CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Anderson called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

ROLL CALL

<u>Councilmembers Present</u>: 6 – Mayor Don Anderson, Councilmembers Mary Moss, Mike Brandstetter, Patti Belle, Paul Bocchi and Linda Farmer.

<u>Councilmembers Excused</u>: 1 – Deputy Mayor Jason Whalen.

<u>Parks and Recreation Advisory Board Present</u>: 3 – Chair Jason Gerwen, Fred Ramey, and Michael Lacadie.

ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION:

South Sound Housing Affordability Partners (SSHA³P) Update.

Mr. John Howell, Cedar River Group, was joined by Executive Dammeier, Tacoma Mayor Woodards, Orting Mayor Penner and Mr. Marty Kooistra.

Executive Dammeier discussed the primary areas that SSHA³P works together such as joint advocacy in Olympia, joint advocacy around policy issues and Capital Projects.

Mayor Woodards discussed the benefits for the community of collaborating with various jurisdictions for affordable housing in the county and explained that the impact would be greater if jurisdictions within the county work together.

Mayor Penner spoke about the diversity of the opinions of this organization. He shared that the problem is the same amongst the county but the solution will be different amongst cities. He also mentioned the benefits of collaborating with other jurisdictions. Discussion ensued related to concerns about the construct of the intergovernmental agreement, perpetuity of the organization, staffing, the cost of lobbying and the ability for parties to join in the future.

City Manager Caulfield then shared that the intergovernmental agreement will come forward for City Council consideration on July 19, 2021.

Joint Parks and Recreation Advisory Board meeting.

Chair Gerwen reviewed the 2021 work plan for the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board (PRAB). Discussion ensued related to prioritizing capital spending on parks, the addition of a parks safety plan discussion to future PRAB agendas, long-term impacts of COVID-19 on city parks and park signs.

Prosecution Services Update.

City Prosecutor Johnson and City Attorney Wachter shared a PowerPoint about Prosecution and related services. They discussed the decline in case filings and shared information about charges related to Domestic Violence, Driving under the Influence and Possession of Controlled Substance. Prosecutor Johnson discussed new legislation that requires officers to give suspects a referral for services twice before they arrest on the drug charges and what Lakewood Police are doing to be in compliance. She then discussed Veteran's Court, Friendship Diversion and the charging standards for these programs. Discussion ensued.

Review of state law related to legal holidays.

City Attorney Wachter and Human Resources Director McDougal discussed Juneteeth and the cost of adding a paid holiday for City employees. Discussion ensued.

REPORTS BY THE CITY MANAGER

Planning Manager Speir provided an update on discussions that have been held with Tacoma and Pierce County about acquiring the Comfort Inn for use as an emergency shelter. She reviewed options for using the Comfort Inn through 2023 as an emergency shelter then as using the building for Permanent Supportive

Housing. She discussed the use of American Rescue Plan Act funding and costs associated with acquisition, operations, future funding for the program as well as how the emergency shelter would work between the three jurisdictions.

Discussion ensued specific to concerns about future costs of operations, benefits of the location from a real estate and public safety standpoint. The City Council gave consensus for the City to continue discussions related to the acquisition.

City Manager Caulfield shared the need for an updated City Council picture and recommended taking that picture at either the July 12 or July 19 meeting. He then shared that SummerFest is cancelled this year and Summerfest 2022 is currently being planned tentatively scheduled for Saturday, July 23, 2022.

City Manager Caulfield discussed fireworks and shared that the City is working with West Pierce Fire and Rescue about discharge of fireworks and what is legal. He also mentioned that next year fireworks will only be legal on July 4 and December 31.

He then shared that the City is applying for a \$5.1 Million grant for defense community infrastructure for the JBLM North Access Improvement Project.

He shared that the City hosted its first drive in movie on June 25, 2021 where 115 vehicles were in attendance and the next drive in movie will be July 9, 2021.

City Manager Caulfield discussed body worn cameras for the Lakewood Police Department. He shared that the goal is to get every officer a body camera and is requesting \$2 Million from the American Rescue Plan Act funds to be used for this. This will be funding for 5 years. It be presented at the study session July 12 and up for consideration on July 19.

Police Chief Zaro then provide an update on the homicide that occurred at American Lake Park. He shared that the suspect is in custody and was charged with Murder 1. The park was closed for investigation but reopened on June 28th. Chief Zaro also reported that there was another shooting on Bridgeport Way this past weekend and the juvenile suspect in this case is in custody.

City Manager shared that he, Dave Bugher and Becky Newton will be meeting with RPAI to discuss the possibility of a downtown park.

CITY COUNCIL COMMENTS

Councilmember Brandstetter reported that he visited the cooling center in City Hall and shared that people who were visiting the cooling center were very appreciative.

Councilmember Belle commended the city and staff for opening the cooling center and efforts at American Lake.

Mayor Anderson shared that last week he attended the Puget Sound Regional Council meeting.

Clover Park School District Report.

Clover Park School District (CPSD) Boardmember Veliz reported that summer enrichment programs are being offered to students through July 29th and free online tutoring services are available for students in 6th through 12th grades through the CLEVER portal. He noted that free meals are available through August 27th, for distribution locations and times visit cloverpark.k12.wa.us. He shared that starting in the fall of 2021 students will return to full time in person learning and a virtual learning option will be available through OSPI. He then reported that Kindergarten registration is currently open for children who will be 5 years old before August 31st noting that immunization records are required for enrollment. He shared that a temporary website has been launched following a cybersecurity incident and the next CPSD Board meeting is scheduled for Monday, July 12th at 6 p.m. Discussion ensued.

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Anderson called the meeting to order at 7:03 p.m.

ROLL CALL

<u>Councilmembers Present</u>: 7 – Mayor Don Anderson, Deputy Mayor Jason Whalen, Councilmembers Mary Moss, Mike Brandstetter, Patti Belle, Paul Bocchi and Linda Farmer.

<u>Lodging Tax Advisory Committee Members Present</u>: 3 – Chelene Potvin-Bird, Phillip Raschke, Linda Smith.

ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION:

Joint Lodging Tax Advisory Committee meeting.

Ms. Potvin-Bird, Travel Tacoma and Pierce County joined the meeting virtually and shared that the Committee will continue to look at venue, attractions and events in Lakewood that will drive engagement and lodging. Ms. Linda Smith, Lakewood Chamber of Commerce joined the meeting virtually and spoke about two campaigns, a Waiting for You driving tour and an On the Road Again itinerary of local restaurants. Mr. Phillip Raschke spoke about the timeline and funding for lodging tax requests in 2021. Discussion ensued.

Review of Multifamily Tax Exemption Conditional Certificate for 112th Street Townhomes.

Planning Manager Brunell provided an overview of the Multifamily Tax Exemption program. She shared that the 112th Street Townhomes project is located in the Lakewood Station Residential Target Area north of the St. Clare Hospital campus. The proposal is for an 8-year exemption for 14 new, two bedroom units that are over 1100 square feet and have on-site parking. She highlighted the design concept, site and design plan as well as the total property tax revenue with and without tax exemption. She shared that next steps are for the City Council to authorize by Resolution the housing exemption contract during the City Council meeting of July 19, 2021. Discussion ensued.

Review of Multifamily Tax Exemption Conditional Certification for TOTO Townhomes.

Planning Manager Brunell shared that the TOTO Townhomes project is located in the Lakewood Station District and the proposal is for a 12-year exemption for 50 new, two bedroom units of which 20% of units set aside for low to moderately-low income housing. She reviewed the site plan, street frontage improvements, parking standards and requirements. Discussion ensued and the Community and Economic Development Department will review standards with the developer and return to the City Council with alternative designs this project.

Colonial Plaza Public Art Update.

Recreation Coordinator Martinez was joined by Arts Commission members Earl Borgert and Lani Neil. Ms. Martinez provided an overview of the Colonia Plaza Public Art selection process. She shared that twelve artists opted to participate in the process, which was narrowed down to a top three who received a \$1500 stipend to create a design proposal and scope of work. Ms. Neil shared photos of the proposed designs by artists Haddad/Drugan and Peter Reiquam. Mr. Borgert then highlighted past projects and proposed designs from artist John Fleming.

Ms. Martinez shared that it is recommended that the City select John Fleming for the Colonial Plaza Public Art project and an agreement will come forward for City Council approval on August 2nd. Discussion ensued.

Parks Capital Improvement Program Update.

Parks, Recreation and Community Services Director Dodsworth shared the Harry Todd Dedication ceremony will take place on August 3rd at 5:00 p.m. during National Night Out. She then shared that a contract amendment Fort Steilacoom Park All Abilities Playground project will come forward at the July 19th City Council authorizing boulder repairs, wood chips, a swing set replacement and project expansion. She then highlighted project design for accessibility and infrastructure improvements at American Lake Park and the three phases of Wards Lake Park improvements. Discussion ensued.

Review of Body Worn Cameras Proposal.

Police Chief Zaro reported that it is recommended that the Lakewood Police Department implement a body worn camera program. The proposal includes equipment costs for 80 body worn cameras, technology support, an information technology server and a Prosecutor and Public Records Specialist to support the program. He shared that there may be an option to use American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding for the program and the State has allocated funding for police reform and if allocated per capita Lakewood would be eligible for approximately \$240,000. Chief Zaro shared that a request for approval of the program will come forward at the City Council meeting of July 19th. Discussion ensued.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: It is recommended that the City Council authorize the City Manager to execute a contract with John Flemming to design, fabricate and install public art at the Colonial Plaza.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: The City of Lakewood coordinated an extensive process to select an artist and public art project for the Colonial Plaza. At the July 12, 2021 study session, the Arts Commisson shared their recommendation to select artist John Fleming's design titled "Gateway Arcs" for this site. City Council concurred. Attached is a contract for services with artist John Fleming to design, fabricate and install two Gateway Arcs at the entrance of Colonial Plaza. The budget is not to exceed \$140,000 (including fees and sales tax). The contract includes miletones. The artist will be given feedback to hone the final design including site needs and installation requirements from August through September. City Council will review and approve a final design in October. Then art production will begin with installation to follow. Installation is anticipated to occur in June or July, 2022.

<u>ALTERNATIVE(S)</u>: Council could not authorize the City Manager to sign the agreement and cancel the project and/or and send the project back to the arts commission for further review. This would delay the installation of the artwork.

FISCAL IMPACT: \$140,000 – funds have been appropriated in the public art fund.

4. <u>COMPENSATION</u>.

- 4.1 <u>Amount</u>. In return for the Services, the City shall pay the Contractor an amount not to exceed a maximum amount and according to a rate or method as delineated in Exhibit "B", attached hereto and incorporated by this reference. The Contractor agrees that any hourly or flat rate charged by it for its services contracted for herein shall remain locked at the negotiated rate(s) for the Term. Except as otherwise provided in Exhibit "B", the Contractor shall be solely responsible for the payment of any taxes imposed by any lawful jurisdiction as a result of the performance and payment of this Agreement.
- 4.2 Method of Payment. On a monthly basis, the Contractor shall submit a voucher or invoice in the form specified by the City, including a description of what Services have been performed, the name of the personnel performing such Services, and any hourly labor charge rate for such personnel. The Contractor shall also submit a final bill upon completion of all Services. Payment shall be made on a monthly basis by the City only after the Services have been performed and within thirty (30) days after receipt and approval by the appropriate City representative of the voucher or invoice. If the Services do not meet the requirements of this Agreement, the Contractor will correct or modify the work to comply with the Agreement. The City may withhold payment for such work until the work meets the requirements of the Agreement.
- 4.3 <u>Non-Appropriation of Funds</u>. If sufficient funds are not appropriated or allocated for payment under this Agreement for any future fiscal period, the City will not be obligated to make payments for Services or amounts incurred after the end of the current fiscal period, and this Agreement will terminate upon the completion of all remaining Services for which funds are allocated. No penalty or expense shall accrue to the City in the event this provision applies.

5. INDEMNIFICATION.

5.1 <u>Contractor Indemnification</u>. Contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold the Public Entity, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers harmless from any and all claims, injuries, damages, losses or suits including attorney fees, arising out of or resulting from the acts, errors or omissions of the Contractor in performance of this Agreement, except for injuries and damages caused by the sole negligence of the Public Entity.

Should a court of competent jurisdiction determine that this Agreement is subject to RCW 4.24.115, then, in the event of liability for damages arising out of bodily injury to persons or damages to property caused by or resulting from the concurrent negligence of the Contractor and the Public Entity, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers, the Contractor's liability, including the duty and cost to defend, hereunder shall be only to the extent of the Contractor's negligence. It is further specifically and expressly understood that the indemnification provided herein constitutes the Contractor's waiver of immunity under Industrial Insurance, Title 51 RCW, solely for the purposes of this indemnification. This waiver has been mutually negotiated by the parties. The provisions of this section shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

5.2 <u>Industrial Insurance Act Waiver</u>. It is specifically and expressly understood that the Contractor waives any immunity that may be granted to it under the Washington State industrial insurance act, Title 51 RCW, solely for the purposes of this indemnification. Contractor's indemnification shall not be limited in any way by any limitation on the amount of damages, compensation or benefits payable to or by any third party under workers' compensation acts, disability benefit acts or any other benefits acts or programs. The Parties acknowledge that they have mutually negotiated this waiver.

- 5.3 <u>Survival</u>. The provisions of this Section shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement with respect to any event occurring prior to such expiration or termination.
- **INSURANCE.** The Contractor shall procure and maintain for the duration of the Agreement, insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damage to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by the Contractor, its agents, representatives, or employees.
- 6.1. <u>No Limitation</u>. Contractor's maintenance of insurance as required by the agreement shall not be construed to limit the liability of the Contractor to the coverage provided by such insurance, or otherwise limit the Public Entity's recourse to any remedy available at law or in equity.
- 6.2. <u>Minimum Scope of Insurance</u>. Contractor shall obtain insurance of the types and coverage described below:
 - a. Automobile Liability insurance covering all owned, non-owned, hired and leased vehicles. Coverage shall be written on Insurance Services Office (ISO) form CA 00 01 or a substitute form providing equivalent liability coverage.
 - b. Commercial General Liability insurance shall be at least as broad as ISO occurrence form CG 00 01 and shall cover liability arising from premises, operations, stop-gap independent contractors and personal injury and advertising injury. The Public Entity shall be named as an additional insured under the Contractor's Commercial General Liability insurance policy with respect to the work performed for the Public Entity using an additional insured endorsement at least as broad as ISO CG 20 26.
 - c. Workers' Compensation coverage as required by the Industrial Insurance laws of the State of Washington.
 - d. Professional Liability insurance appropriate to the Contractor's profession.
- 6.3. <u>Minimum Amounts of Insurance</u>. Contractor shall maintain the following insurance limits:
 - a. Automobile Liability insurance with a minimum combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage of \$1,000,000 per accident.
 - b. Commercial General Liability insurance shall be written with limits no less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence, \$2,000,000 general aggregate.
 - c. Professional Liability insurance shall be written with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per claim and \$1,000,000 policy aggregate limit.
- 6.4 <u>Other Insurance Provision</u>. The Contractor's Automobile Liability and Commercial General Liability insurance policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain that they shall be primary insurance as respect the Public Entity. Any Insurance, self-insurance, or self-insured pool coverage maintained by the Public Entity shall be excess of the Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- 6.5 <u>Acceptability of Insurers</u>. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best rating of not less than A:VII.
- 6.6 <u>Verification of Coverage</u>. Contractor shall furnish the Public Entity with original certificates and a copy of the amendatory endorsements, including but not necessarily limited to the

additional insured endorsement, evidencing the insurance requirements of the Contractor before commencement of the work.

- 6.7 <u>Notice of Cancellation</u>. The Contractor shall provide the Public Entity with written notice of any policy cancellation within two business days of their receipt of such notice.
- 6.8 Failure to Maintain Insurance. Failure on the part of the Contractor to maintain the insurance as required shall constitute a material breach of contract, upon which the Public Entity may, after giving five business days' notice to the Contractor to correct the breach, immediately terminate the contract or, at its discretion, procure or renew such insurance and pay any and all premiums in connection therewith, with any sums so expended to be repaid to the Public Entity on demand, or at the sole discretion of the Public Entity, offset against funds due the Contractor from the Public Entity.
- 6.9 <u>Public Entity Full Availability of Contractor Limits</u>. If the Contractor maintains higher insurance limits than the minimums shown above, the Public Entity shall be insured for the full available limits of Commercial General and Excess or Umbrella liability maintained by the Contractor, irrespective of whether such limits maintained by the Contractor are greater than those required by this contract or whether any certificate of insurance furnished to the Public Entity evidences limits of liability lower than those maintained by the Contractor.
- 6.10 <u>Survival</u>. The provisions of this Section shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.
- 7. WORK PRODUCT. All originals and copies of work product, including plans, sketches, layouts, designs, design specifications, records, files, computer disks, magnetic media or material which may be produced or modified by Contractor while performing the Work shall belong to the City upon delivery. The Contractor shall make such data, documents, and files available to the City and shall deliver all needed or contracted for work product upon the City's request. At the expiration or termination of this Agreement, all originals and copies of any such work product remaining in the possession of Contractor shall be delivered to the City.
- **8. BOOKS AND RECORDS.** The Contractor agrees to maintain books, records, and documents which sufficiently and properly reflect all direct and indirect costs related to the performance of the Work and maintain such accounting procedures and practices as may be deemed necessary by the City to assure proper accounting of all funds paid pursuant to this Agreement. These records shall be subject, at all reasonable times, to inspection, review or audit by the City, its authorized representative, the State Auditor, or other governmental officials authorized by law to monitor this Agreement.
- 9. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR. The Parties intend that the Contractor shall be an independent contractor and that the Contractor has the ability to control and direct the performance and details of its work, the City being interested only in the results obtained under this Agreement. The City shall be neither liable nor obligated to pay Contractor sick leave, vacation pay or any other benefit of employment, nor to pay any social security or other tax which may arise as an incident of employment. Contractor shall take all necessary precautions and shall be responsible for the safety of its employees, agents, and subcontractors in the performance of the contract work and shall utilize all protection necessary for that purpose. All work shall be done at Contractor's own risk, and Contractor shall be responsible for any loss of or damage to materials, tools, or other articles used or held for use in connection with the work. The Contractor shall pay all income and other taxes due except as specifically provided in Section 4. Industrial or any other insurance that is purchased for the benefit of the City, regardless of whether such may provide a secondary or incidental benefit to

the Contractor, shall not be deemed to convert this Agreement to an employment contract. If the Contractor is a sole proprietorship or if this Agreement is with an individual, the Contractor agrees to notify the City and complete any required form if the Contractor retired under a State of Washington retirement system and agrees to indemnify any losses the City may sustain through the Contractor's failure to do so.

- **CONFLICT OF INTEREST.** It is recognized that Contractor may or will be performing professional services during the Term for other parties; however, such performance of other services shall not conflict with or interfere with Contractor's ability to perform the Services. Contractor agrees to resolve any such conflicts of interest in favor of the City. Contractor confirms that Contractor does not have a business interest or a close family relationship with any City officer or employee who was, is, or will be involved in the Contractor's selection, negotiation, drafting, signing, administration, or evaluating the Contractor's performance.
- EQUAL OPPORTUNITY EMPLOYER. In all services, programs, activities, hiring, and employment made possible by or resulting from this Agreement or any subcontract, there shall be no discrimination by Contractor or its subcontractors of any level, or any of those entities' employees, agents, subcontractors, or representatives against any person because of sex, age (except minimum age and retirement provisions), race, color, religion, creed, national origin, marital status, or the presence of any disability, including sensory, mental or physical handicaps, unless based upon a bona fide occupational qualification in relationship to hiring and employment. This requirement shall apply, but not be limited to the following: employment, advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection for training, including apprenticeship. Contractor shall comply with and shall not violate any of the terms of Chapter 49.60 RCW, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Americans With Disabilities Act, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 49 CFR Part 21, 21.5 and 26, or any other applicable federal, state, or local law or regulation regarding non-discrimination.

12. <u>GENERAL PROVISIONS.</u>

- 12.1 <u>Interpretation and Modification</u>. This Agreement, together with any attached Exhibits, contains all of the agreements of the Parties with respect to any matter covered or mentioned in this Agreement and no prior statements or agreements, whether oral or written, shall be effective for any purpose. Should any language in any Exhibits to this Agreement conflict with any language in this Agreement, the terms of this Agreement shall prevail. The respective captions of the Sections of this Agreement are inserted for convenience of reference only and shall not be deemed to modify or otherwise affect any of the provisions of this Agreement. Any provision of this Agreement that is declared invalid, inoperative, null and void, or illegal shall in no way affect or invalidate any other provision hereof and such other provisions shall remain in full force and effect. Any act done by either Party prior to the effective date of the Agreement that is consistent with the authority of the Agreement and compliant with the terms of the Agreement, is hereby ratified as having been performed under the Agreement. No provision of this Agreement, including this provision, may be amended, waived, or modified except by written agreement signed by duly authorized representatives of the Parties.
- 12.2 <u>Assignment and Beneficiaries</u>. Neither the Contractor nor the City shall have the right to transfer or assign, in whole or in part, any or all of its obligations and rights hereunder without the prior written consent of the other Party. If the non-assigning party gives its consent to any assignment, the terms of this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect and no further assignment shall be made without additional written consent. Subject to the foregoing, the rights and obligations of the Parties shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon their respective successors in interest, heirs and assigns. This Agreement is made and entered into for the sole protection and

benefit of the Parties hereto. No other person or entity shall have any right of action or interest in this Agreement based on any provision set forth herein.

- 12.3 <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. The Contractor shall comply with and perform the Services in accordance with all applicable federal, state, local, and city laws including, without limitation, all City codes, ordinances, resolutions, regulations, rules, standards and policies, as now existing or hereafter amended, adopted, or made effective.
- 12.4 Contractor's Employees Employment Eligibility Requirements. The Contractor and any subcontractors shall comply with E-Verify as set forth in Lakewood Municipal Code Chapter 1.42. E-Verify is an Internet-based system operated by United States Citizenship and Immigration Services in partnership with the Social Security Administration. E-Verify is free to employers and is available in all 50 states. E-Verify provides an automated link to federal databases to help employers determine employment eligibility of new hires and the validity of their Social Security numbers. The Contractor shall enroll in, participate in and document use of E-Verify as a condition of the award of this contract. The Contractor shall continue participation in E-Verify throughout the course of the Contractor's contractual relationship with the City. If the Contractor uses or employs any subcontractor in the performance of work under this contract, or any subsequent renewals, modifications or extension of this contract, the subcontractor shall register in and participate in E-Verify and certify such participation to the Contractor. The Contractor shall show proof of compliance with this section, and/or proof of subcontractor compliance with this section, within three (3) working days of the date of the City's request for such proof.
- 12.5 <u>Contractor's Employees Department of Retirement Systems (DRS) Retiree Return to Work Verification Process.</u> The City's obligation to comply with DRS Retiree Return to Work Verification Process extends to Independent Contractors and Third Party Workers. Contractor and any subcontractors shall provide worker information to the City. The Contractor shall provide such requested information, and/or proof of subcontractor compliance with this section.
- Enforcement. Time is of the essence of this Agreement and each and all of its provisions in which performance is a factor. Adherence to completion dates set forth in the description of the Services is essential to the Contractor's performance of this Agreement. Any notices required to be given by the Parties shall be delivered at the addresses set forth at the beginning of this Agreement. Any notices may be delivered personally to the addressee of the notice or may be deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid, to the address set forth above. Any notice so posted in the United States mail shall be deemed received three (3) days after the date of mailing. Any remedies provided for under the terms of this Agreement are not intended to be exclusive, but shall be cumulative with all other remedies available to the City at law, in equity or by statute. The failure of the City to insist upon strict performance of any of the covenants and agreements contained in this Agreement, or to exercise any option conferred by this Agreement in one or more instances shall not be construed to be a waiver or relinquishment of those covenants, agreements or options, and the same shall be and remain in full force and effect. Failure or delay of the City to declare any breach or default immediately upon occurrence shall not waive such breach or default. Failure of the City to declare one breach or default does not act as a waiver of the City's right to declare another breach or default. This Agreement shall be made in, governed by, and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Washington. If the Parties are unable to settle any dispute, difference or claim arising from this Agreement, the exclusive means of resolving that dispute, difference, or claim, shall be by filing suit under the venue, rules and jurisdiction of the Pierce County Superior Court, Pierce County, Washington, unless the parties agree in writing to an alternative process.

If the Pierce County Superior Court does not have jurisdiction over such as suit, then suit may be filed in any other appropriate court in Pierce County, Washington. Each party consents to the personal jurisdiction of the state and federal courts in Pierce County, Washington and waives an objection that such courts are an inconvenient forum. If either Party brings any claim or lawsuit arising from this Agreement, each party shall pay all its legal costs and attorney's fees and expenses incurred in defending or bringing such claim or lawsuit, including all appeals, in addition to any other recovery or award provided by law; provided, however, nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to limit the Parties' rights to indemnification under Section 5 of this Agreement.

12.7 Execution. Each individual executing this Agreement on behalf of the City and Contractor represents and warrants that such individual is duly authorized to execute and deliver this Agreement. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original and with the same effect as if all Parties hereto had signed the same document. All such counterparts shall be construed together and shall constitute one instrument, but in making proof hereof it shall only be necessary to produce one such counterpart. The signature and acknowledgment pages from such counterparts may be assembled together to form a single instrument comprised of all pages of this Agreement and a complete set of all signature and acknowledgment pages. The date upon which the last of all of the Parties have executed a counterpart of this Agreement shall be the "date of mutual execution" hereof.

Community Engagement: The artist will organize and facilitate workshops in community members create art that tells their story and is then installed within the two Arcs on etched metal pieces.

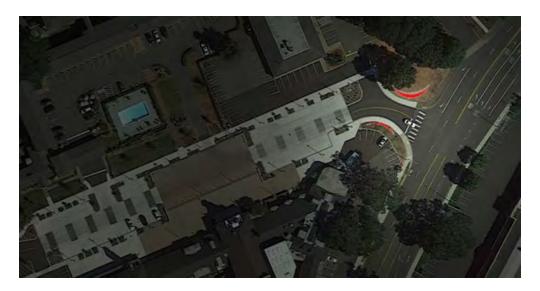

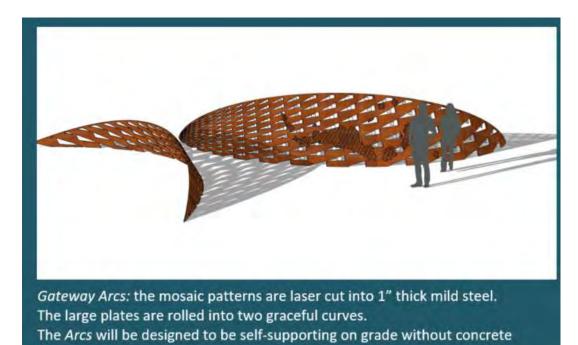

Project Information: This project proposes to acquire 8966 Gravelly Lake Dr. SW. The parcel (APN# 5130001660; 23,000 sf/.528 acres) sits directly adjacent to the LASA Prairie Oaks Client Services Center and 15-unit affordable housing project located at 8956 Gravelly Lake Dr. SW (APN#9009950010/20; 43,200 sf/.7759 acres). This acquisition would complete LASA's acquisition of all parcels located directly to the N (5516 Fairlawn Dr. SW- APN# 5130001640; 14,400 sf/.3305 acres – acquired Jan. 15, 2021) and to the W of the service center (5520 Fairlawn Dr. SW- APN#5130001650; 22,950 sf/.5268 acres – acquired Oct. 12, 2011). In total, the four contiguous parcels would total 103,550 sf or slightly larger than 2.377 acres.

LASA has submitted an application to acquire the property for a total of \$625,000 in HOME funds and additional project funds of \$50,000 (\$26,000 2060 funding and \$24,000 donations in kind for real estate services donated), for a total project cost of \$675,000. Negotiations with the present owner have reduced the acquisition cost to \$550,000 with another \$50,000 in possible garage demolition costs and minor repairs (i.e. painting and removal of illegal bedrooms). The property was recently appraised at \$530,000. Total project costs requested to acquire this property are \$600,000 in HOME funds; no additional funds required.

The property is presently being used as a single-family rental unit and would continue to be used as a low-income single-family rental. Income levels for rental families would be restricted so as not to exceed 80% of the area median income (i.e. \$72,650 for a family of 4), with rents not to exceed approved high HOME rent limits (\$1,306 for a 2-bedroom house). The house would be brought up to HUD's required Housing Quality Standard (HQS) as part of this project.

Property History: The Assessor's website lists the property as a 0 bedroom, 0 bathroom, commercial property built in 1946; however, the house is known to have been used a single family rental property for at least the most recent three years. The house was inspected as part of the City's Rental Housing Safety Program on December 17, 2020 and again on April 5, 2021. Inspection noted possibly two bedrooms which were added illegally (dining room being used as a bedroom and upstairs attic being used as a bedroom), and two rooms which could qualify as bedrooms which appeared to be unmodified from original construction. The house does have a bathroom and a kitchen. The property appears to have been constructed as a single-family residence which was later converted into commercial use. The house is expected to be repaired and placed into service as a single-family rental unit with minimal effort. With the house being used as a residential property, zoning would allow continuation of an existing use.

Land Use Amendments Required: The property is presently zoned Arterial Residential Commercial (ARC) and borders Residential 4 (R4) properties to the north and Multifamily Two (MF2) parcels to the south. Existing zoning would allow up to 8 housing units on this parcel and another 10 on LASA's other two adjacent parcels, for a total of 18 units. Should LASA combine this parcel with its three adjoining parcels (resulting property would be 2.377 acres) and seek a change in land use designation to Multifamily Two (MF2), the site could be redeveloped as a planned development district and eligible for between 50 and 60 units of affordable housing. The land use amendment would be essential for future redevelopment efforts to offset rising construction and redevelopment costs. Staff is in support of amending the current zoning. Table 1 provides property details on land use and density.

Use of Funds: Funding for this project would be provided through Lakewood's HOME Affordable Housing Fund established as part of HUD's Annual Action Plan process. The fund has a balance of \$393,027 in funds available to be allocated to eligible HOME projects. An additional \$206,973 in HOME Housing Rehabilitation funds would be moved to the Affordable Housing fund to complete the balance. There are no HOME Rehabilitation projects in the cue, so no disruptions are anticipated.

While this allocation (\$600,000) is high for a single-family residence, it does make sense when looking at the highest and best use for the property. Developed on its own, 8966 Gravelly Lake Dr. SW, with its 23,000 sf or .528 acres could be developed into at most 8 units. The same for LASA's other adjacent parcels 5516 Fairlawn Dr. SW (8 units) and 5520 Fairlawn Dr. SW (2 units). In total, were the parcels developed on their own, one could construct at most 18 units. When combined with LASA's other adjacent parcels, including the existing Prairie Oaks Client Service Center parcel, and rezoned to Multifamily 2 (MF2) zoning, the property would be in excess of 2 acres, eligible to be developed as a planned development district, and would be able to construct between 50 and 60 units. It is this higher density and potential for development which make the parcel valuable and highly desirable for LASA to acquire.

Additionally, due to the COVID-19 pandemic HUD has relaxed some of its regulatory requirements to allow for the economic impacts of the coronavirus, allowing grantees to develop projects which may otherwise have been out of reach due to long development timelines or extensive development costs associated with land acquisition and rising construction costs. One of those exemptions is HUD's waiver of the Maximum Per Unit Subsidy Limit through September 30, 2021. Under current rules, a grantee may not exceed the per unit dollar limitations established under section 221(d)(3) of the National Housing Act. For Lakewood and this specific project, that cap would be set at \$213,717 (limit for a 2-bedroom home). Without this waiver in effect, the project as a single-family rental would not qualify for federal funding at this level as it would exceed the maximum per unit subsidy limits. With this waiver in effect, there exists a one-time window to acquire this property and secure future development options for LASA.

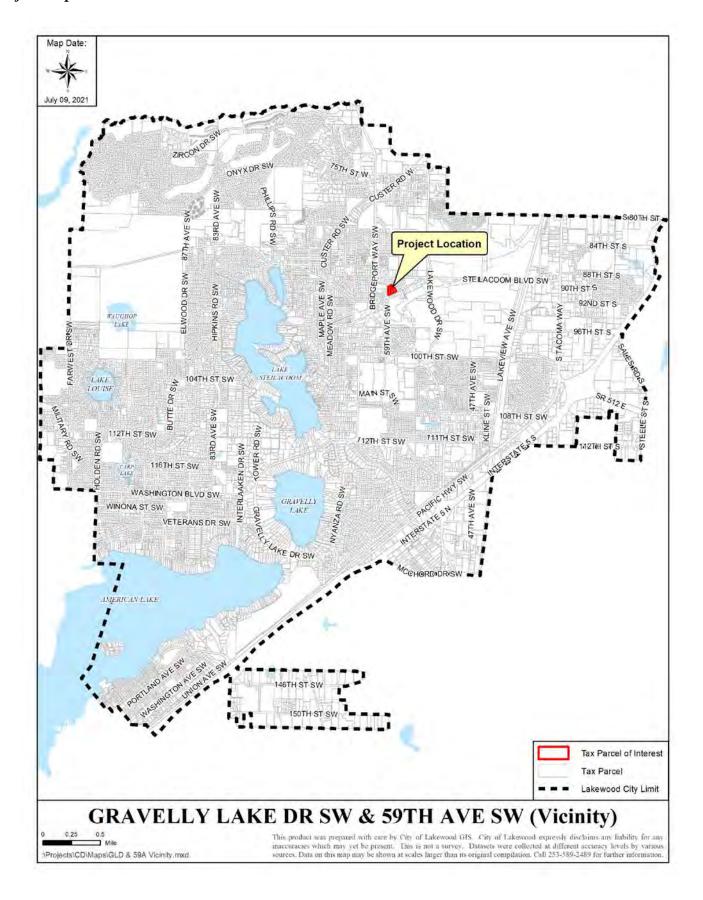
Project Funding: Funding is proposed as a forgivable development subsidy to the developer; however, the property will carry an affordability covenant guaranteeing the property meets HUD's 15-year term of affordability for low-income households, project development conditions, and a repayment clause should the terms of Lakewood's agreement not be met. The subsidy will be a 15-year deferred loan with forgiveness at the end of the affordability period provided all conditions of the agreement are met. The purpose of a development grant vs. development loan would be to allow LASA to provide lower rents to those low- and very-low income

families who may otherwise be unable to afford current rents without deep subsidies. Additionally, rental income received from this property would not be sufficient to debt service a loan of this size while serving low-income rental households.

Consistency with Approved 5-Year FY 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan for Housing and Community Development and FY 2020 and FY 2021 Consolidated Annual Action Plans: The proposed use of funds is consistent with the 5-Yr Consolidated Plan and both FY 2020 and FY 2021 Consolidated Annual Action Plans as adopted by Council. As part of the Consolidated Plan's proposed use of funds, a HOME Affordable Housing Fund allocation was set aside for the expansion of affordable housing opportunities through collaboration with partners and housing providers.

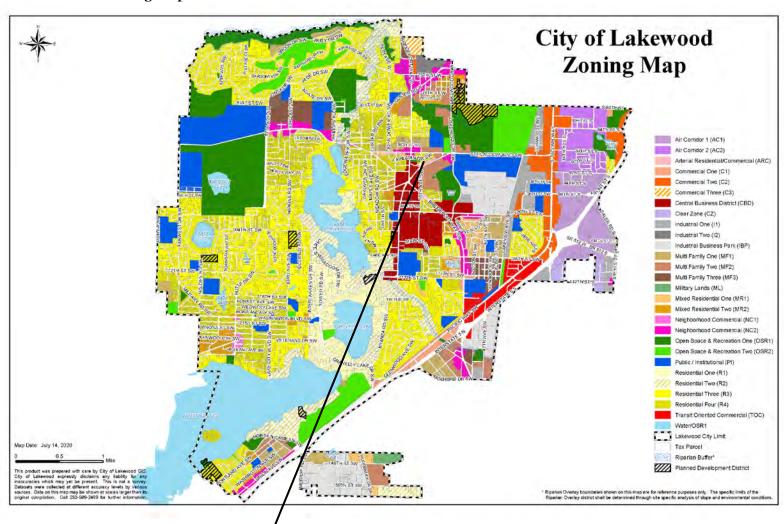

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the City Council authorize the City Manager to approve an amendment to the City's contract from the Washington State Health Care Authority (HCA) to continue serving as the Lakewood's CHOICE fiscal sponsor.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: The City has been the fiscal sponsor for Lakewood's CHOICE since July 1, 2019. It is a behavioral health initiative that serves parents and youth directly with various programs and curricula in partnership with the school district and local nonprofit organizations. This initiative does high impact work and is a great partner in Lakewood. The first two-year contract was for \$240,000. The attached amendment is to add \$260,000 of new money and extend the duration of the contract through June 30, 2023. Most of the contract pays for the two CHOICE contractors who perform the work, and 8% is set aside for admin dollars which goes to the City.

The ideal organization to be this fiscal agent would be a behavioral health services provider. The City hopes to identify such an organization within the next year to take over this contract. The City can terminate this contract with HCA "for convenience" at any time with 30 days written notice.

<u>ALTERNATIVE(S)</u>: 1. Approve the HCA contract amendment through June 30, 2023 and begin looking for a behavioral health organization to take over this contract within the next year.

- 2. Approve the HCA contract amendment through June 30, 2023 and reevaluate this contract in 2023.
- 3. Discontinue the HCA contract which would eliminate the program for Lakewood Youth.

<u>FISCAL IMPACT</u>: Fiscal impact of the HCA contract amendment is \$130,000 per year passing through the City for up to two years. The City receives \$10,400 per year for expenses which covers administrative costs for human services and finance staff.

1. INTRODUCTION:

This Intergovernmental Agreement (Agreement), pursuant to Ch. 39.34 RCW (Interlocal Cooperation Act) and Ch. 38.52 RCW (Emergency Management Act), is made and entered into by and between the Washington State Military Department through its Emergency Management Division (EMD), and the local jurisdiction within the State of Washington identified above, hereinafter referred to as "Jurisdiction". Under Ch. 38.52 RCW, EMD is responsible for carrying out the program for emergency management of Washington State, coordinating the activities of all organizations for emergency management within the State, and taking preparatory steps for the furnishing of emergency management personnel in time of need consistent with the State Comprehensive Emergency Management plans and programs. This Agreement provides for the use of authorized resources (including employees and equipment) of the Jurisdiction by EMD and other State agencies when EMD has identified a State agency emergency management need for identified authorized resources of the Jurisdiction that are qualified and immediately available to deploy and perform the requested State agency emergency management assistance.

2. SCOPE:

Pursuant to this Agreement, the authorized resources of the Jurisdiction will only be deployed through EMD at EMD's request to provide assistance to EMD or another State agency through EMD during a Washington State emergency. When authorized resources of the Jurisdiction are deployed under this Agreement, Jurisdiction employees remain employees of the providing Jurisdiction and Jurisdiction equipment remains equipment of the providing Jurisdiction. The Jurisdiction will be reimbursed for authorized costs incurred as a result of authorized resource deployment as provided in this Agreement. This Agreement shall not be used as a substitute for obtaining Intrastate Mutual Aid under RCW 38.56.

3. Authorization and Deployment of Resources

- a. This Agreement is not an authorization to deploy. Deployment of the Jurisdiction's resources under this Agreement shall only be authorized as provided in a completed amendment to this Agreement in the form of "Attachment A" that has been mutually executed by the parties. The Jurisdiction shall not deploy any resources under this Agreement except in compliance with such authorization. No reimbursement will be provided for resources deployed inconsistent with such authorization.
- b. Jurisdiction resources authorized for deployment under this Agreement (the "authorized resources") are only those listed on mutually executed amendments in the form attached hereto as "Attachment A" that references this Agreement by number and includes the authorized charge code, mission number and disaster name, identification of the authorized resource

(employee/equipment), description of the anticipated duties, maximum reimbursement, estimated duration of deployment, reporting location, point of contact at the destination, and completed verification of credentials.

4. Financial Management and Reimbursement

- a. The Military Department will reimburse the Jurisdiction for the expenses of authorized resources deployed under this Agreement up to the maximum amount provided for herein to the extent supported by proper documentation establishing the expenses were actually incurred pursuant to authorized deployment under the Agreement. No reimbursement will be provided for resources deployed inconsistent with the authorization contained in a completed amendment to this Agreement in the form attached hereto as "Attachment A" that has been mutually executed by the parties.
- b. The authorized resource expenses that may be reimbursed are only those contained in a completed amendment to this Agreement in the form attached hereto as "Attachment A" that has been mutually executed by the parties, and include backfill hours for employees who were regularly scheduled to work prior to deployment, employee salary, benefits, overtime, air and land travel expenses, lodging, and per diem; and equipment use and operation costs. Unless this Agreement is amended by Attachment A to provide otherwise, lodging and per diem shall only be reimbursed in accordance with the Federal General Services Administration (GSA) rates for the applicable deployment location existing at the time of deployment under this Agreement, which are located at http://www.gsa.gov/portal/category/21287.
- c. The maximum amount of reimbursement for Fire District and Fire Department authorized resources shall be based on the State Fire Chiefs Rate Schedule in effect at the time of deployment, which is incorporated herein by reference. Fire Districts and Departments will be paid for backfill hours of employees who were regularly scheduled to work prior to deployment and subsequently deployed as an authorized resource under this Agreement, but not to exceed the total number of regularly scheduled hours for that employee. These hours will be calculated the same as the fire district or department calculates its regular hours for days scheduled for duty. Regular hours for the deployed employee are not reimbursable when the Jurisdiction is seeking backfill for the same hours. For all other Jurisdictions, the maximum amount of reimbursement for authorized employee expenses under this Agreement shall be the lesser of (1) the maximum amount identified in the mutually executed Attachment A to this Agreement and amendments thereto, or (2) the amount that the employee would have received in the absence of this Agreement. In no case will reimbursement for authorized resources of any Jurisdiction (including Fire Districts and Fire Departments) exceed the maximum estimated total resource cost identified in the mutually executed Attachment A or a subsequent mutually executed written amendment thereto in the same form.
- d. The Jurisdiction shall maintain books, records, documents, receipts and other evidence which sufficiently and properly support and reflect all costs and expenditures authorized by this Agreement. These records shall be subject to inspection, review or audit during normal business hours by authorized Department/EMD personnel or its designee(s), the Office of the State Auditor, and federal officials so authorized by law. Such books, records, documents, receipts and other material relevant to this Agreement shall be retained for six (6) years after expiration.
- e. The Jurisdiction will submit a final state invoice voucher identifying this Agreement and the appropriate charge code to the Military Department within 60 days after return by the deployed authorized resource, and must include documentation and receipts supporting all claimed reimbursement. The Jurisdiction agrees to immediately comply with any request by EMD for additional supporting documentation or receipts.

5. Resource Management

a. The Jurisdiction agrees that it will only deploy employees as authorized resources under this Agreement who are fully qualified and capable of performing the duties described in the completed and mutually executed Attachment A and under the conditions described therein. The Jurisdiction agrees that if any of its employees deployed as an authorized resource under this Agreement are determined by EMD or other State agency using the employees as an authorized resource, in its sole discretion, to not meet this requirement, those employees may in the sole discretion of the EMD or State agency using the employees be returned to the Jurisdiction from which they deployed at the sole cost and expense of the Jurisdiction, and the cost and expense of deploying and returning the employee(s) will not be reimbursed under this Agreement. Such qualifications and capabilities shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

- 1) Has completed training for ICS 100, 700 and 800;
- 2) Has received training customary or required for the position for which they are being deployed;
- 3) Currently possesses all certifications and licenses required in the state of Washington to perform the duties for which they are being deployed;
- 4) Has past experience operating in the position for which they are being deployed; and
- 5) Has the ability to fully and effectively perform all duties of the position for which they are being deployed.

The Jurisdiction agrees to maintain documentation of its authorized employee's qualifications and capabilities, and sign a completed Verification of Credentialing form as provided in Attachment A as part of any amendment authorizing resource deployment under this Agreement.

- b. The Jurisdiction agrees that if any of its employees deployed as an authorized resource under this Agreement exhibit behavior, conduct or other condition that, in the sole discretion of the EMD or State agency using the employees, interferes with the employee's ability to perform the duties for which they are deployed, that employee may, in the sole discretion of the EMD or State agency using the employees, be returned to the Jurisdiction from which they deployed at the sole cost and expense of the Jurisdiction, and such cost and expense will not be reimbursed under this Agreement.
- c. The Jurisdiction agrees that it will only deploy equipment as an authorized resource under this Agreement that is in good working order and condition when deployed. Any such equipment determined by the EMD or State agency using the equipment in its sole discretion not to have been in good working order or condition at the time of deployment may, in the sole discretion of the EMD or State agency using the equipment, be returned to the Jurisdiction from which it was deployed at the sole cost and expense of the Jurisdiction, and the cost and expense of deploying and returning the equipment will not be reimbursed under this Agreement.
- d. The Jurisdiction agrees that its employees deployed under this Agreement will be required by the Jurisdiction to conduct themselves in a professional and ethical manner throughout the period of deployment, consistent with all laws, regulations and policies applicable to the Jurisdiction and its employees.

6. Alterations And Amendments

This Agreement and any of its Attachments may only be altered or amended by mutual agreement of the parties. Such amendments shall not be binding unless they are in writing and signed by personnel authorized to bind each of the parties. All other terms and conditions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and binding upon the parties.

7. Termination

Either party may terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days prior written notification to the other party. If this Agreement is so terminated, the parties shall be liable only for performance rendered or costs incurred in accordance with the terms of this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination.

8. All Writings Contained Herein

This Agreement contains all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties. No other understandings, oral or otherwise, regarding the subject matter of this Agreement shall be deemed to exist or to bind any of the parties hereto.

Andy Gildehaus RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the City Council authorize use of the DOJ Byrne Grant funding to purchase a FARO 3D Crime Scene Scanner for the Lakewood Police Department. DISCUSSION: The FARO Scanner that is currently in use is 15 years old, takes up to 6 times longer to complete a single scan and is no longer supported by FARO Technologies. In reference to the time issue, it takes an average of 12-18 scans at the scene of a traffic fatality or major crime scene. Each scan with the new machine would take around 8 minutes instead of the 40 to 45 minutes that the current one takes. With the current scanner no longer being supported by FARO, if we have any technical or equipment issues, the machine cannot be upgraded or fixed and we may lose valuable data from the scan after the scene has been cleared. We have been allowed to use a FARO Scanner from the Puyallup Police Department (PDD) but that is only when it is available. It too is getting up in years and not as efficient as the new models. We have run into a situation on several occasions where we needed to borrow PPD's FARO but it was not available as it was being used when we needed it. One of the many advantages to the newer FARO models is the software compatibility that allows us to integrate the FARO scans with our UAS scans and create a more complete picture under our PIX4D software. The new FARO Scanner would be used for crime scenes and serious injury or fatality collisions. This FARO Scanner is smaller, lasts longer on a single charge, completes scans faster, collects more data and allows multilevel reconstructive scene integration allowing for better collection of evidence and scene preservation. ALTERNATIVE(S): The City Council could choose not to authorize the use of grant funds for this purchase.

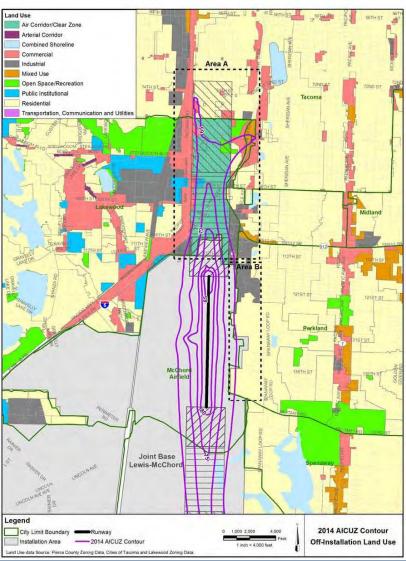

Title 18A

[Insert new Section 18A.10.125 and Figure 3]

18A.10.125 JBLM AICUZ in relation to Land Use Zones. The City of Lakewood is host City to Joint Base Lewis McChord, and portions of the JBLM flight patterns' Clear Zone (CZ) and Accident Potential Zones (APZs) are located within the City's boundaries. The City follows Department of Defense guidance and limits land use densities within the CZ and APZs. See Figure 3.

18A.10.180 Definitions

Affordable housing" and "affordable unit" mean a dwelling unit(s) reserved for occupancy by eligible households and having monthly housing expenses to the occupant no greater

than thirty (30) percent of a given monthly household income, adjusted for household size, as follows:

- 1. Moderate Income. For owner-occupied housing, eighty (80) percent of the area median income, and for renter-occupied housing, sixty (60) percent of the area median income.
- 2. Pursuant to the authority of RCW 36.70A.540, the City finds that the higher income levels specified in the definition of affordable housing in this title, rather than those stated in the definition of "low-income households" in RCW 36.70A.540, are needed to address local housing market conditions in the City.
- 3. For Chapter 3.64 LMC, "affordable housing" means residential housing that is rented by a person or household whose monthly housing costs, including utilities other than telephone, do not exceed thirty (30) percent of the household's monthly income. For the purposes of housing intended for owner occupancy, "affordable housing" means residential housing that is within the means of low- or moderate-income households.

"Affordable housing" means residential housing that is rented by a person or household whose monthly housing costs, including utilities other than telephone, do not exceed thirty percent of the household's monthly income. For the purposes of housing intended for owner occupancy, "affordable housing" means residential housing that is within the means of low or moderate-income households.

"Antenna" means

- means any exterior apparatus designed for telephonic, radio, data, Internet, or television communications through the sending and/or receiving of electromagnetic waves, and includes equipment attached to a tower or building for the purpose of providing telecommunications services an apparatus designed for the purpose of emitting radiofrequency (RF) radiation, to be operated or operating from a fixed location pursuant to FCC authorization, for the provision of personal wireless service and any commingled information services. For purposes of this definition, the term antenna does not include an unintentional radiator, mobile station, or device authorized under 47 CFR Part 15; and
- an apparatus designed for the purpose of emitting radiofrequency (RF) radiation, to be operated or operating from a fixed location pursuant to FCC authorization, for the provision of personal wireless service and any commingled information services. For purposes of this definition, the term antenna does not include an unintentional radiator, mobile station, or device authorized under 47 CFR Part 15.

"Campus facilities master plan" means the area that is defined by the University of Washington as necessary for the future growth and development of its campus facilities for campuses authorized under RCW 28B.45.020.

"Low-income household" means a single person, family, or unrelated persons living together whose adjusted income is at or below eighty (80) percent of the median family

income adjusted for family size, for the county, city, or metropolitan statistical area, where the project is located, as determined by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development for the Tacoma Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area. reported by the United States department of housing and urban development.

"Moderate-income household" means a single person, family, or unrelated persons living together whose adjusted income is more than eighty (80) percent but is at or below one hundred fifteen (115) percent of the median family income adjusted for family size, for the county, city, metropolitan statistical, where the project is located, as reported by the United States department of housing and urban development. For cities located in high-cost areas, "moderate-income household" means a household that has an income that is more than one hundred (100) percent, but at or below one hundred fifty (150) percent, of the median family income adjusted for family size, for the county where the project is located.

Multifamily housing" or "multifamily" means building(s) having four (4) or more dwelling units designed for permanent residential occupancy resulting from new construction or rehabilitation or conversion of vacant, underutilized, or substandard buildings.

"Multiple-unit housing" means a building or a group of buildings having four (4) or more dwelling units for permanent residential occupancy, not designed or used as transient accommodations and not including hotels and motels. Multifamily units may result from new construction or rehabilitated or conversion of vacant, underutilized, or substandard buildings to multifamily housing.

Permanent residential occupancy" means multifamily housing that provides either rental or owner occupancy for a period of at least one (1) month. This excludes hotels and motels that predominately offer rental accommodation on a daily or weekly basis.

"Permanent residential occupancy" means multiunit housing that provides either rental or owner occupancy on a nontransient basis. This includes owner-occupied or rental accommodation that is leased for a period of at least one (1) month. This excludes hotels and motels that predominately offer rental accommodation on a daily or weekly basis.

"Residential target area" ("RTA") means an area that has been designated by the City Council as lacking sufficient, available, desirable, and convenient residential housing to meet the needs of the public. With respect to designations after July 1, 2007, "residential targeted area" may not include a campus facilities master plan. See Chapter 3.64 LMC.

"Substantial compliance" means compliance with local building or housing code requirements that are typically required for rehabilitation as opposed to new construction.

"Urban center" means a compact identifiable district where urban residents may obtain a variety of products and services. An urban center must contain (a) Several existing or previous, or both, business establishments that may include but are not limited to shops, offices, banks, restaurants, governmental agencies; (b) Adequate public facilities including streets, sidewalks, lighting, transit, domestic water, and sanitary sewer systems; and (c) A

mixture of uses and activities that may include housing, recreation, and cultural activities in association with either commercial or office, or both, use.

Any proposed use not listed in the <u>land use</u> table(<u>s</u>) shall be classified by the Director as permitted, conditional, or not permitted, based on the listed uses to which the proposed use is most similar. The <u>Director</u> shall make the determination according to the characteristics of the operation of the proposed <u>use</u> and based upon the <u>Director</u>'s interpretation of the <u>Land Based Classification Standards</u> ("LBCS") of the American Planning Association. The <u>use</u> shall be considered materially similar if it falls within the same LBCS classification. Where there is a question regarding the inclusion or exclusion of a particular proposed use within a particular zoning district, use category, or use type, the Director shall have the authority to make the final determination. 18A.80.020 General requirements.

- G. Location. Off-street parking facilities shall be located on the same property as the use they are required to serve and within three hundred (300) feet of the use, except as provided below. Where a distance is specified, such distance shall be the walking distance measured from the nearest point of the parking facilities to the nearest point of the building that such facility is required to serve.
 - 1. For a nursing home, assisted living facility, convalescent home, or group home, the parking facilities shall be located within one hundred (100) feet of the building they are required to serve.
 - 2. For multifamily dwellings where the lot cannot accommodate all the required parking on site for its needs, up to forty (40) percent of the required parking may be located on a lot adjacent to the development.; provided, that the lot is legally encumbered pursuant to LMC 18A.80.060.
 - 3. For all nonresidential uses where the lot cannot accommodate all the required parking on-site for its needs, parking facilities shall be located not farther than seven hundred fifty (750) feet from the facility. ; provided, that the lot is legally encumbered pursuant to LMC 18A.80.060. Parking shall not be permitted on properties zoned single-family residential (R1, R2, R3, R4) or open space (OSR1 and OSR2) unless the parking is being provided for a use that is permitted in said district.
 - 4. For subsections G.1., G.2., and G. 3., off-site parking lots must be legally encumbered pursuant to LMC 18A.89.060.
- I. Mechanical Parking Lifts. In commercial zones and multi-family developments, by approving a mechanical lift permit, mechanical parking lifts may be used to satisfy all or a portion of vehicle parking requirements. Additional surface parking up to twenty-five percent (25-percent) of the required minimum amount of spaces may be required for lift systems unable to accommodate a range of vehicles including trucks, vans, SUV's, or large sedans. Applications submittals shall include any information deemed necessary by the Director to determine parking can adequately and feasibly be provided and that the following performance standards can be met and the following findings for approval can be made:
 - 1. The use of mechanical lift parking results in superior design and implementation of City goals and policies for infill development.
 - 2. In existing developments and established neighborhoods, mechanical lift parking will be adequately screened and compatible with the character of surrounding development; and, in new developments, mechanical lift parking be compatible and appropriately considered with overall building and site design.

- 3. Mechanical lift parking systems shall comply with all development standards including but not limited to height and setback requirements, and parking and driveway standards with the exception of minimum parking stall sizes which are established by lift specifications.
- 4. There exists adequate agreement running with the land that mechanical parking systems will be safely operated and maintained in continual operation with the exception of limited periods of maintenance.
- 5. There are no circumstances of the site or development, or particular model or type of mechanical lift system which could result in significant impacts to those living or working on the site or in the vicinity.

18A.80.025 Maintenance

- A. It shall be the responsibility of the property owner to ensure that all off-street parking spaces and areas required by this chapter are maintained for the duration of the improvement or use requiring the parking area.
- B. All parking facilities, including curbs, directional markings, handicapped symbols, landscaping, pavement, signs, striping, and wheel stops, shall be permanently maintained by the property owner/tenant in good repair, free of litter and debris, potholes, obstructions, and stored material.
- C. Drive aisles, approach lanes, and maneuvering areas shall be marked and maintained with directional arrows and striping to expedite traffic movement. Any area not intended for parking shall be signed as such, or, in areas where curb exists, the curb may be painted red in lieu of signs.

18A.95 Wireless Service Facilities

NOTE: Currently, LMC 18A.95.180 states that design standards are the equivalent of "concealment" features and that a small cell couldn't be expanded beyond its definitional size by an EFR. In its order 20.75 at paragraphs 35 et seq., the FCC specifically referenced the position of local governments and rejected it.

18A.95.180 Review Criteria

* * *

C. *Eligible Facilities Requests.*

Small wireless facilities may be expanded pursuant to an eligible facilities request so long as the expansion (i) does not defeat design elements specifically designated as concealment techniques and b) incorporates the aesthetic elements and design criteria set forth in this chapter in a manner consistent with the rights granted an eligible facility. The design approved in a small wireless facility permit shall be considered concealment elements and such facilities may only be expanded upon submittal of an eligible facilities

request described in LMC 18A.95.160, when the modification does not defeat the concealment elements of the small wireless facility

Subject: Lakewood Landing TIF District Primer

Background

Lakewood Landing is a significant redevelop project located on Pacific Highway. One of the ways that the City is supporting this project is by exploring avenues to offset the cost of infrastructure. This year, the Washington state legislature passed the first Tax Increment Financing (TIF) package ever adopted in the state, HB 1189. TIF is a method of redistributing property tax collections within designated (increment) areas to finance infrastructure improvements.

Summary

This new tool allows public agencies to make targeted infrastructure improvements to spur economic development. It is designed for a specific project, and the area boundaries and public improvements may not change once adopted. An analysis must be prepared, and assessments of any impacts to affordable housing, the business community, school districts, and fire districts must be a part of the plan. The sponsoring jurisdiction may have only two active increment areas which may not overlap, or have an aggregate assessed valuation of greater than \$200 million.

A detailed PowerPoint overview of the legislation and project effects has been prepared by Mr. Bob Stowe, consultant for the Lakewood Landing project who will lead our discussion.

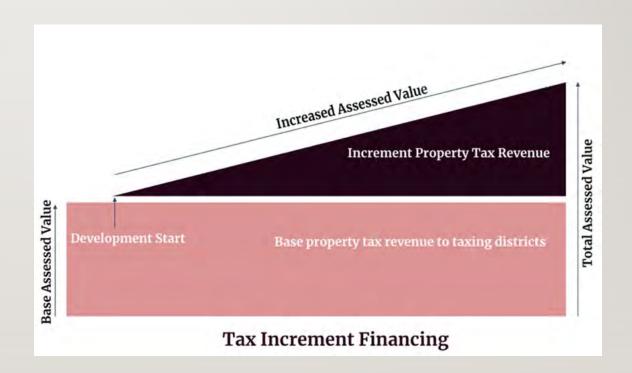

3 WHAT IS TIF?

- New Tool allowing public agencies to make targeted infrastructure improvements to spur economic development.
- Allocates future increases in property tax from a designated area generated by the development to pay for the infrastructure improvements that are needed for the development to occur.



4 OVERVIEW OF HB 1189: TAX INCREMENT FINANCING

- Designed for a specific project/site (not "build infrastructure, development will follow")
- City, county, or port adopts an ordinance designating increment area, and identifying the public improvements to be financed, and whether bonds will be issued.
 - No more than two increment areas.
 - Increment areas may not total more than \$200 million in assessed valuation, or more than 20% of the total assessed valuation of the jurisdiction creating the increment area, whichever is less.
 - Cannot add additional public improvements or change the boundary of the increment area once adopted.
 - Must include a deadline by when construction of public improvements will begin.
 - The local government may only receive TIF revenues for the period of time necessary to pay the costs of the public improvements.
 - If the local government finances the public improvements, the increment area must be retired no more than 25 years after the adoption of the ordinance designating the increment area.

5 OVERVIEW OF HB I 189: TAX INCREMENT FINANCING

- Hold two public hearings exclusively on the project
- Submit to the state office of the treasurer for review
- Publish notice in public newspaper
- Notice to county treasurer, county assessor, and governing body of each taxing district where the increment area is located

6 OVERVIEW OF HB 1189:TAX INCREMENT FINANCING

Eligible Infrastructure improvements owned by a local government within or outside of and serving the increment area that include:

- Street and road construction;
- Water and sewer system construction and improvements;
- Sidewalks and other non-motorized transportation improvements and streetlights;
- Parking, terminal, and dock facilities;
- Park and ride facilities or other transit facilities;
- Park and community facilities and recreational areas;
- Stormwater and drainage management systems;
- Electric, broadband, or rail service;
- Mitigation of brownfields; or

Eligible expenditures for any of the following purposes:

- Purchasing, rehabilitating, retrofitting for energy efficiency, and constructing housing for the purpose of creating or preserving long-term affordable housing;
- Purchasing, rehabilitating, retrofitting for energy efficiency, and constructing child care facilities serving children and youth that are low-income, homeless, or in foster care;
 Providing maintenance and security for the public improvements; or
- Historic preservation activities authorized under RCW 35.21.395.

7 OVERVIEW OF HB 1189:TAX INCREMENT FINANCING

- City, county, or port must make a finding:
 - Public improvements will encourage private development
 - Private development would not otherwise occur within the reasonably foreseeable future
 - The increased assessed valuation <u>without</u> the public improvements is less than the increase in assessed valuation that would occur from the proposed development with the public improvements

8 OVERVIEW OF HB 1189: TAX INCREMENT FINANCING

- Must prepare project analysis. Highlights:
 - A description of the expected private development within the increment area, including a comparison of scenarios with and without proposed public improvements
 - An assessment of any impacts and necessary mitigation to address impacts on the following:
 - Affordable and low-income housing
 - Local business community
 - Local school districts
 - Local fire service
 - If 20% of the assessed valuation in fire district impacted, or increase in level of service to increment area, must negotiate a mitigation plan

9 OVERVIEW OF HB I 189: TAX INCREMENT FINANCING

- Increment area is effective June 1st following adoption of ordinance
- Each taxing district will collect levy + 1% + TIF growth
 - TIF growth = district's levy rate X growth in assessed valuation
- Applies to local property taxes only
- Limited to the amount needed to fund public improvements outlined in ordinance
- How revenue is collected:
 - Each special purpose district in the increment area collects:
 - What they collected the previous year + 1% + new construction + TIF growth
 - TIF growth is previous year's levy rate x increase in AV ("the increment")

10 SCOPE OF WORK

- Cash flow model of potential TIF revenues from City and special purpose district's property tax proceeds based on:
 - Lakewood Landing Area & Utilizing Central Core pro forma analysis to project development potential for remaining Lakewood Landing properties. Additional infrastructure analysis needed to support the proposed development and any future TIF area.
 - High level overview to assist City leadership in determining viability of TIF for Lakewood Landing and the potential debt issuance that can be supported.

PURPOSE: ESTIMATE TIF REVENUES

- TIF Legislation How long can revenues flow?
 - The local government may only receive the increased property tax revenues for the period of time necessary to pay the costs of the public improvements.
 - If the local government finances the public improvements, the increment area must be retired no more than 25 years after the adoption of the ordinance designating the increment area.
- Lakewood Land How much infrastructure investment could be supported?
 - Examines level of development and timing
 - Estimates future property tax revenues from captured jurisdictions
 - Estimate Present Value (or size of an infrastructure bond) of future revenues

12 GENERAL LIMITATIONS AND ASSUMPTIONS

- The sponsoring jurisdiction may have only two active Increment Areas at any given time.
 - Assumed Lakewood Landing will have one increment area.
- Those Increment Areas may not overlap, and no Increment Area may comprise the entire geographic area of the jurisdiction.
 - Assumed Lakewood Landing will have one increment area.
- At the time of their creation, the Increment Areas may not have an aggregate assessed valuation of greater than \$200 million or 20 percent of the jurisdiction's total assessed value, whichever is less.
 - City assessed value for 2021 taxes: \$8,111,198,629
 - Lakewood Landing assessed value: \$16,580,300
 - Less than \$200 million: 0.20% of Lakewood total assessed value
- The TIF must have a sunset date no later than 25 years after the first year in which tax revenues are allocated.
 - Assumed that District is created a year before construction starts
 - 2022 district creation running until 2047

13 FIRE DISTRICT LIMITATION

- If the project analysis indicates that an increment area will impact at least 20 percent of the assessed value in a fire protection district or regional fire protection service authority, or the fire service agency's annual report demonstrates an increase in the level of service directly related to the increment area, the local government must negotiate a mitigation plan with the fire protection district or regional fire protection service authority to address level of service issues in the increment area.
 - FD assessed value for 2021 taxes: \$13,476,988,728
 - Lakewood Landing assessed value: \$16,580,300
 - No Fire District Impact: 0.12% of FD total assessed value (assumes no level of service impact)

14 PROPERTY TAX LEVY LIMITATIONS

- "Regular property taxes" means regular property taxes as defined in RCW 84.04.140, except:
 - (a) Regular property taxes levied by port districts or public utility districts to the extent necessary for the payments of principal and interest on general obligation debt; and
 - (b) regular property taxes levied by the state for the support of the common schools under RCW 84.52.065.
 - Regular property taxes do not include excess property tax levies that are exempt from the aggregate limits for junior and senior taxing districts as provided in RCW 84.52.043.
 - Regular property taxes" does not include excess property taxes levied by local school districts.

15 PROPERTY TAX ALLOCATIONS

- About \$4.75 levy rate will be available for allocation (includes city portion)
- State Schools, Clover Park SD, and portions of West Pierce FD levies will not be part of the TIF allocation.
- Assumes Port of Tacoma has no levy supported debt that would exempt a portion of levy rate.

16 PROPERTY TAX MODELING



Summary of Methods

- 1. TIF model is a discounted cash flow model used to understand present-value of a future stream of revenues. Future streams have expectations of inflation and are discounted back to 2021\$.
 - I. Discount rate is 3.5% or roughly equivalent to the city's cost of capital.
 - 2. Property revaluation rate is 1.5% (this is lower than what we have experienced lately).
 - 3. General inflation rate is 1.85% (depending on your view of the current situation, this could be lower/higher).
- 2. Timing matters so the development program is placed in time (e.g., when will it be constructed) to understand the assessed value basis used for the levy apportionment.
- 3. The affected jurisdictions have their levies, assessed values, and levy rates forecasted into the future. Consistent with the 1% limit factor and rising assessed values, levy rates slowly decline over time.
- 4. Levies are allocated based on the cumulative growth in assessed value in the TIF district by that jurisdictions levy rate.

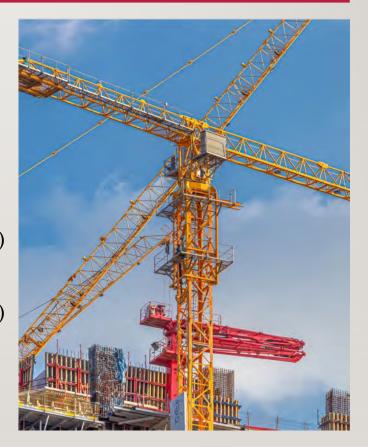

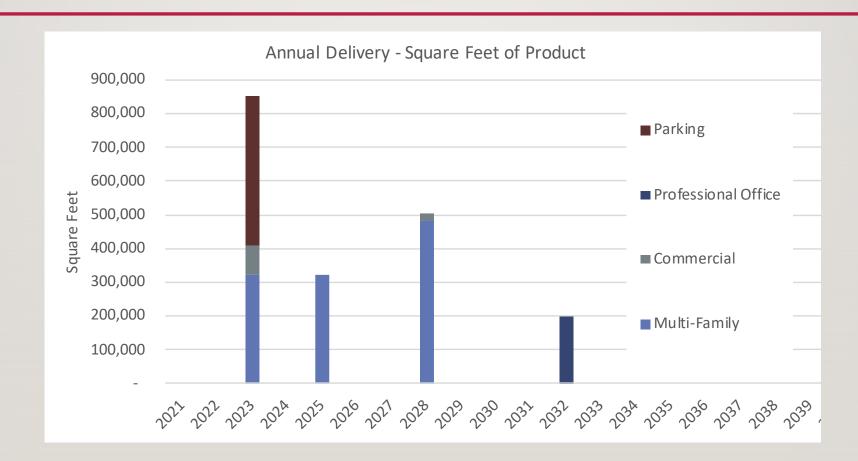

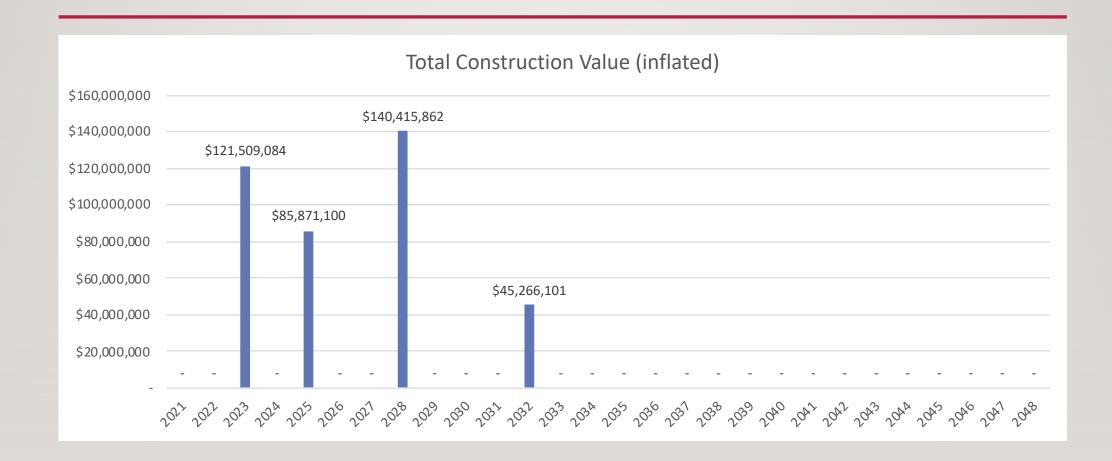

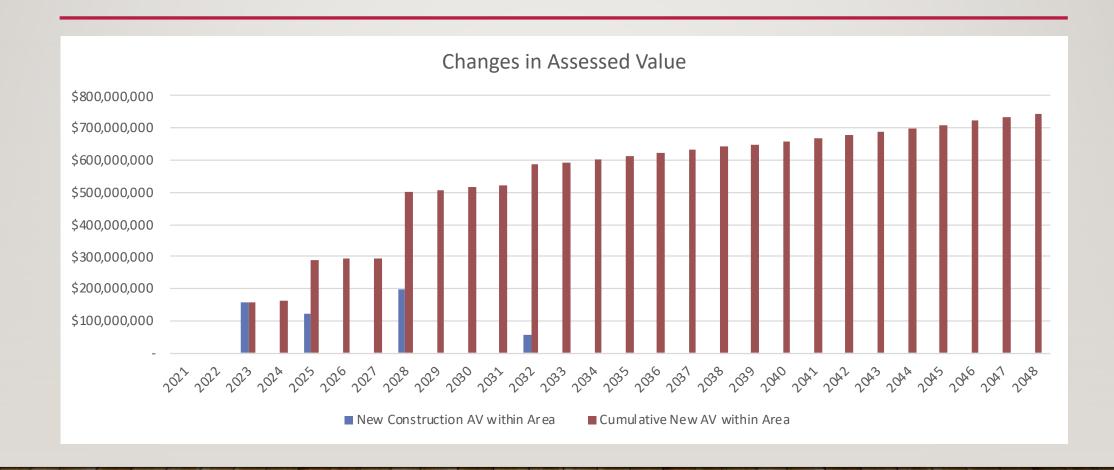
21 PRODUCT DELIVERY SCHEDULE

24 TIF PROPERTY TAX REVENUES

- Without MFTE on the residential, the district is estimated to generated \$39.4 million
 - \$32 million without the city portion (not clear if city must use its portion).
- The Fire District is the most "impacted" of districts given the combined value of its regular and EMS levies (accounts for over half of the TIF allocation.
- MFTE could reduce the allocation revenues by exempting assessed value.
 - Assumes 8-year MFTE
 - \$32 million assuming 50% exemption rate
 - \$25 million assuming 100% exemption rate
- ~ \$9.5 million in one time sales tax on construction and ongoing sales tax from operations to the city (local option only)

29 IMPLEMENTATION DO'S AND DON'TS

- Carefully examine projected TIF's revenues; you will be responsible for any debt issued regardless of development success.
- Follow the letter and spirit of the law.
- Make realistic projections about ability to attract private development with TIF.
- Recognize that future criticism is likely to suggest that private development could have occurred without TIF and back up your findings with market data. How we manage future TIF projects will likely shape future legislation; positive and negative.
- Identify early any possible impacts to affordable housing, business community, schools, fire and work to mitigate.
- Early outreach to special purpose districts, community outreach, etc. beyond what statute requires.
- TIF will likely not be the answer to all your infrastructure needs of a project but can create an important revenue stream.

30 NEXT STEPS

- Continue to work with property owners regarding potential development consistent with Lakewood Landing Vision. Subject to development interest, City may execute Development Agreement with Developer(s) setting forth type of development and City contribution to infrastructure, (e.g., TIF or other source).
- Continue to evaluate infrastructure needs for Lakewood Landing necessary to create envisioned private development.
- Continue to work with WSDOT and State legislature to find source of funds needed to relocate WSDOT Maintenance Facility.
