services. The City of Lakewood was required to develop and adopt a comprehensive plan that is in conformance with the requirements of the GMA.

The City of Lakewood has, as part of its Comprehensive Plan, a Transportation Element with a Master Goal to "Ensure that the transportation and circulation system is safe, efficient and serves all segments of the population and reduces reliance on single-occupant vehicles and increase use of other modes of transportation."

Specific goals include the following.

- 1. To provide a safe, comfortable and reliable transportation system.
- 2. To reduce consumption of energy through an efficient and convenient transportation system.
- 3. To enhance options for future improvements to the transportation system by taking advantage of advances in technology and transportation research.
- 4. To keep travel times for people and goods as low as possible.

- 5. To emphasize the movement of people and goods, rather than vehicles, in order to obtain the most efficient use of transportation facilities.
- 6. To establish a minimum level of adequacy for transportation facilities through the use of consistent and uniform standards.
- 7. To protect the capital investment in the transportation system through adequate maintenance and preservation of facilities.

The projects in the Six-Year Comprehensive Transportation Program are intended to conform to the goals within the City's Comprehensive Plan.

GRANT APPLICATIONS AND LEVERAGING LOCAL DOLLARS

The need to leverage local dollars through grant applications is very important to the City, especially in light of the decrease in funding available for transportation related capital improvements. The intent of this Program is not only to list and program projects for funding, but to establish City Council approval to submit grant applications on those projects contained in the Program.

FUNDING SOURCES

A. Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax Funds

The Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax Funds have been programmed to provide matching funds for federal aid and urban arterial projects and for projects to be implemented with Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax Funds only.

By law, each city receives a proportionate share of the total state motor vehicle fuel tax. Money received is a monthly allocation based on population. The dollars shown in this year's Program reflect the revenues from this source expected to be received by the City of Lakewood.

B. Federal Aid Funding Programs

Each of the Federal aid programs listed below has specific requirements a project must meet to qualify for funding under the individual program. For a project to receive funding from any of these sources it must compete with other public agency projects.

On December 4, 2015, President Obama signed the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (FAST ACT). The Act authorizes \$305 billion over fiscal years 2016 through 2020 for the Department's highway, highway and motor vehicle safety, public transportation, motor carrier safety, hazardous materials safety, rail, and research, technology and statistics programs. The ACT essentially continues on with a number of specific funding programs that were funded under the previous Federal Transportation program (MAP 21). These include the following:

- 1. STP Surface Transportation Program: This is a regionally competitive program.
- 2. CMAQ Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality: This is a regionally competitive program intended for projects that significantly improve air quality.
- 3. HSIP Highway Safety Improvement Program: Statewide competition for federal funds targeted at safety improvements at high accident locations.
- 4. TAP Transportation Alternatives Program: This is a regionally competitive program and focuses on pedestrian and bicycle facilities (on and off road); safe-routes to schools, etc.; and other non-highway focused programs.

Much of the above said Federal grant funds are funneled thru the regional MPOs which for Lakewood that's Puget Sound Regional Council (PSRC). PSRC will have the next call for projects in 2022 where typically \$200,000,000 in grant funding is available throughout its four county region. Typically Lakewood projects are most competitive at County Wide level where we compete against all other Pierce County agencies for approximately \$15,000,000.

C. Washington State Transportation Improvement Board (TIB)

The TIB has a number of statewide competitive programs which use criteria developed by the TIB for prioritization of projects. The two TIB programs in which the City can compete are as follows:

- 1. UAP Urban Arterial Program. This program is for arterial street construction with primary emphasis on safety and mobility.
- 2. SP Sidewalk Program. This program is for the improvement of pedestrian safety, and to address pedestrian system continuity and connectivity.

3. Complete Streets. The Complete Streets Award is a funding opportunity for local governments that have an adopted complete streets ordinance. Board approved nominators may nominate an agency for showing practice of planning and building streets to accommodate all users, including pedestrians, access to transit, cyclists, and motorists of all ages and abilities.

D. Community Development Block Grants (CDBG)

This is a program to provide physical improvements within low-income census tracts or to promote economic development within the City. Through the years 2019-2024 it is anticipated that a minimum of \$250,000 (on average) per year will be made available for pavement preservation, street lighting, and pedestrian improvements in eligible neighborhoods.

E. City Funding Sources

- 1. Real Estate Excise Tax (REET). This funding source comes from the two ½% REET's charged by the City on the sale of real estate within the City limits. The City's REET is restricted to funding capital, including transportation and related debt service. Revenue from REET has averaged \$2,000,000 between 2014 and 2018, the REET is estimated at \$1,700,000 annually.
- 2. General Fund Transfer In. This funding source comes from several different sources that make up the General Fund revenue including: property tax, sales tax, and utility tax and fees. The Street Capital Projects Fund is budgeted to receive approximately \$500,000 annually (on average) over the next 5 years in support of the pavement preservation program.
- 3. Transportation Benefit District (TBD). In 2014, the TBD Board implemented a \$20 per vehicle tab fee to provide funds toward a specific list of pavement preservation projects to be implemented between 2015 through 2020. The anticipated revenue is approximately \$815,000 per year.
- 4. General Obligation bonds: A general obligation bond (GO) is a municipal bond backed by the credit and taxing power of the issuing jurisdiction.
- 5. Downtown Plan Trip Mitigation Fee Policy: All businesses in the subarea plan that generate new PM Peak Hour trips as determined by the most recent edition of the ITE Trip Generation Manual, will be charged a Transportation Mitigation Fee (TMF).

F. Washington State Department of Transportation

- 1. Pedestrian and Bicycle Program: This is a statewide competitive program specifically oriented toward the elimination of hazards to the pedestrian and bicyclists. The recent call for projects has expanded the program's scope to emphasize "complete streets" accommodation of all roadway users from vehicles to bicyclists to pedestrians. The programs focus for "complete streets" is for "Main Street" urban arterials and corridors. Historically, the city has not received much funding from this program. However, given the change in the grant scope, there may be opportunities from this source in the future.
- 2. Safe Routes to Schools Program: This is a statewide competitive program specifically oriented toward pedestrian and bicycle safety near schools.
- 3. Surface Water Management Program:

The City's Surface Water Management (SWM) Program pays for all drainage facilities constructed in conjunction with street improvements. The revenue from SWM is directly related to the amount of capital improvement projects constructed.

PROJECT NUMBERING SYSTEM

Project numbers were revised to match the City's CIP Budget 2021/2022 using City's BARS numbering system for consistency. Most sections of the Program will have non-sequential project numbering, as projects are completed and removed from the list. Projects carried forward from previous year(s) retain the same project numbers from the previous year(s).

BUDGET DOLLARS

Costs shown are planning level estimates and are reflected in each year as FY2021 dollars, with 3% inflation per year to year of anticipated expenditure.



RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the City Council adopt this Ordinance amending the City's 2021-2022 Biennial Budget.

<u>DISCUSSION:</u> The Revised Code of Washington (RCW) Chapter 35A.34 stipulates that a public hearing be held in connection with the modification process. Following the RCW guidelines, the City held a public hearing on the 2021 Carry Forward Budget Adjustment ordinance on May 3, 2021. The proposed budget adjustment makes the following types of modifications to fiscal years 2021 and 2022: revise the beginning balance by adjusting the estimated amount to reflect the final 2020 ending fund balance; incorporate items previously approved by Council; appropriate projects funded by grants and contributions; continuation of capital projects; and new allocations.

<u>ALTERNATIVE(S)</u>: The City Council may approve the budget ordinance with modifications.

FISCAL IMPACT: The proposed budget adjustment for all funds:

Year 2021:

- Increases beginning fund balance by \$25.37M, resulting in a revised estimate of \$41.94M;
- Increases revenues by \$22.59M, resulting in a revised estimate of \$97.50M;
- Increases expenditures by \$38.14M, resulting in a revised estimate of \$114.97M; and
- Increases ending fund balance by \$9.81M, resulting in a revised estimate of \$24.48M.

Year 2022:

- Increases beginning fund balance by \$9.81M, resulting in a revised estimate of \$24.48M;
- Increases revenues by \$0.71M, resulting in a revised estimate of \$77.07M;
- Increases expenditures by \$1.47M, resulting in a revised estimate of \$76.98M; and
- Increases ending fund balance by \$9.06M, resulting in a revised estimate of \$24.58M.

ORDINANCE NO. 754

AN ORDINANCE of the City Council of the City of Lakewood, Washington, adopting the 2021/2022 Biennial Budget.

WHEREAS, the tax estimates and budget for the City of Lakewood, Washington, for the 2021/2022 fiscal biennium have been prepared and filed on October 5, 2020 as provided by Titles 35A.34 and 84.55 of the Revised Code of Washington; and

WHEREAS, the budget was printed for distribution and notice published in the official paper of the City of Lakewood setting the time and place for hearing on the budget and said notice stating copies of the budget can be obtained on-line and at the Office of the City Clerk; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Lakewood having held a public hearing on November 2, 2020, and having considered the public testimony presented; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Lakewood adopted Ordinance No. 746 on November 16, 2020 implementing the 2021/2022 Biennial Budget; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Lakewood finds it necessary to revise the 2021/2022 Biennial Budget to: revise the estimated beginning balances to reflect the final 2020 ending fund balance; incorporate items previously approved by the City Council; appropriate projects funded by grants and contributions; continue capital projects; and include new allocations on an exception basis.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Lakewood having held a public hearing on the 2021 Carry Forward Budget Adjustment on May 3, 2021.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LAKEWOOD, WASHINGTON DO ORDAIN as follows:

Section 1. Budget Amendment. The budget for the 2021/2022 biennium, as originally set forth in Ordinance 746, Section 1 and as shown in Exhibit A, is amended to adopt the revised budget for the 2021/2022 biennium in the amounts and for the purposes as shown in Exhibit B Revised Budget by Fund – Year 2021 and Exhibit C Revised Budget by Fund – Year 2022.

Section 2. Severability. If any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance shall be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, or its application held inapplicable to any person, property or circumstance, such invalidity or unconstitutionality or inapplicability shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of any other section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance or its application to any other person, property or circumstance.

Section 3. Copies of the Budget to Be Filed. A complete copy of the final budget as adopted herein shall be transmitted to the Office of the State Auditor, the Association of Washington Cities and to the Municipal Research and Services Center of Washington. Copies of the final budget as adopted herein shall be filed with the City Clerk and shall be made available for use by the public.

Section 4. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect for the fiscal years 2021 and 2022 five (5) days after publication as required by law.

Subject: 2021 Carry Forward Budget Adjustment – Adoption

BACKGROUND

The proposed budget adjustment makes the following types of modification to the current biennium:

- Revise the estimated beginning fund balance to reflect the final 2020 ending fund balance
- Adjustments to incorporate items previously approved by the City Council;
- Appropriate projects funded by grants and contributions;
- Continuation of capital projects; and
- New allocations on an exception basis.

Note: The following are changes since the proposed budget was originally presented at the April 26, 2021 City Council Study Session:

- Fund 001 General Fund. Regarding Washington State Department of Commerce Grant, changed project name from "Lakeview Transit Area Subarea Plan" to "Lakewood Station Subarea Plan".
- Fund 106 Public Art Fund. Increased funding by \$4,000 for a total of \$10,000 for four (4) signal box wraps.
 Increase funds for Colonial Plaza Art to \$150,000 (\$95,000 project balance + \$32,500 Public Art fund balance + \$22,500 General Fund).
- Fund 401 Surface Water Management Fund. Reduced carry forward for Waughop Lake Treatment from \$68,177 to \$20,000. The project is complete, however, the City is having volunteers continue to do monitoring and have a billing a two left for consultant pay. The project will be closed out completely at the end of 2021.

The proposed budget adjustment continues following the City Manager's directives and action strategies below (through 2020 and continue indefinitely through 2021/2022) to mitigate the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, it is expected that by year-end, we will meet or exceed the 2022 adopted estimated General Fund ending fund balance.

• All current and future vacant positions will not be filled in the foreseeable future, with exceptions given funding sources, legal mandates and/or reporting requirements.

- All discretionary spending are on hold indefinitely. Only those expenditures related to basic services are authorized.
- Anything not covered above shall be approved in advance after review by Assistant City Manager/Chief Financial Officer and City Manager.
- Fleet & equipment, information technology, and property management projects and replacements shall only include essential items as well as those completed by December 31, 2020.
- Transportation, parks and sewer improvement projects will be continued as planned for 2020 given these projects are funded with very limited general government funds.
- Excess REET will be set aside to offset any decrease in 2020 REET collections and to ensure payment of debt service in 2020 and 2021.

The proposed budget adjustment does not include the following items which will be considered and potentially addressed as part of the 2021/2022 mid-biennial review:

- ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act). Allocate funds once the City Council has had the opportunity to further discuss and provide direction on the allocation.
- Municipal Court Video and Audio Equipment. Municipal court submitted an application in the amount of \$119,438 to AOC (Administration of Court) for CARES funding for audio/video replacement. In summary, the request is to: replace existing audio solution with new technology to include wireless microphones, handheld & lapel microphones; implement wireless content sharing providing real time collaboration during court proceedings utilizing an AirMedia presentation gateway solution; replace existing overhead speakers with new units to eliminate any overhead feedback or squeal; replace existing amplifiers, signal processors and mixing hardware; build the system around digital audio recordings software (currently For the Record 'FTR'); implement new video solution to include cameras, digital display screens, remote streaming capability along with local recording options; implement new video solution which provides enhanced streaming capability, numerous recording and archival options for long term storage of court proceedings & provide online; remote services and court proceedings for the public; add assistive listening technology; and comply with all state and federal guidelines pertaining to Covid-19.
- Workforce Development. The City was waiting to see if a competitive workforce partner would score high enough during the regular human services process to fill this role. None did so this is something Lakewood's Promise will speak with Council about during a joint session with the City Council. The estimated cost is \$50,000.
- Volunteer Graffiti Program. Create a volunteer graffiti program to include graffiti supplies and appropriate supervision to coordinate and manage the program. The city's maintenance and operations team regularly and proactively addresses the graffiti tagging citywide. When graffiti is identified on private property, the City's code enforcement team reaches out to have them address. In general, private property owners comply and clean their property. The biggest challenge is not cleaning the graffiti. Once graffiti is cleaned up, those who are doing this come back the next day or within days with more tagging. For the most part, the tagging is not gang related, it is a handful or even less number of members in the community who are doing this.
- **Opportunity Fund.** Create a fund for the purpose of accumulating and setting aside funds for future economic development and capital improvement purposes.

Transportation Benefit District. Allocate the current biennium's \$20 vehicle licensing fee revenue in accordance with City Council direction, including the potential of a bond issue in support of transportation capital projects. As part of this process, update the list of TBD projects completed and eligible.

• Transportation Mitigation Fees. Life-to-date through December 2020 traffic mitigation fees received total \$103,505 and is expected to grow to \$200,000 in the near future according to the City's Assistant City Manager for Community and Economic Development Services. Plan for the use of these moneys is to first to construct a new traffic signal at Avondale and Gravelly Lake Drive to include signal coordination along the Gravelly Lake Drive Corridor. The estimated cost for a new traffic signal in 2020 dollars is roughly \$700,000 and is anticipated to be covered 50% by traffic mitigation funds matched by 50% City funds.

Abatement Funds. Demolition of the former QFC building that is under an abatement order and has been declared unsafe by the City's hearing examiner that will require additional abatement funds unless the property owner moves forward with securing a demolition permit to abate. The current estimated cost for the demolition including asbestos removal is \$315,000 and would likely be funded with a combination of available abatement funds and a financial contribution from the General Fund. Once completed, a lien would be placed on the property to ensure the owner reimburses the City of the abatement costs.

PROPOSED BUDGET ADJUSTMENT SUMMARY

Year 2021:

GENERAL FUND ENDING FUND BALANCE

In support of the City's financial integrity, the City Council originally adopted on September 15, 2014, a set of financial policies including fund balance reserves totaling 12% of General/Street O&M Funds operating revenues as follows:

- <u>2% General Fund Contingency Reserves:</u> The purpose of this reserve is to accommodate unexpected operational changes, legislative impacts, or other economic events affecting the City's operations which could not have been reasonably anticipated at the time the original budget was prepared.
- <u>5% General Fund Ending Fund Balance Reserves:</u> The purpose of this reserve is to provide financial stability, cash flow for operations and the assurance that the City will be able to respond to revenue shortfalls with fiscal strength.
- <u>5% Strategic Reserves:</u> The purpose of this reserve is to provide some fiscal means for the City to respond to potential adversities such as public emergencies, natural disasters or similarly major, unanticipated events.

With this budget adjustment, 2022 estimated General/Street O&M Funds ending fund balance of \$10.8M equates to 26% of General/Street O&M Funds operating revenues and is in alignment with the City's financial policies. The composition of the \$10.8M consists of \$4.9M or 12% allocated to General Fund Ending Fund Balance Reserves and \$5.9M Unreserved/Undesignated.

PROPOSED BUDGET ADJUSTMENT DETAILS

The narrative below provides detailed information on the proposed budget adjustments. A summarized list is included as an attachment to this memo.

Fund 001 General

CD – Build Your Better Marketing Campaign, New/1-Time

Add \$141,500 in expenditures for this marketing campaign that began in 2018 with the purpose of increasing favorable perceptions of Lakewood as a great place to live, work, learn, recreate, and do business. The City Council approved a budget for 2019/2020 in the amount of \$179,250. Through video, social media, print, radio, and website the City was able to achieve over 2 million views, 38,913 clicks through to the website, 2,345 City Facebook page likes, 39,605 page views within the website, 1,226 "Better Business" PDF downloads, and 374 "Better Living" click through searches for homes in Lakewood. Survey performance indicates that the net promoter score increased by +10 for residents, and +2 for non-residents, meaning people were more likely to recommend Lakewood over time. The campaign concluded at the end of December 2020. In January 2021 engagement dropped off significantly. Brand awareness campaigns are measured in exposure over time. Therefore, a refresh of the brand assets with continued outreach to Builders and Warriors intensified outreach to Starters, and strengthening our relationship with Long-termers is recommended to build on the momentum we have gained, and to keep Lakewood, WA top of minds for residents, non-residents, businesses, and builders. The funds will be used for: \$20,000 refresh video + photo assets; \$2,500 digital ad design, landing pages; \$2,500 print add design, landing pages; \$2,500 brand awareness survey (x2); and \$114,000 digital, print, and radio spend.

CD – Washington State Department of Commerce Grant, Continuation / 1-Time

Carry forward \$48,000 in revenue for Washington State Department of Commerce interagency agreement with the City of Lakewood through Growth Management Services for E2SHB 1923 Grant Program selected actions to increase residential building capacity. Funds will be used to develop the Lakewood Transit Area Subarea Plan. The scope of work includes the following selected actions to increase residential building capacity under RCW 36.70A.600(1): adopting a form-based code in one or more zoning districts that permit residential uses; adopting a subarea plan pursuant to RCW 43.21C.420; and adopting a planned action pursuant to RCW 43.21C.440(1)(b)(22), except that an environmental impact statement pursuant to 43.21C.030 is not required for such an action.

CD - Comprehensive Plan Energy and Climate Change Grant, Continuation/1-Time

Carry forward \$20,000 in revenues and expenditures for the balance of the grant received from Washington State Department of Commerce Growth Management Services for 2020/2021 Climate Change Grant. The purpose of this grant is to assist the City with development of a new, separate Comprehensive Plan Energy and Climate change Chapter that includes goals, policies and objectives and replaces the current sustainability chapter.

CD - WSDOT Relocation / Pacific Highway Redevelopment - Continuation / 1-Time

Carry forward balance of \$32,109 for Pacific Highway conceptual design and critical pathway development.

CD - Oak Tree Mitigation, Continuation / 1-Time

Appropriate the balance of \$55,446 for projects that meet certain program criteria.

PK – Human Services Programs – Lakewood's Promise, Continuation/1-Time

Carry forward \$15,000 in expenditures for Lakewood's Promise for Youth Council (\$5,000) and Work Force Development (\$10,000). In addition to supplementing the Human Services Coordinator's salary and benefits, the Lakewood's Promise budget supports four activities: 1) supplements the Youth Summit and other Youth Council activities; 2) Family Workforce Development initiatives, 3) Youth Mental Health initiatives, and 4) Lakewood's Promise Advisory Board's communications capacity. All these activities were delayed in 2020 due to COVID-19. The Youth Summit was cancelled weeks before implementation and remaining human services staff capacity was focused on supporting expenditures related to CARES Act funding instead of further developing the workforce development initiative started earlier in 2020.

PK - Human Services Programs - Living Access Support Alliance (LASA), Continuation/1-Time

Carry forward \$15,000 in expenditures for LASA. The City contracted with LASA to provide assistance to Lakewood residents. The City received CARES funds and contracted with LASA to provide rental assistance to Lakewood residents. They did not have the capacity to continue with the utility assistance program. This program was not funded in 2021 so the remaining contract of \$15,000 will be used to provide this important service to Lakewood residents.

PK - Human Services Programs - Lakewood's CHOICE Contract Increase, Continuation/1-Time

Add \$20,000 for amendment received from Washington State Health Care Authority. Carry forward \$70,721 in revenues and expenses for the balance of the grant. This grant funds programs for the substance abuse prevention of the youths of Lakewood.

PK – Fort Steilacoom Park Cemetery Grant, Continuation/1-Time

Add \$907 in expenditures for the remaining grant balance for cemetery sign replacement at Fort Steilacoom Park, funded by a state grant from the Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation. The purpose of the grant is to provide support for the preservation of the historic cemetery in Lakewood and Pierce County.

LG – STOP Grant, New/1-Time

Add \$30,313 revenue and expenditures in 2021 for FY 2019 grant award addendum from the US Department of Justice through the Washington State Department of Commerce. These funds are provided for a part-time office assistant position to provide support on STOP activities that will enhance prosecution's response to adult or teen victims of domestic violence. The effective date is January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021.

MC – Office of Public Defense Grant, Continuation / 1-Time

Carry forward \$16,875 from the 2020 grant balance and add \$37,000 in revenues and expenditures for the 2021 grant received from Washington State Office of Public Defense. The funds must be used according to the City's grant agreement GRT20018, to make and sustain appreciable demonstrable improvements in public defense as required by state law. The purpose of this grant is for social work services for the public defense team, interpreter services for attorney-client communications, public defense training, investigation services, and expert witnesses.

MC – 2020 Court Cost True Up, Continuation/Ongoing

Reduce municipal court contract revenues by \$72,555 for 2021 based on 2020 court costs true up. The original budgeted and new revenue estimates are as follows:

PD – Ammunition, Continuation/1-Time

Carry forward \$9,870 in expenditures for ammunition ordered in July 2020, however, will not be delivered until Q1 2021. Ammunition has become a critical commodity with delivery times of six-months or more, which was not known when the order was originally placed. The current annual ongoing ammunition budget is \$68,000.

PD - City of Tacoma Radio Fees, New/Ongoing

Add \$28,000 in each year of 2021 and 2022 for City of Tacoma's radio system access fee. The fee is based on City of Tacoma's annual net operating costs divided by total quantity of radios using the system. Net operating costs are calculated by deducting total external revenue from total operating costs. Since 2015 a portion of annual external revenue has been approximately \$440,000 in radio system fees from SS911. This amount includes Tacoma's cost for supporting and upgrading or replacing their dispatch consoles, system management costs, radio system access fees for SS911 dispatch consoles, etc. Traditionally, SS911 has paid this fee from cash reserves. By doing so they did not pass those costs on to law enforcement and fire agencies as part of their dispatch fees. Facing a 2021 COVID related sales tax revenue decline, SS911 decided to use cash reserves for their other operating costs and stop using reserves to pay for radio system access fees. The current annual budget of \$117,560 increases to \$145,560 with this adjustment.

PD - Jail Services, New/Ongoing

Add \$250,000 per year for jail services due to potential changes/elimination of the Nisqually Jail contract. The current annual budget of \$700,000 increases to \$950,000 with this budget adjustment.

PD - SRT Equipment, Continuation/1-Time

Carry forward \$40,000 to complete the purchase of the SRT equipment.

PD – Sniperweek Training, Continuation/1-Time

Carry forward \$1,507 for two police officers to attend Sniperweek training. Registration and lodging expenses were paid and subsequently refunded last year. However, airfare was retained by the airline to be credited on future flights booked by two authorized police officers.

PD - Criminal Justice Training Commission Grant, Continuation/1-Time

Add \$26,266 in revenue and expenses for wages and benefits of having a training officer in administering, conducting, and presenting this state's Basic Law Enforcement Academy program.

PD – FBI Innocence Lost Grant, Continuation/1-Time

Add \$28,000 in revenue for overtime work of two officers with the FBI in targeting the prosecution of organized crime groups responsible for the promotion of prostitution, specifically juvenile prostitution, interstate, or through the use of interstate commerce, drug trafficking, money laundering and alien smuggling.

PD – Emergency Management Performance Grant COVID, New/1-Time

Add \$2,689 in revenue and expenditures for wages and benefits of Assistant Emergency Management Performance Coordinator position. These funds support the collection of data and ongoing communications of community lifelines related to the response to COVID. These funds increase the original grant from the Washington State Military Department from \$11,210 to \$13,899. The end date for this grant is 12/31/2021. The total match amount is increased to \$13,899 which is budgeted in the City of Lakewood's police department budget.

Fund 105 Property Abatement/Rental Housing Safety Program /1406 Affordable Housing

Property Abatement, Continuation/1-Time

Add \$610,386 in expenditures funded by program balance. The Property Abatement portion of this fund accounts for projects that the City has identified and processed through the abatement program. All revenue and the rightful recovery of those project expenses, along with all revenues from fees, fines, and interest, and other rightful recoveries from those projects are deposited into the program for the purpose of funding additional abatement projects.

Rental Housing Safety Program, Continuation/1-Time

Add \$24,287 transfer in from General Fund to cover 2020 program deficit. 2020 actual revenues comprising of program fees \$179,398 and General Fund \$25,000 totaled \$204,398 while expenditures totaled \$263,719. On August 1, 2016, the Lakewood City Council approved Ordinance No. 644 creating a Rental Housing Safety Program (RHSP). The program requires all residential rental properties (apartments, single family homes, duplexes, etc.) within Lakewood city limits to be registered. The program is designed to ensure that all rental housing units comply with specific life and safety standards and are providing a safe place for tenants to live. As of October 4, 2017, all rental properties owners will be required to register their property with the City every year and have the property inspected once every five years.

1406 Affordable Housing, Continuation/1-Time

Add \$72,315 in expenditures funded by program balance. On March 2, 2020, the City Council approved Ordinance 731 relating to local sales and use tax, authorizing the maximum capacity of the tax authorized under the provisions of Substitute House Bill 1406 for affordable and supporting housing. The revenue to the City is a credit of the state's sales tax. With adoption of this ordinance, the City is able to impose the rate of 0.0073%. According to the Department of Revenue (DOR), the maximum amount the City may receive is \$98K per state fiscal year for twenty years totaling an estimated \$1.95M. The City notified DOR on March 13, 2020 and DOR began imposing the tax effective May 1, 2020. The City received its first full distribution amount in July 2020 with some funds trickling through in May and June due to early returns filed. The direction from the Lakewood City Council is to use the funds in conjunction with the City's CDBG Major Home Repair Program, CDBG Major Home Repair and Sewer Loan Program, and HOME Housing Rehabilitation Loan Program given that there is a high demand for home repair and rehabilitation loans in the City. The City anticipates using the 1406 Affordable Housing Program funds for CDBG Major Home Repair Program in 2021.

Fund 106 Public Art

Arts Commission, Continuation & New/1-Time

Add \$4,000 for Arts Commission funded by project balance and add new funds of \$4,000 for a total increase of \$8,000 resulting in a project budget of \$10,000. The Arts Commission received allocations of \$2,000 in 2019 and \$2,000 in 2020. The 2019 funds were not spent and rolled carried over to 2020 and due to the COVID-19 pandemic a number of activities and events were cancelled. The Arts Commission requested the funds to be carried forward to add to the existing 2021 budget to support the signal box wrap art program. A call to artists will occur in 2021 to design artwork to wrap various signal boxes around the city. More boxes will be added as sponsorships are found to expand the program. Cost per signal box is approximately \$2,500 per box.

Colonial Plaza Art, Continuation & New/1-Time

Add \$150,000 for the Colonial Plaza art funded by project balance \$95,000, new funding from General Fund \$22,500 and new funding from Public Art fund balance \$32,500.

Fund 180 Narcotics Seizure

Add \$106,196 funded by 2020 ending fund for balance eligible narcotics seizure related activity. The purpose of this fund is to track assets seized as a result of involvement with the illegal sale, possession, or distribution of drugs or controlled substances, and for the purchase of controlled substances or drugs by law enforcement officers or agents, as well as other expenses to enhance and improve law enforcement activities having a close and demonstrable relationship to enforce enforcement of controlled substances. Funds may not be used to supplant existing funding sources.

Fund 181 Felony Seizure

Felony Seizure, New/1-Time

Add \$47,837 in expenditures funded by felony seizure related activity. The purpose of this fund is for tracking assets seized under RCW 10.105.101 and the related expenditures. The state statute authorizes the seizure of assets that have been or was actually employed as an instrumentality in the commission or in the aiding or abetting in the commission of any felony, or which was furnished or was intended to be furnished by any person in the commission of, as a result of, or as a compensation for the commission of, any felony, or which was acquired in whole or in part with the proceeds traceable to the commission of a felony. Funds shall be used exclusively by the City in the expansion and improvement of law enforcement activity; however may not be used to supplant existing funding sources.

Fund 182 Federal Seizure

Federal Seizure, Continuation/1-Time

Add \$40,906 for purchase of replacement boat offset by a reduction in the current existing budget, funded by federal seizure related revenue. The purpose of this fund is to track the revenues associated with assets seized as a result the Police Department working in conjunction with federal law enforcement.

The Federal Equity Sharing Guidelines lists the following (funds shall be used to increase or supplement and not be used to replace or supplant):

Permissible Uses: law enforcement investigations; law enforcement training, law enforcement and detention facilities; law enforcement equipment; law enforcement travel and transportation; law enforcement awards and memorials; drug and gang education awareness programs; matching fund for grants; pro rata funding of the law enforcement agency's percentage of costs associated with supporting multi-agency items or facilities; asset accounting and tracking of expenditures of federally shared funds; language assistance services in connection with law enforcement activity; transfers of cash to other law enforcement agencies; support of community-based programs (cash transfers to community-based programs are not permitted); and windfall situations to provide additional support to community –based programs.

<u>Impermissible Uses</u>: Salaries and benefits of permanent law enforcement personnel, except in limited circumstances (i.e. express statutory authorization, overtime of officers and investigators, new positions and temporary or not-to-exceed one year appointments and salary of an officer hired to replace an officer assigned to a task force, specialized programs that generally to not involve traditional law enforcement functions); use of forfeited property by non-law enforcement personnel; payment of education-related costs; uses contrary to the laws of the state or local jurisdiction; non-official government use of shared assets; purchase of food and beverage (except for conference and meals during local operations); extravagant expenditures

Summary Colonial Plaza Public Art:

At the December 14, 2020 study session, City Council gave direction to select a new artist for the Colonial Plaza public art project. A process was recommended to use established rosters of professional artists to develop a short list of potential candidates to develop proposals appropriate for the site. Also a new selection panel was developed; the Public Art Subcommittee which is comprise of members of the Arts Commission, including one Youth Council member and two City Council members. In May, City Council gave direction to increase the budget up to \$150,000 to cover the cost of installation, engineering and restoration.

Twenty artists were selected for the short list. Of those, twelve artist opted-in. The Public Art Committee reviewed their portfolio's based on the criteria developed for this process. Six finalists were selected and invited to an on-site orientation at the Colonial Plaza. Those artists were interviewed by the Public Art Committee and three finalists were selected. The three finalist are John Fleming, Laura Haddad & Thomas Drugan, and Peter Reiquam.

The three artists are currently preparing two designs for which they will be paid a stipend. The artists will present their two designs the last week in June. The Public Art subcommittee will make a recommendation to the Arts Commission at the July meeting. Following consensus, the Arts Commission will forward a recommendation to City Council which will include the selected artist, design, project budget and timeline.

The following criteria was defined and has served as the basis for selecting artists during each phase of the process:

• Artist can complete the project within budget (\$90-\$140)

- Artist live in counties within 100 miles of the City limits.
- Artistic Quality Through work samples, the artist demonstrates evidence of some or all of the following: mastery of skills and techniques, professional approaches to process and presentation, and/or communication of unique vision or perspective.
- Professional Experience The artist's resume should demonstrate a professional level of commitment and experience and reflect the skill set required for a specific public art project located in this type of location and setting.
- Style and Nature Design projects and artwork should be appropriate in scale, material, form, and content for the proposed surrounding environment and/or architecture, Particular attention will be given to the function of the facility or place, the social and physical context of the work, and the way people may interact with it.
- Permanence and Technical Feasibility Materials proposed for the project should be appropriate for its physical environment and public usage. Due consideration will be given to structural and surface integrity, public safety, protection against theft, vandalism, weathering, seasonal climatic changes, excessive maintenance and repair costs, and intended life expectancy of the work. In some cases, projects will be reviewed by a licensed engineer and/or a professional art conservator.
- Diversity Every effort will be made to represent Lakewood's cultural diversity.

Timeline and Milestones

The Public Art Committee is currently on track for the timeline originally proposed. In February the criteria for the artist selection was developed and staff distilled short list from two public art rosters to 20 artists.

Month 1 (March 2021)

The Public Art Process was confirmed by Council, and Council members were designated for selection panel. The 20 selected artists were invited to opt in or out. The 13 artists who opted in to submit the required documents (10 slides of past work, resume and list of work with descriptions and price) had their portfolios reviewed by the Public Art Committee. From there, the top 6 artists were selected (Mary Coss, John Fleming, Tom Drugan & Laura Haddad, Peter Reiquam, Preston Singletary & Paul Sorey).

Month 2 (April 2021)

The six selected artists met for an onsite orientation at Colonial Plaza to include site constraints and design criteria. Selected artists gave a presentation and had an interview with the Public Art Committee.

Months 3-4 (May – June, 2021)

Three finalists were selected: John Fleming, Peter Reiquam, & Laura Haddad/Tom Drugan. These artists were asked to create two design concepts. The artists will present their two designs to the Public Art Committee the last week in June. The Scope of work for the preliminary Design Proposal includes:

- Research that influences the concept
- Visit to the Lakewood Historical Society & History Museum (Sally will arrange)
- 2 Concept(s)
- Artwork location description (visual or written)
- Materials under consideration

- General fabrication methods
- Possible protective finishes
- Possible installation methods
- Describe use/incorporation of lighting (if proposed)
- Imagery (drawings, sketches, any visual representation)
- Draft budget that breaks down the cost of the art itself, and the cost of the installation & engineering.

Months 5-12 (July, 2021 – August, 2021)

The Public Art Subcommittee will make a recommendation for the final artist, to the Arts Commission at the July meeting. Following consensus, the Arts Commission will forward a recommendation to City Council which will include the selected artist, design, project budget and timeline. The selected artist is given feedback to hone the final design including site needs and installation requirements. Final design is reviewed and approved by Council.

Months (September 2021 – February 2022)

A contract for public art is created and artwork is produced. Best practices show that from the beginning of the process to installation of the sculpture/s will take approximately one year to complete.

Why Top 3 Artists Were Selected

John Fleming was the only artist to suggest incorporating the 25th anniversary art contest art in his work. Speaking to our diverse community and the theme of "unity" was a criteria for artists, and he addressed this very well by doing his research about our 25th anniversary. He was excited to meet with the Sister Cities Association and learn more about our connections with other cultures. Materials he suggested included bronze to warm up the space. He also had the idea of a piece that was moveable which is a way to have art on the pavers, but also have the flexibility to move the piece around to fit into whatever event we are having. John showed his use of recycled materials in his projects which makes the budget go further. His pieces are both interactive and can be seen from a distance. The committee appreciate he really did his homework in researching Lakewood and his past work such as Redmond Erratic reveals his ability to bring the history of an area into the artwork while making it interactive and engaging with the community. His past pieces are statement pieces as well and include lighting. http://www.johnflemingartist.com/wp/

Peter Reiquam has a definitive style and is known for having humor and whimsical pieces. His past work shows that he digs deep in his homework of the area including both history of places and people. He has a unique ability to distill the essence of a particular place into a piece of artwork. This results in strong community engagement with his pieces. Each piece has the unique flavor of the place in which it is located. The committee appreciated that he is an artist that can tell us what is distinctly Lakewood rather than the other way around. This is something the committee is looking for in the artist. Peter is the only artist that does his own fabrication which makes the budget go a long way. As well as his pieces being interactive and engaging, they have a narrative quality and are very accessible. Peter made the comment that he always works to make his art very approachable and in-so doing, engages the broader audience especially those who are not as familiar with art. https://www.reiguam.com/

Ariane is the youth council member serving on the Public Art Committee. Peter was her top pick and she felt strongly that Peter's art would resonate with youth because it was "accessible, playful, approachable, interactive and uniquely Lakewood." Several of his past works and concepts for the space were for youth and people of all ages to gather and perform.

Laura Haddad and Thomas Drugan are a husband wife team. Their portfolio is of large, elegant, and his notable for their grandly lit pieces that are high-end. The committee appreciated they did their homework and have experience creating are that is a pre-cursor for what is to come in a place and very site-specific. They had the clever and cost effective idea of using the Gary Oaks at the park entrance as a natural gateway by up-lighting them. They draw inspiration from the area and show an ability to create a wide-array of shapes and forms. Natural elements such as the sun and wind are used to activate their pieces and make them responsive to the environment. Their art is iconic at a distance, doing a great job at attracting your eye, and up close have texture and an interactive quality. http://haddad-drugan.com/

What the Public Art Committee learned from the artist interviews and process to date: Each artist had their own unique prospective which gave the committee insights that were particularly helpful. For example:

The beautiful pavers are artwork unto themselves and should be left untouched. (It was subsequently learned that it is not financially feasible to put permanent artwork that would require footings in the area with pavers, roughly \$25k, and could compromise the integrity of the interlocking system).

The plaza is a sprawling and large space where art can serve as a way to help define the area, break it up and warm it up. For example where the pavers end and the concrete slabs begin is an ideal location for art to define the space.

Safety needs to be considered and not wanting to engage people, especially children close to the street since it is a thoroughfare when not being used for an event.

The Garry Oaks in the open space entrance (near QFC) could serve as a natural gateway if up-lit.

There was various responses – pros and cons - to a "gateway" to the street. To have a truly iconic state gateway at the entrance would require a budget closer to \$200,000.

The art serves as a precursor for what is to come.

It is not financially feasible to put footings or permanent artwork in the paver area as it could compromise the integrity of the interlocking system – estimated cost for restoration \$25K.

An adjustment to the easement is needed to place art on the cement slabs between the storefronts and parking spaces.

Summary Signal Box Wraps:

Although the Arts Commission was looking at kicking off this project in 2022 as part of Public Art Program, they recommended starting it this year because their resources could not be used to

implement the Film Festival due to COVID and the art would make an immediate, positive impact.

In March the Public Art Committee selected four Artists based on their work that was submitted:

- 1. Rosa Cruz, Colorful Rocks at Lake
- 2. Kelly Loney, Steila-cross
- 3. Chrystine Ward Westphal, Mt. Rainier
- 4. Susan Russell Hall, Images of flowers and trees

Staff is currently working with Print Northwest to measure the signal boxes. In May the committee will meet to decide which art will go at the four identified Signal Box locations. Then the artists will fine-tune their art to the specifications of the files needed for the highest resolution. The wrapping can take place in June or July.
