

CITY OF LAKEWOOD, WA REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS TO PROVIDE PERMANENTLY AFFORDABLE HOUSING: ARPA PROGRAM SEPTEMBER 23, 2022

DEADLINE FOR SUBMITTAL: OCTOBER 17, 2022

A. BACKGROUND

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) is a \$1.9 trillion economic stimulus bill passed by the 117th United States Congress and signed into law by the President on March 21, 2021, to speed up the United States' recovery from the economic and health effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. ARPA presents a great funding opportunity for the City to revitalize the community after the hardships endured throughout the COVID-19 pandemic.

In fall 2022, the City of Lakewood is releasing three Requests for Proposals (RFPs) with available State & Local Fiscal Relief Fund (SLFRF) funding totaling \$5 million dollars among all three to seek respondents who can provide prioritized legacy projects and programs to help Lakewood residents:

- Food bank capital costs
- Housing, including
 - Veterans shelter housing; and
 - o Permanent low income housing

B. PURPOSE OF THIS RFP

To inform the use of its ARPA funds, the City of Lakewood is seeking proposals for **program and project funding for the provision of housing units within the City of Lakewood permanently affordable to those at 60% of Pierce County area median income (AMI) or below (Pierce County 2020 AMI = \$76,438; City of Lakewood 2020 AMI = \$55,723, or 73% of Pierce County AMI))** that follow the criteria in the ARPA Final Rule and the priorities set by the Lakewood City Council to respond to the public health emergency and/or its negative economic impacts.

C. APPLICANT REQUIREMENTS

All applicants must meet eligibility and submit the required information to be considered for a funding recommendation. To be considered for funding, applicants must:

- 1. Submit a complete and responsive application.
- 2. Attach any supplemental information that demonstrates the implementation of the program or project.
- 3. Applicant organizations must serve residents of the City of Lakewood with 100% of any ARPA funds awarded at the completion of this RFP process.
- 4. Applicant organization must have no outstanding financial obligations to the City of Lakewood (e.g., property taxes, personal property tax, motor vehicle tax, past due bills, etc.)
- 5. Applicant organization must be an established organization in operation for at least one full year prior to the start of the COVID-19 pandemic (March 2020).
- 6. Award must be used by subrecipient and cannot be used to make additional grants to other organizations.

- 7. Applicant organizations must be able to comply with ARPA federal reporting guidelines, including but not limited to: submitting quarterly project and expenditure reports. At a minimum, all grantees will be required to provide periodic grant reports.
- 8. Applicant must comply with all ARPA audit and record retention requirements.

D. PROPOSAL REQUIREMENTS

ALL PROPOSALS MUST MEET ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT (ARPA) STATE & LOCAL FISCAL RECOVERY FUND (SLFRF) AWARDS, AND SUBRECIPIENTS OF ARPA FUNDS MUST COMPLY WITH ALL ARPA REPORTING AND AUDIT REQUIREMENTS.

The City of Lakewood strongly encourages applicants to read and understand the eligible uses of the funds to respond to the public health emergency or its negative economic impacts. The U.S. Department of the Treasury <u>website</u> has important information to review, such as the <u>Overview of the Final Rule</u> and <u>updates</u>.

Proposals must be responsive to ARPA's purpose as well as the following City of Lakewood, WA ARPA priorities and Policy Positions:

- ARPA is for one-time costs; however, exceptions may be made for certain programs or pilot programs.
- ARPA funds will be focused on projects that would provide long-lasting benefits to Lakewood residents.
- ARPA funds will be focused on what the Lakewood community needs;
- ARPA funds will be used to make a permanent investment in the City;
- ARPA funds will be used to support organizations that have been long term supporters of Lakewood and its residents;
- ARPA funding may be used for -
 - Capital expenditures with long-lasting benefit for the City, including but not limited to:
 - Food bank capital costs;
 - Housing, including
 - Veterans Shelter Housing; and
 - Permanent Low Income Housing

E. TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- 1. All responses to this RFP become the property of City, and as such may be subject to public review.
- 2. Any costs and expenses incurred by an organization in preparing or submitting responses are the sole responsibility of the Respondent.

- 3. This RFP does not commit the City to award funds.
- 4. The City reserves the right to request additional information and/or clarification from any of the Respondents to this RFP.
- 5. A Respondent must be prepared to present evidence in support of their responses to satisfactorily meet the requirements set forth or implied in the RFP.
- 6. Respondents may be asked to attend a meeting or be interviewed to provide further explanation to the City's RFP reviewers.
- 7. Respondents agree there is an expectation that quantitative and qualitative information may be required on an as needed basis for reporting requirements.
- 8. Respondent agrees to the following **funding payout schedule**: The City will process reimbursement payments within 30 days of receipt of a complete submission (invoice and supporting documentation.)
- 9. All Respondents to the RFP must conform to instructions. Failure to include required signatures, meet deadlines, answer all questions, follow the required format, or failure to comply with other requirements of the RFP may be considered appropriate cause for rejection of the response. All communication must be done through the City's ARPA Program Manager, Tiffany Speir at tspeirodiction.com.
- 10. The contract produced from the selection process will represent the entire agreement between the Respondent and City and will supersede all prior negotiations, representations, or agreements alleged or made between the parties.
- 11. The City may **terminate** the funding agreement, in whole or in part, for default based on the following conditions:
 - (i) Respondent fails to provide the City with timely and/or acceptable progress reporting data;
 - (ii) insolvency of the Respondent;
 - (iii) loss of key personnel responsible for administering the program/service;
 - (iv) lack of responsiveness to City inquiries; or
 - (v) Respondent fails to fulfill any of its obligations under ARPA.

Prior to termination, the City shall notify Respondent of the default condition and shall allow Respondent thirty (30) calendar days within which to rectify the condition. If the condition is ameliorated within the allowed period, the funding agreement shall remain in full force and effect. If the default condition remains beyond the allowed period; the City may terminate the funding agreement, in whole or in part, by written "Notice of Termination" to the Respondent stating the basis for termination and effective date. Termination of funding will require any received funding to be refunded.

F. REVIEW & SELECTION CRITERIA

Proposals will be reviewed by the City of Lakewood. The City will consider the applications and provide the City Council with a list of funding recommendations for review and action.

The review process will consider the review rubric included below as well as the application's

responsiveness to the City of Lakewood, WA ARPA Priorities and Policy Positions described in Section D above. The five criteria will be reviewed as either Green, Yellow, or Red. The overall review will be used as the basis for ultimately determining funding recommendations.

Treasury has updated its guidance to clarify two presumptively eligible ways to use SLFRF to fund affordable housing investments under the final rule.

SLFRF Affordable Housing Updates at a Glance:

- Expanded Presumptive Eligibility. SLFRF permits funds to be used, among other uses, to combat the public health and negative economic impacts (PH-NEI) of the pandemic. Treasury has updated its guidance to clarify two presumptively eligible ways to use SLFRF to fund affordable housing investments under the final rule.¹
 - Option 1: SLFRF funds used for affordable housing projects under the PH-NEI eligible use category are presumptively eligible if the project meets certain core requirements of the following expanded list of federal housing programs:
 - National Housing Trust Fund (HTF)
 - HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME)
 - Low-Income Housing Credit (LIHTC)
 - · Public Housing Capital Fund
 - Section 202 Supportive Housing for the Elderly Program
 - Section 811 Supportive Housing for Persons with Disabilities Program
 - Project-Based Rental Assistance
 - Multifamily Preservation & Revitalization Program
 - Affordable housing projects provided by a Tribal government if they
 would be eligible for funding under the Indian Housing Block Grant;

program, the Indian Community Development Block Grant program, or the Bureau of Indian Affairs Housing Improvement Program

The program requirements of these federal housing programs that must be met for presumptive eligibility have been clarified to include four core requirements:

- Resident income restrictions;
- The affordability period and related covenant requirements for assisted units;
- Tenant protections; and
- · Housing quality standards.
- Option 2: SLFRF funds used for affordable rental housing under the PH-NEI eligible use category are presumptively eligible uses if the units funded serve households at or below 65% of AMI for a period of 20 years or greater.
- A broader range of affordable housing investments may also be eligible uses of SLFRF funds under the final rule if they are related and are reasonably proportional to addressing the negative economic impacts of the pandemic and otherwise meet the final rule's requirements. Depending on the needs of the local rental market, it may be reasonably proportional to address the negative economic impacts of the pandemic by funding units (e.g., up to 80% AMI) that do not fall into the presumptively eligible categories listed above.

- <u>Improvements to existing facilities</u> to remediate lead contaminants (e.g., removal of lead paint)
- <u>Installation and improvement of ventilation systems</u> in congregate settings, health facilities, or other public facilities
- Job and workforce training centers
- <u>Medical equipment and facilities</u> designed to address disparities in public health outcomes (includes primary care clinics, hospitals, or integrations of health services into other settings)
- <u>Medical facilities generally dedicated to COVID-19 treatment and mitigation</u> (e.g., emergency rooms, intensive care units, telemedicine capabilities for COVID-19 related treatment)
- <u>Mitigation</u> measures in small businesses, nonprofits, and impacted industries (e.g., developing outdoor spaces)
- <u>Parks</u>, <u>green spaces</u>, <u>recreational facilities</u>, <u>sidewalks</u>, pedestrian safety features like crosswalks, streetlights, neighborhood cleanup, and other projects to revitalize public spaces
- Public health data systems, including technology infrastructure
- <u>Rehabilitations, renovation, remediation, cleanup, or conversions</u> of vacant or abandoned properties
- Schools and other educational facilities or equipment to address educational disparities
- <u>Technology and equipment to allow law enforcement to efficiently and effectively respond</u> to the rise in gun violence resulting from the pandemic
- <u>Technology and tools</u> to effectively develop, execute, and evaluate government programs

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- <u>Technology infrastructure to adapt government operations</u> to the pandemic (e.g., videoconferencing software, improvements to case management systems or data sharing resources), reduce government backlogs, or meet increased maintenance needs
- <u>Temporary medical facilities and other measures</u> to increase COVID-19 treatment capacity, including related construction costs
