

Lakewood was incorporated in 1996 - a quartercentury has passed since we took the leap to become an independent city. This anniversary is an opportunity to reflect on our history and to consider our future.

The promise of incorporation was to achieve a government that was more representative, responsive, and more specifically focused on this community. Lakewood residents voted to be better heard, better acknowledged, and better served.

Over the last 25 years, Lakewood has become safer. Crime has decreased by 42% since the city's incorporation.

Lakewood has become more prosperous. Millions of investment dollars are bringing new jobs and new commerce.

Between 2012 to 2019, 17.5% more jobs were created over a population growth of 2.4%. Lakewood's new largest private employer is set to move in - Aero Precision will employ over 800 people by the end of the year.

Lakewood has become more vibrant. We have been caring stewards for our 14 precious parks, from our smallest diamond (Primley Park) to our largest gem (Fort Steilacoom Park).

Lakewood's infrastructure has been greatly improved. We've built over 20 miles of new sidewalks and installed over 4,000 streetlights. Your roads are safe and smooth.

The pandemic has created extraordinary hardships for families, workers, and businesses. It has disrupted life as we knew it.

You have more to say than ever. You have a role in helping this community get back to normal. This Council is here to listen and here to help. We represent you, *proudly*.



The City of Lakewood *25th Anniversary Celebration* is scheduled for September 18th at Colonial Plaza downtown.



Boo-Han Market

Introducing new flavors

Jae Han's mother and father first opened their Korean grocery store in 1978 at 100th and Kline. By 1988, the new Boo Han Market stood at 9122 South Tacoma Way. The market is thriving today – it is one of many long-established grocery stores with a hard-to-find food items in Lakewood's International District.

In the years that passed since 1978, Jae and his family witnessed dramatic change and growth to their business and the local community.

An immigration boom from Korea in the early 80's brought many new residents to the area, and many of those families got right to work starting businesses along South Tacoma Way.

"There were some not-so-nice activities happening around here back in the day," said Jae. "Now the immigrant community has built a business center here - there are more economic opportunities now than ever."

Once upon a time, 80-90% of Boo Han Market's customers were Korean or proprietors of local Asian restaurants. That percentage has reduced over time as curious non-Asian residents from the community have begun to frequent the market.

"There's a lot of interest in Asian foods from the general community. We try to focus on our specialty of serving Korean flavors. Our most popular items are mostly ready-to-eat products like noodles and soups. We are proud to introduce our food and our culture to the general community."

Merit Construction

Building community centerpieces

Founded in 1957, Merit Construction has all parties to the table early. seen change and itself been a catalyst in the growth of the South Sound region.

Merit's local marquee projects include the construction of the Tacoma Dome in 1981 and the construction of the Boys & Girls Club and Lake City Community Church buildings here in Lakewood.

Tammy Birklid is now Merit's Principal after becoming its full owner in 2020. She has been involved in the construction industry for over 25 years.

Reflecting on changes to the industry, Tammy says, "Construction wasn't as friendly as it is now. Most things were design-bid-build and low-bid wins, unfortunately often at the expense of quality. This method can also lead to delays, disputes and cost overruns."

Merit operates with a "team-build" strategy, which involves learning about the project and working with the architect and the client before starting a project. That brings the experience of

Tammy has also observed changes to Lakewood in her time with the business. As the city has grown, Merit has been a part of that development.

"You can see in our portfolio that we've built community centers, churches, financial institutions, restaurants. industrial parks, etc. When we build something, we want it to be part of the future of that community."

Lakewood Shot Spots

There are dozens of vaccine clinics operating in Lakewood. If you're looking for something quiet and private, try a pharmacy or doctor's office. If you're looking for something speedy without setting up an appointment, try a larger vaccine clinic.

LAKEWOOD TOWNE CENTER CLINIC

A rapid clinic is running at the old Dress Barn location in Towne Center through mid-June. No registration or appointment or documentation is required.

SMALLER & QUIETER CLINICS

In Lakewood, you might stop by a local CVS, Rite Aid, Walgreens, Safeway, Albertsons, Fred Meyer, or Wal-Mart location. Call ahead if you do.

If you prefer to consult a doctor before rolling up your sleeve, many local medical and doctor's offices are offering COVID-19 vaccines as well.

NEED A RIDE?

Around the Sound provides transportation for people with limited mobility, including those who use wheelchairs or scooters. Call (253) 858–7088 or visit atstrans.org.

Pierce Transit gives free bus rides to people going to vaccine appointments or volunteering at vaccine events. Call (253) 581-8000 (press 1, then press 1 again) or visit piercetransit.org.

Uber and Lyft offer rides to and from vaccine events. Call the state COVID-19 information hotline at (833) VAX-HELP for that service.

TEENS NOW ELIGIBLE

Children ages 12-15 are now eligible for the Pfizer vaccine after a successful authorization process through the Food and Drug Administration (FDA).

Public Works Projects



JBLM North Access

Big changes coming to Gravelly Lake Drive

Road work has begun on Phase 1 of the JBLM North Access Project, which will completely rebuild several key interchanges and stretches of roadway. Stretches of Gravelly Lake Drive SW between Nyanza and Washington will be under construction for the next 18 months.

Roundabouts will be installed at four high-traffic interchanges to improve traffic flow and safety for drivers and pedestrians.

New curbs, sidewalks, gutters, landscaping, lighting, and other features will be installed.

In the first stage of construction, Gravelly Lake Drive SW will be closed between Nyanza Road SW and Veteran's Drive SW for 7 to 8 months (February 2022). Local access will be permitted at the north end of the closed section via Veteran's Drive SW.

In the second stage of construction, Gravelly Lake

Drive SW will be closed between Veterans Drive SW and Washington Boulevard for several months. A third phase will close Washington Boulevard between Gravelly Lake Drive SW and Interlaaken Drive SW.

"Once complete, the project will improve walkability along Gravelly Lake Drive between Pacific Highway and Washington Boulevard," said civil engineer Troy Pokwinski.

"By constructing roundabouts at four intersections, we expect to significantly reduce vehicular and injury accidents at these locations. Though the detours will require patience, the improvements will be rewarding."

Work along **Veterans Drive SW** is now complete. Wide shared paths line the street leading to American Lake Park.



An overlay will be applied and sidewalks improved on 108th Street. The work is underway and will continue into July.



Substantial work will affect **Steilacoom Boulevard SW** this summer as sidewalks
are installed and utility poles replaced.

Baseball season is in full swing and thanks to vaccines, so is the end of the COVID-19 pandemic.

This week, we learned more children (as young as 12 years) can now get the vaccine, fully vaccinated people can safely resume most indoor and outdoor activities without masks or distancing, and restrictions on businesses and activities will ease as we roll forward to Phase 3.

While COVID-19 might still throw us a curveball, we are rounding the bases.

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT FUNDS

The City of Lakewood will receive \$13,766,236 in ARPA funds over the next two years. The City Council has begun the process of deciding how these dollars will be spent, and will be reaching out to YOU - stakeholders and City residents in the near future to gather ideas.

The City must spend its ARPA funds by December 31, 2026, so there is time to figure out the best way to use them.



The law allows the City to spend ARPA funds on assisting residents and businesses, and to help the City itself recover from the effects of the pandemic.

Federal, state and county governments will offer rental, mortgage and utility assistance. The City of Lakewood wants to help in other areas to avoid overlap. Ideas include job retraining, business assistance, and loans for small businesses. Other ideas include exanded human services, making City parks and facilities safer to visit, and more.
